A Brief History of Interplast

How did it all begin? About 30 years ago an American Plastic Surgeon, Dr Don Laub, went to Mexico for a holiday - whilst he was there he was asked to have a look at a child with a cleft lip - Don Laub was so moved by the fact that this child was being brought up in the chook house because his parents were ashamed of his appearance. He took him back to Stanford University and operated to repair the cleft lip.

When he returned the little boy to his home some weeks later, he was surprised to find there were many, many more children suffering the same condition and not being treated as there was no plastic surgeon. He gathered together volunteer surgeons, anaesthetists and nurses and established Interplast America which then provided programmes to this part of the world and, eventually, into South America. It was on a programme to Ecuador that a plastic surgeon from Melbourne joined the team. On his return he spoke at a Rotary Club about his experiences.

Rotarians, being the great organisers they are, then wondered whether a service such as this was needed in our near neighbour developing countries - and in making enquiries found that there was no plastic surgeon in the whole of the Pacific.

The concept of Interplast Australia was then introduced to the Rotary Clubs in the then District 980 and the very first programme was conducted to Samoa in 1983, fully funded by Rotary. The next programme funded by Rotary was to Fiji, and it was there the Australian Government - Department of Foreign Affairs - recognised the importance of such a programme as a foreign aid programme (the results are there to see - the befores and afters), and this resulted in Government funding being allocated for Interplast programmes throughout the Pacific Islands.

Since that time, Interplast programmes have been extended to include Papua New Guinea, The Philippines, Vietnam, Indonesia, Laos, and Myanmar and in March 2002 programmes commenced to Sri Lanka.

Interplast Australia is set up as a company limited by guarantee and has 3 Rotary members (from districts 9810, 9680 & 9780) 3 members from R.A.C.S. and 1 independent member. It has a board of directors including Rotarians from 5 Australian districts and is now supported by District Interplast Committees in around 18 of the 23 Australian districts.

To date: 488 Volunteers have conducted 305 programmes to 20 countries comprising 22,079 consultations and 12,645 operations. 40 patients have been brought to Australia for treatment and over 40 doctors and nurses brought out for further training.

Interplast teams consist of two surgeons, one anaesthetist and one nurse who give their time entirely for two weeks. There are more volunteers than there are programmes. In some cases an extra nurse and anaesthetist may be sent - depending on the local staff and facilities available.

Trees For Survival

Trees for Survival is an educational and revegetation program, initiated and supported by the Rotary Clubs of Australia. The project originated from Rotary's concern for Australia's rapidly degrading environment and has achieved worldwide recognition under Rotary's Preserve Planet Earth initiative.

TFS is a co-operative annual cycle of carers and land management groups working together to revegetate indigenous landscapes by nurturing seedlings to return to their original habitat.

Through its Trees for 2000 project, Trees for Survival project has two key objectives to combat this degradation problem:

- ??Increase the community's awareness of the issues surrounding land degradation and the importance of natural vegetation
- ??Foster a close link between revegetation groups, Rotary Clubs, Schools and other institutions involved with the shade house.

Trees for Survival has supplied many hundreds of thousands of healthy trees to revegetation groups and these have been planted in degraded areas of Australia. It also encourages those schools involved to grow native plants for local community beautification and benefit and to engage in many environmental projects such as waste recycling, testing of air and water pollution, care of endangered species.

The program enjoys the support of environment organisations (e.g. Greening Australia, Landcare and Dunecare groups), Federal and State government agencies, many local councils, business (e.g. Trans-Grid) and Catchment Management Committees and Trusts.
