### **Guest Speaker – Mamiko Tanaka**

Ichiro Tanaka introduced his daughter Mamiko to speak to the Club on the topic of 'Futoko", which is the Japanese name for the problem of children who do not want to go to school. Mamiko was born in Houston, Texas. She attended kindergarten and primary school in Japan and then came to Adelaide with her parents where she completed primary school, then high school, then a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Asian Studies.

Mamiko began by recounting how her first encounter with Rotary was the sight of the Four Way Test engraved on a plate at the studio of her music teacher in Japan and said how pleased she was that her father had joined Rotary.

The problem of futoko is a serious one in Japan, with increasing numbers of young people staying away from school and withdrawing from society. These young people range from primary school age through to the university years. Mamiko went to Japan to pursue her passion for finding out from the point of view of the young people themselves just why they were withdrawing from school and society.

Mamiko described some of the identified causes of futoko including the Japanese cultural expectation for scholastic success, bullying and the shame attached to not attending school. Children who don't go to school are often regarded as mentally ill and are sent to hospital for treatment. Suicide can sometimes be an outcome of futoko.

The public school system is very strict and does not suit the personalities of many students. Support groups have been established by volunteers to provide an alternative, less strict environment to help futoko students return to school.
