### Unley Citizens' Centre

The Unley Citizens' Centre is owned and operated by the City of Unley for the benefit of residents over 50 years of age. Just a couple of words — **enhancing lifestyles** — explain what the Unley Citizens' Centre is all about. It is a Centre that has evolved over 35 years and now operates as a Community Centre for people over 50 years of age with a focus on isolated persons.

The Centre's life started when the Unley Council recognised the need to establish a venue that catered for the needs of older residents of Unley. Over its 35 years of operation the Centre has 'evolved' to meet the changing needs of people over 50 years of age and is the only such centre to have attained Active Australia Accreditation. The Centre currently offers a variety of active programs, including Tai Chi, Yoga, Walking Group, Health and Fitness classes, old style dancing, Community Computing Courses, monthly Sunday Concerts and much more.

The Circuit Café operates four days per week within the Centre, excluding Wednesdays. This service offers a menu of home cooked, nutritionally balanced meals. The Circuit is supported by a dedicated team of volunteers. Morning tea is available from 9:30am with lunch being served between 11:30am and 1:00pm (last orders taken at 12:30pm). Bookings are required fro groups of four or more. Afternoon tea is available between 1:30pm and 3:00pm.

### Tank Trail Opens

The secrets of getting the most from domestic rainwater tanks can now be discovered at the City of Unley's new Rainwater Tank Trail, launched in November 2003.

Three separate harvesting systems have been fitted to the Unley Museum in Edmund Street to collect rainwater for use in and around the building.

People always think of rainwater tanks for drinking, but in Adelaide drinking water accounts for only 1% of total household water usage.

The idea of the Rainwater Tank Trail is to show people how much water they can save by installing tanks that are plumbed through to major uses like toilets and washing machines.

Visitors are guided along the Trail by nine educational signs. Together with a comprehensive brochure, they provide useful information to help residents design a system that meets their needs or makes the best use of existing tanks. The Rainwater Tank Trail can be accessed during daylight hours seven days a week.
