# Centennial marks birth of service club movement

In 2005, as the Rotary world celebrates the Rotary Centennial, the world will celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the service club movement – a powerful force in shaping community and world affairs. As the world's first service club organisation, Rotary set the standard for service and fellowship that has since been emulated by numerous groups.

In his book *Service Clubs in American Society,* Jeffrey A. Charles explains the phenomenal growth of service clubs in the early 1900s: "The appeal of this kind of activity was so broad it could not be accommodated by Rotary, and imitations began to appear."

Attesting to Paul Harris's prescience, the first Optimist club was begun in 1911, its founders already anticipating the type of nationwide expansion Rotary was then achieving. The next year saw the birth of the National Exchange Club and Sertoma, followed by Kiwanis in 1915 and Lions in 1917.

Because early service clubs were open only to men, service-minded women established Zonta in 1919 and Soroptimist clubs in 1921.

If imitation is the highest form of flattery, Rotary received an abundance of compliments in its early decades. The classification system, district administrative structure, weekly club meetings, organisation motto, and annual convention are just a few Rotary basics that other services clubs have adopted. From the time Rotary pioneered the concept of the service club, the movement has grown to encompass more than 30 organisations with a combined membership of over 4.3 million. Today, these legions of volunteers work throughout the world eradicating polio, helping the blind and visually impaired, preventing child abuse, assisting disabled individuals, and addressing

a wide range of other issues related to health, education, and the well-being of children.

Like Rotary, many of these organisations sponsor service clubs for teenagers and young adults, ensuring that the service club mission will be carried on well into the movement's second century.

# Rotary Fellowships Month is highlighted in June

Rotary Fellowships Month in June is an ideal time to explore the rewards of Rotary Fellowships. Many Rotarians join these groups because they are interested in making new, international friends who share common interests or vocations. Most Rotarians also find that sharing interests generates ideas for service.

That is exactly what happened when several members of the Rotarians-on-the-Internet (ROTI) Fellowship were chatting in cyberspace last year. Troubled by armed conflicts in Iraq and elsewhere, several ROTI members were determined to take positive action. Ideas began flying back and forth as the fellowship considered the potential of modern information technology for exploring the Avenues of Service.

Deciding that they wanted to do something for children, they began working with the Gift of Life program, which provides lifesaving surgeries to needy children. Harnessing the communication power of the Internet, ROTI quickly raised enough money to sponsor children from India and Ukraine. The Internet also proved valuable for handling the logistics of bringing the children to the United States for their surgeries.
