# **Rotary's Educational Programs**

As the world's largest privately funded source of international scholarships, Rotary hopes to build world understanding and promotes the exchange of ideas across the globe.

Since 1947, The Rotary Foundation has awarded more than US\$1.1 billion in humanitarian and educational grants. Each grant is administered by local Rotary clubs. Rotary's educational programs include:

# Rotary Centres for International Studies in Peace and Conflict Resolution

A two-year master's level program to train future diplomats and community leaders on issues of peace and conflict resolution.

Seventy Rotary World Peace Scholars are selected annually from around the world to study at eight participating universities:

- Duke University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, North Carolina, USA
- Sciences Po (L'Institut d'Études Politiques), Paris, France
- Universidad del Salvador, Buenos Aires, Argentina
- University of Bradford, West Yorkshire, England
- International Christian University, Tokyo, Japan
- University of Queensland, Brisbane, Australia
- University of California-Berkeley, California, USA

### **Ambassadorial Scholarships**

1,200 scholarships are awarded to college students around the globe to study in another country for three months to two years. These students serve as ambassadors of goodwill in their host country.

### Youth Exchange

This program enables 8,000 teenage students around the world to study in another country and learn about their history, language, and culture.

### **Rotary Grants for University Teachers**

Grants awarded to university faculty, who can teach for up to 10 months at an institution of their choice in developing countries.

### **Group Study Exchange**

The program enables groups of young professionals aged 25-40 to participate in exchanges visits between countries for four to six weeks.

Rotary is an organization of 1.2 million business and professional leaders united worldwide, who provide humanitarian service, and help to build goodwill and peace in the world.

# 2004 Council on Legislation

The 2004 Council on Legislation will take place Sunday, 13 June through Friday, 18 June in Chicago, Illinois. The Council is the legislative body of Rotary International, which meets once every three years and has the authority to amend the constitutional documents of RI. Each of Rotary's 529 districts will have a representative at the Council to debate and vote on legislation. District 9520's representative at the Council will be Geoff Simpson.

The Council will operate under the Chairmanship of Bill Huntley and the Vice-Chairmanship of Mark Daniel Maloney. The Parliamentarian is Ray Klinginsmith. Members-at-large include Abraham Gordon, Daniel Mooers and Bill Sergeant. The Chief Sergeant-at-Arms is Rudolf Hoerndler.

30 June 2003 was the deadline for legislation to be received for the 2004 Council on Legislation, and the General Secretary received over 600 pieces from clubs, districts, the General Council of RIBI and the RI Board.

The Constitution & Bylaws Committee, under the chairmanship of Allan Frumkin, with members Jerry Piao Yu and John Boag, has met seven times since July 2003 to review all of the legislation. The Committee made recommendations regarding each piece to the RI Board.

Volume 1 of the legislation, which contains 427 pieces of "regular" legislation, is currently available for download from Rotary International's web site download web page at http://www.rotary.org/newsroom/downloadcenter/support/co uncil.html. Volume 2 includes pieces 428 through 530 of the "regular" and "deficient" legislation and is also available for download.

# West Africa mobilised for final assault against polio

From 23 February, 10 countries held simultaneous polio immunization campaigns, targeting 63 million children in Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon (20 February), Central African Republic, Chad (joining in March), Ghana, Niger, Nigeria and Togo. Political, religious and traditional leaders teamed up to launch the activities, and tens of thousands of vaccinators went house-to-house to administer the vaccine directly to every child over the following three days.
