From President Ron

Genese Mullins has sent the Club a letter of appreciation for the box of flowers she received at the Changeover Dinner.

Pauline Daly and Pat Limbert have written to the Club expressing their appreciation for the Club's acknowledgement of their birthdays.

Pres. Ron read the following statement from Rotary International in relation to recent press reports concerning abuse of a Rotary Youth Exchange participant.

Rotary International attaches great importance to protecting the well being of our Youth Exchange participants. Rotary International has put in a place a code of conduct for working with youth in all of its programs, especially the Youth Exchange program, to prevent abuse.

Clubs have established stringent selection processes to screen and interview host families. Clubs are also required to appoint a Rotary club member (who is not a member of the host family) as counsellor to each exchange student. The counsellor maintains regular contact with the student. If the student has problems, he or she is encouraged to report or communicate the problems to the counsellor or other Rotary officers in charge. More importantly, each exchange student is offered as many as three orientation sessions upon arrival by the local Rotary clubs. These orientation sessions include information about what to do when encountering problems.

Rotary clubs, which administer the program, take every report and complaint seriously. Anyone who comes forward with allegations of abuse is encouraged to report them immediately to law enforcement. Rotary cannot tolerate any form of abuse.

In Australia, Rotary International has established a hotline to aid the reporting of any problems encountered by participants in the Youth Exchange Program. The number is 02 9635 3537.

The Youth Exchange Program was formally established in 1972. As the program matures and expands, our procedures in safeguarding the interests of our young participants are also becoming more comprehensive. For example, each year, Rotary offers formal training and education on how to operate Youth Exchange Programs to local Rotary clubs at the regional or international conferences.

The Youth Exchange Program is one of the thousands of Rotary programs initiated by local Rotary clubs to promote peace and international understanding among people from different cultures. Started shortly after the World War II, many Rotary clubs in the US and Europe raised money on their own to send young people to live in another Rotary country so they could experience other cultures. Upon arrival in a foreign country, these young people would be under the care of their hosts, who are volunteer Rotary club members. Today, the program offers the opportunity for thousands of young people to serve as cultural ambassadors and promote international understanding.

On the Spot

Joan reported that it was a very emotional time for Netta (she apparently has learned some colorful Australian expressions) as she packed her considerable amount of luggage. Qantas kindly ignored the fact that Netta's suitcase was significantly over her weight allowance.

Ken Haines reported that last Friday night Kaylene Kranz, Greg Love and he had attended the Telstra South Australian Small Business Awards presentation, and Kaylene won the award in the 5-20 employees category. Now she goes on to the National finals on 14 August. Congratulations and best wishes Kaylene.

Mark Brindal has written to the Club apologising for not being able to attend the Club's Changeover Dinner.

John Nowland, along with host parents John Henderson and Liz Pike, met our new inbound exchange student Isabella Alsen ["Lissa"] when she arrived at the airport on Friday morning, without luggage (it came Monday afternoon). John took her to Pulteney Grammar on Monday morning to organise her enrolment there. Her English is very good and she comes highly recommended by her school principal back in Helsinborg, Sweden. Initiative of RIBI Rotarians Excites Future Scientists

More than 350 students from all over Britain made an educational trip to the world-famous Faraday Theatre of the Royal Institution on 24 June through Excitement of Science, a three-year-old project of Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland (RIBI).

Named after Michael Faraday, the 19th century British physicist and chemist credited with discoveries of the laws of electrolysis and electromagnetic induction, the theatre is part of a prestigious institution that has contributed toward the advancement of science for more than 200 years, including teaching science to non-scientists.

As its name suggests, the RIBI effort is aimed at showing 13-18 year-olds that science is fun and exciting enough to consider as a career. In February, a carefully selected group of students from 89 schools embarked on an adventure of research and discovery through the study of black holes.

"We select the most scientifically able we can find," says project coordinator Prof. William Mullarkey of the Rotary Club of Hindley, Manchester, England. "From the outset it was considered vital that all should be able to travel at no cost to themselves other than having to earn their places. That was done by intellect and enthusiasm not money; they simply have to demonstrate that they are amongst the most able candidates to join the next generation of scientists."

If Mullarkey had his way, more high school graduates would be choosing science-oriented careers over law or journalism, for example. He believes strongly that that choice would be attractive if scientists like him could share with gifted students "some magic moments in science."

Since February, this year's cohort of aspiring scientists has studied the properties of a class of black holes called quasars, using the world's largest fully robotic telescope, owned by the Astrophysics Research Institute at Liverpool John Moores University.

After several months of experiments and research based on the observations of scientists in Britain and the United States, the students gathered at the Faraday Theatre to try to answer some of the perplexing questions about quasars. They were joined by 94 teachers and 77 curious adults, including Rotarians.

The day started off with Dr. John Kilcoyne of the University of Sunderland, England, introducing attendees to the thrills of chemistry through a series of explosive but harmless concoctions. Dr. Andrew Newsam from Liverpool John Moores University was the lead scientist for this year's project. He made a one-hour presentation to the students, part of it devoted to a live observation of the universe through a robotic telescope in Hawaii dedicated to education.

The Royal Institution and the National Schools' Observatory (NSO) collaborated with RIBI to make this year's Excitement of Science a success.
