Our Guest Speaker – Jess Henderson 2004 Exchange Student

Well I'm here tonight to tell you all about my exchange to Brazil. Firstly I would like to thank you all very very much for sponsoring me to go on exchange. It was honestly the best experience I have ever had and I couldn't imagine any better way to have spent the year between school and university. I learnt a lot about my self and about Brazil and it was an experience that I will never ever forget. Before I get too far in, there is a photo album circling the room that has a selection of photos from my trip. There are photos of host families, friends, my city and my year in general.

I remember arriving in my host city of Maringá unable to speak a single word of Portuguese. I arrived at the airport, introduced myself in the broken Portuguese that I had taught myself on the plane, and quickly asked if anyone spoke English! Everyone wanted to practice their English with me, however I was determined to learn the language of the country that I was to call home for a year. Now I can speak Portuguese almost fluently; going on exchange is certainly the easiest and fastest way to learn another language! Portuguese is a difficult language.

The city I lived in was inland. It is the city with the most trees in all of Brazil and has a population of 350000. It is a rich city and could well be classified as a 1st world city. Most Brazilian cities have poor parts called 'favelas' which are filled with shanty housing and are areas where people are unable to afford even the basics of food and clean water. However Maringá is one of the only cities in Brazil to not have a favela. The state that I lived in, Parana is mostly associated with farming. Just walking along the street in my city made this clear. Men would be wearing cowboy hats, boots, big buckled belts, checker shirts and jeans; horses stood in the middle of the road in the middle of the day; right in the heart of the city, next door to the university, there are paddocks with horses and cattle! Rodeos were a very popular event and cattle sales were always happening! The climate of Maringa is pretty much the same as Adelaide, hot summers, cool winters.

Instead of studying at a school, as I was originally supposed to do, I studied at university. My great uncle from my last family was the dean, and both my host mum and my host brother in my first family studied at the same university. I also lived about a one-minute walk from it! I think that this was possibly the best thing I could have done. I was surrounded by people my own age, and studied advertising and publicity, a course that is quite similar to the one I am now studying, a bachelor of marketing. I had to learn Portuguese quickly to make any sense of the lectures as all of the lessons, except for English, were in Portuguese. Lectures were at night, starting at 7.10pm and going until 10.50pm. When I lived with my third family I caught the bus to university. In my other families I either walked or went with family members.

The staple Brazilian diet is rice and beans. Almost every meal consists of rice and beans, with salad and meat, or with potato chips and meat, or with spaghetti, or with meatballs and salad. Everything comes with rice and beans!!! But now that I'm home and haven't eaten rice and beans in three and a half months, I am dying for the meal that ended up making me feel sick!!!

I went on three big trips through Rotary while I was away. The first trip took me to Rio de Janeiro where I went to Carnivale. My second Rotary organised trip was to the Amazon. My third Rotary organised trip was to the northeast of Brazil.

Although I was told to prepare for homesickness, I was lucky in that I didn't really experience it. I did get homesick on a couple of occasions, when I was sick. All I wanted was a hug from my Mum! It was difficult being away from the people who mean the most to me, my family, my friends and my dog, however I think that it made my relationships with them stronger, as now I know how much I love and cherish them!

I would really like to thankyou all for enabling me to make the most of this opportunity. It was the best and most unforgettable experience I have ever had. Have a great night, and I hope that you all will one day have an opportunity to travel to the amazing country of Brazil.
