Announcements from President Stephen

1. We have had a communication from Assistant Governor Judy McAdam which relates to the Group 6 Matching Grant Programme, Project Amigo in Mexico. The project is proceeding well and all has been completed for the grant from this end. A copy of the application is available for anyone interested in seeing it. The aim of the project is to fund 20 hearing aids at a cost of US\$350 each and 18 custom made wheelchairs at US\$362 each. The entire project cost is US\$13, 525 all up and between Group 6, the district designated fund and the matching grant the project costs will be met.
2. Notice has been received from the Eastwood club in relation to an intercity meeting. Further information will be given when the date is firmed up and we have determined the impact on our own clubs program.
3. Application forms for the District conference have been sent to those requesting them. Further details of accommodation will be given as it surfaces. A number of clubs are now releasing rooms.

The objects for which OUR WELLBEING PLACE is established are to:

- Provide a community resource that is non-partisan and promotes its objects without distinction as to health status, race, culture, age, sexuality, language, gender, national origin or religion;
- Promote community and social and emotional well-being through a place open to individuals and organisations who support the Associations objectives.
- Provide a focus for resilience, recovery, self-development, social inclusion, capacity building and education.
- Ensure access to the Place and its resources for a diverse range of people impacted by social emotional and wellbeing health issues.
- Work respectfully with Aboriginal organisations and peoples to develop culturally appropriate services and programs addressing social and emotional well-being.

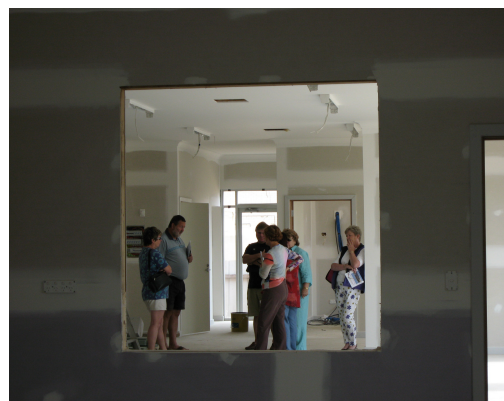
Murray Bridge is an area with low incomes, poverty and a diverse ethnic group.

Our part in the project is twofold. First, to work with the other two Rotary clubs to decorate part of the centre on a joint working bee, the work involves painting the walls with flat paint, no gloss painting, nor ceilings. The second is to fund the installation of a patio with a large Rotary Wheel as a central mosaic for part of the outside area.

We need volunteers to join a working bee on **Sunday March 4th at Murray Bridge (“Our Wellbeing Place”, 108, Swanport Road, Murray Bridge).**

It will be a great opportunity for service and a chance for some club and inter club fellowship. Lunch and a BBQ to follow will be provide, BYO grog, start time will be somewhere between 9 and 10am.

- Greg also reminded the club that he is trying to get a table together for the Rotary Club of Playford quiz night on 17th March and to advise him if you are interested.

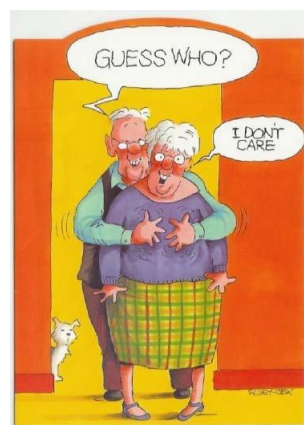
Sergeant's Session

Guest Speakers



John Peacham gave the club an update and insight into our joint project with the Rotary Club of Chiangmai to establish a day care centre and facilities for Thailand's northern hill tribes. Outlining some of Thailand's history John highlighted that they were a peace loving people who have a history and culture that dates back at least as far as other known civilisations. There are seven broad hill tribes in Thailand, with various clans creating further sub divisions. Each hill tribe has its own customs and beliefs. The Karen, one of these tribes, are gentle warm people, their customs are deep, complex and strictly adhered to. Karen hill tribe villages are in highland and difficult terrain making it difficult to benefit from government services. The children lack education opportunities and are often left for long periods as their parents go to work.

The project's objectives are to allow hill tribe children to acquire the necessary skills and education, to teach the parents the value of education and to instruct parents in child care and development, including AIDS, sanitation, hygiene, nutrition and the rights of children. The plan is to build a day care centre equipped with self-learning materials. Costing US\$30,000 the project will provide the furniture, basic sanitary equipment and the furniture and technology to allow remote access to learning facilities.



CLUB UPDATES

Community Service – Jerry Casburn

The Community Service Committee began its year with a charter to continue to support traditional club programmes such as the “Carols at the Rotunda”, to develop a local Unley based project that might span a number of years in its development and implementation, and to support a developing programme in the Murray Bridge area concerned with mental health.

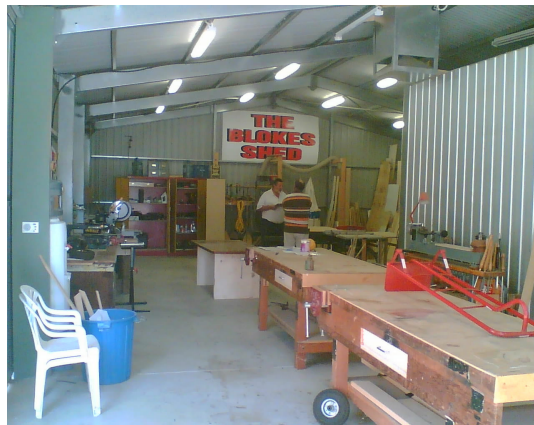
The Carols were a roaring success this year with some new ideas to promote the event through a schools colouring competition, an initiative of **Sheila Evans** and **Jennifer Casburn**. With difficulty in pinning down a children's act for the show at our normal time we were forced to put the Funkees on earlier and fill in time with roving entertainment. **Martin Cooper** provided his delicious wraps and we supplemented the food offering with yoghurts and mince pies. The financial outcome was a small profit of around \$500 against a budget of \$2,225. Savings were made on some of the expenses, particularly helped by donations of printing and copying from both **David Middleton** and **Natalie Bowen**. Overall it left the club better off by nearly \$3,000. We still have to complete the final wrap-up but a club questionnaire suggested approval of the event with some recommended changes to expand the food offering and increase some security and safety aspects.

The Murray Bridge project has taken off and I will not repeat the current status as you had that in the spots.

The key priority for the team is to develop and have approved policies to recruit and support volunteers for the Thrift Shop. **Sheila Evans** and **Janet Singh** are leading this initiative. The project will commence with establishing ways to encourage and recruit volunteers as a matter of urgency, followed by support for training and administration, including key areas of Occupational Health and Safety.

The toughie has been the local Unley project. We started by seeking City of Unley Council support in finding a project. This led to exploration of working with the community gardens to improve facilities for use of the gardens by residents of Julia Farr. This was rejected on the basis that it did not create sufficient widespread community use, in that, the gardens are primarily used by a small group of keen gardeners and the premises are locked when unattended. Various other programmes were considered until **President Stephen** suggested we look at providing a “Men's Shed” for use by local retirees to potter. Current status is some discussion with the local Veterans home and a look at the facility offered by the Baptist Church in Edwardstown. We are continuing to explore this option.

Overall I would like to thank the committee, **David Middleton**, **Janet Singh**, **Martin Cooper**, **Joan Reed**, **Sheila Evans** and all our partners for their support and for the great meals and fellowship enjoyed in our offsite meetings.
