It was Anne Wehr who introduced Neesha to the club and she presented Neesha with her Rotary pin. Neesha will have the classification of Translation Services and will serve on the International Committee this year; Chairperson Chandra Sluggett welcomed Neesha onto the Committee. We were also delighted to meet Neesha's daughter Mihiri who came along to help celebrate her mother becoming an Unley Rotarian.

Neesha was born in Colombo, Sri Lanka. Her father is now a retired Parliamentarian, having served in that role for 12 years. Her mother was a journalist prior to her marriage and then stayed home to take care of her family of four boys and two girls. Neesha's mother passed away suddenly some years ago.

Neesha (full name: Maligaspe Koralage Neesha Saroja Nandasena; ask her about Sri Lankan pedigrees) did her schooling at Musaecis College (a private school) up to year 12. She then entered Sri Lanka Law College, graduated as an Attorney-at-Law and was then qualified as a Practising Lawyer, Notary, Company Secretary and Translator.

Neesha has always wanted to see more of the world and in 2003 when Mihiri was ten years old, Neesha applied for a student visa to Australia and was accepted. She spent 12 months in Perth studying Advanced English, at her own expense.

Having enjoyed her previous stay in Australia Neesha decided to apply to migrate here, was again accepted and here she is with us now, joining the Rotary Club of Unley.




Guest Speaker - Patrick Anderson: "SA Great"

Stephen Baker introduced Patrick Anderson who spoke to us on the topic of "SA Great". Patrick was born in South Australia and trained in journalism. He has worked in Chile, worked for Global Education bring international students to Australia, began his professional career with the ABC as a researcher and had a period of "R&R" working in Queensland. He subsequently joined SA Great as a Communications Specialist in the Marketing Department where he manages the media and five websites.

I know that we have all heard a lot about the Rotary Foundation, it's mission is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty. David also mentioned in his briefing the Centurion programme, this, in a very painless way, allows a \$100 contribution for Rotarians who have signed up to go to the Foundation each year. Currently we have eight members who contribute to the programme and one other member signed up that night. It is simple, each time you pay your half yearly dues there is an opportunity to add \$50 as a contribution, the monies are tax deductible and build over time to the equivalent of US\$1000 when the member can acquire a Paul Harris Fellowship for themselves or someone they care to nominate.

It would be great if we could become a Centurion club and acknowledged as such by contributing \$100 per annum for every member of the club. So if you can, think about becoming a Centurion member when paying your next set of dues.
