Membership Report - Martin Cooper

Membership Director gave members a rev-up about membership, basing his presentation on "A" words. Once he had got members' Attention by literally getting them off their A***s, Martin discouraged Apathy and urged Active members to think of people who might be interested in Rotary and be good contributors to Rotary.

As it's the responsibility of All Rotarians to help build membership, Martin asked that All members propose names of Appropriate people to the membership Committee, who would then do the rest. He also encouraged members to invite potential members along to meetings so they could get a first-hand taste of Rotary.

Martin reported on comments made at the recent Membership Conference in Canberra regarding "Z Clubs" which focussed their recruiting on specific age groups, such as 25-40 year-olds. Members of these new Z clubs, like Adelaide Edge, acknowledge that in time they will become clubs of 45-60 year-olds. The concept of continually establishing "greenfields" clubs will inevitably have the effect of degrading existing clubs. The optimum approach

for sustaining club vitality, effectiveness and longevity is to have a broad range of ages within a club. We also need to make a conscious effort to increase the female content of our club as well as lower our average age, which is currently in the upper 50s.

The issue of Attendance was also discussed at the Membership Conference; it was considered to be a sacred cow that should be killed-off. Indeed, consideration should be given to people's business and family commitments and, instead of emphasising attendance, we should value Rotarians' commitment when they can attend Rotary meetings and can participate in Rotary programs and projects. We should also develop opportunities for "friends of Rotary" to participate in programs and projects, such as the upcoming Family Fireworks fundraiser.

Guest Speakers: Lauren Sperring & Natalie Moore

Chairman for the evening Joan Reed introduced our guest speakers, indigenous Health Scholarship students Lauren Sperring and Natalie Moore. Joan mentioned that she had been a guest speaker at a recent Congress for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Seminar where she spoke on Tuberculosis in Indigenous Groups and referred in her introduction to the Indigenous Health Scholarship Program. Several people subsequently expressed interest in the Program and Joan is now in the process of providing them with information on how to apply in their States of residence.

Lauren Sperring is in her first year of Medicine at the University of Adelaide and is cosponsored by Dr Helen Sage. Lauren's great grandmother was a member of the Wirangu people from around Streaky Bay.

Lauren began by thanking the club for sponsoring her and for inviting her to the club meeting and saying how important it is to her to have people supporting her through the difficult Medicine course. Lauren had always had an interest in science and had thought of being a vet. She had thought that her grades might prevent her getting into medicine and so leaned towards science and teaching, because she really wanted to work with people. During Year 12 Lauren began to get involved with her indigenous background. Following

discussions with the Aboriginal Education Worker at her school Lauren opted to do her year 12 over two years. She feels that this, along with success in entrance exams and interviews, enabled her to get into medicine, to her great surprise and delight. Last year Lauren applied for and got into a one-week seminar on medicine for indigenous students, which was held in Sydney and sparked a strong interest in being involved in indigenous health. Lauren has also been supported by the Wilto Yerlo Centre for Australian

Indigenous Research and Studies Adelaide University. Normally a very quiet person, Lauren has found that being in medicine has improved her confidence a lot due to the many presentations she has had to give. Studying medicine took some getting used to; the course is unlike other courses in that everything is integrated into one big course instead of being taught in invidual subjects. She has about 30 contact hours per week, plus up to 10 hours of tutorials through the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Tutoring Assistance Scheme, plus homework and study. She enjoyed her hospital visits and hearing people's stories and is looking forward to more opportunities for involvement and experience in indigenous health.

Natalie Moore is in her third year of her Bachelor of Health Science (Paramedics) degree course at Flinders University. Natalie's great grandmother on her father's side was a member of the small Nyikina tribe from the small town of Derby near Broome.

Natalie's paramedics course is three years full time followed by a 12-16 month internship. The comprises compulsory lectures, smaller group tutorials, scenario-based tutorials to help students develop their problem solving skills, a variety of "work experience" placements in emergency settings, cardio, and Communications Centre, etc. Her course is recognised internationally. In addition to the usual reasons like "saving lives" and "making a difference", what attracted Natalie to paramedics was the variety of work and situations she would encounter each day, the life-long learning experience and the challenges that would come her way.

Not all paramedical work is emergency based; much of it is setting people's minds at ease, helping elderly people who have had falls, referring people to appropriate services, and some unnecessary call-outs where an ambulance is not really required. Ambulance work is not all about driving fast with flashing lights and sirens and ignoring traffic lights and speed limits. But the job can be very stressful and the stress needs to be managed, especially when motorists start braking as soon as they see an ambulance in their rear vision mirror.

Natalie will complete her degree at the end of this year and she has been successful in obtaining a 15-month internship with SA Ambulance next year, starting in January. During her internship she will begin with non-emergency patient transport for 6-8 weeks, followed by a mix of emergency and patient transfer work, then full-on emergency work at which time she will be one of a two member crew with the full roles and responsibilities that entails. Natalie is considering doing her honours year during her internship, completing a Registered Nursing degree and subsequently doing a PhD researching use of drugs and other aspects of the pre-hospital setting, ultimately becoming an intensive care paramedic.

Chairman Joan presented Unley Rotary pens to Lauren and Natalie, for writing prescriptions etc. Many thanks to Chandra Sluggett for arranging for Lauren and Natalie to speak to the club; we look forward to their next update.

The Water Future for S.A. From the D9520 District Governor's Newsletter - August 08

On Saturday, 28th June 2008, the Rotary Club of Kent Town conducted a Water Forum at the St Peters Concert Hall. Approximately 100 people attended to hear a cross section of experienced speakers discuss the extent of the problems associated with the Murray. It is evident that South Australia is increasing its average maximum and minimum temperatures whilst the average rainfalls continue to decline. As a result plans are being designed to waterproof Adelaide's water supply past 2025, and also to address the immediate

plight of the Murray, particularly below Blanchetown. Recent inflows to the Murray are 68% down on average. Details of the work being undertaken by SA Water, regarding the Government's proposed Desalination Plant, were also explained in detail.

A representative from the Salisbury Council outlined the world class Wetland and Aquifer Recharge projects that have been running for some 20 years. This helps capture a large volume of storm water run off from escaping to the sea; one has to wonder why other councils aren't replicating this success. The Chair, SA Murray Irrigators, explained how local landholders were paying outrageous prices for just enough water to keep their crops alive, only to find that next season it was all over. His use of a bag of oranges to illustrate the pittance that growers receive compared to the huge "cut" enjoyed by middlemen, earned him a standing ovation.

The final speaker, Senator Nick Xenophon, spoke of the decades of mismanagement by the majority of State Governments, and put the Federal Government on notice that he would be focusing on the plight of the Murray when he assumed his position from the 1st July 2008. Everybody left the meeting totally convinced that the problem of the Murray is far more serious than anyone fully appreciates. Rotary received good coverage as Channel 9, The Advertiser and The Sunday Mail had representatives present throughout the Forum.
