RYPEN & RYLA Report - Wendy Gaborit

Wendy Gaborit, Past President of the Rotary Club of Mobilong and District Chair of the RYLA and RYPEN Committee, provided an update on happenings with the RYLA and RYPEN programs. RYPEN, Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment is about to undergo an acronym change as it is unique to Australia and possibly New Zealand and is not an authorised program of Rotary International program, so it's name has to change and henceforth, in accordance with RI protocol it will be known as Rotary District 9520 Youth Program of Enrichment until a new acronym can be created, so please help by coming up with something!

RYPEN has been in operation for a considerable number of years and Wendy has found that the program has a positive impact on the participants, enabling them to take away various learnings that help to prepare them for their final years of schooling and to set goals for the remainder of their lives. It is a weekend camp that for the last few years has been held at the Woodside Scout Camp at Piccadilly. After some getting-to-know-you exercises the youngsters participate in a range of workshops around communication, leadership, team building, goal setting, challenging their own personal goals and precepts, and getting to face some physical challenges as part of a team, such as "Challenge Hill". The weekend is largely led by Directors who are selected graduates of the RYLA program. The Directors plan and conduct the various activities in conjunction with volunteer instructors and supported by Host Parents, who this year will be Janet and Rohan Singh from the RC of Unley. The Host Parents have an important role in helping participants with any cultural, religious or emotional issues during the camp.

Unley will be contributing \$1,000 to this year's program and will also be cooking the barbeque dinner for the RYPENians; all members of the Club are encouraged to attend the barbeque and represent Rotary to the participants. Rotary clubs can sponsor a "RD9520PEN" participant for \$175 each.

RYLA is a week-long activity aimed at young people 18-25 years of age which is more intensive, again with a range of presenters and challenges. The program covers the areas of public speaking, communication, team building, problem solving, leadership development skills, goal setting, etc. Lectures are held in the morning and in the afternoon sessions are held with the Directors to reinforce the learning outcomes. A graduation dinner is held at the end of the program. Next year's program runs from Sat 18th to Fri 24th April. Rotary clubs can sponsor a RYLA awardee for \$450 each.

Guest Speaker: Graeme Smith

"Business Opportunities for Boomers and Beyond"

PP Geoff Hill introduced our guest speaker Graeme Smith to speak on "Business Opportunities for Boomers and Beyond". Graeme previously spoke to our Club in July last year on the topic of "Housing Australia's Seniors".

Since 1993 Graeme has increasingly targeted the consumer activity of mature age Australians to hone his expertise in marketing strategy and tactics, plan development and positioning, niche marketing, sales effectiveness and talent retention. After a corporate career, including 10 years with the Ford Motor Company and eight years in national sales and marketing roles, Graeme spent 15 years owning and operating franchise automotive dealerships, and since 1993 has been Managing Principal of Kaizen Consulting Group, including SeniorCoach.biz which assists Australian organisations to market to consumers aged 50+.

In concert with his role within SeniorCoach.biz, Graeme is an advocate for "helping Australia's Seniors stay put in their own homes forever". See Graeme's' website for more details.

Graeme defined 'Boomers Beyond' as people aged 44+ who today are numerically 25% of Australia's population yet control 50% of the total consumer buying power and own 75% the country's financial assets, largely caused by an extended period of rising house prices and unprecedented

levels of potential and actual inheritance. In their pivotal role as the financial, social and emotional epicentre of Australian families, boomers are the numerically largest age cohort in history and the most affluent, diverse and misunderstood of market segments. Their numbers are outweighed only by their spending power and their impact on culture and society.

As Australian companies leave behind their decades of youth obsessed marketing and employment recruitment strategy they typically approach the seniors market as one homogenous group with attempted segmentation limited to age as their chosen indicator of consumer behaviour. However, Graeme also segments that market by family commitments, financial position, health and mobility, lifestyle and work status.

He offered a word of warning to companies wanting to tackle the boomer generation as it was they who created consumer protection legislation and foot-in-the-door investigative journalism. Boomers are savvy to how marketing works and how to retaliate against a dubious advertising offer or promotional claim.

Graeme went on to outline the ten most dangerous myths of marketing to Australia's aging population and if any of this thinking persists in a business then alarm bells should be ringing very loudly.

The 10 Myths

 Our company's product, brand or service doesn't specifically target the mature age market; therefore our business is not affected by Australia's aging population.

- The senior market is a relatively homogenous group, but if it needs further segmentation, age is the obvious choice as an indicator of consumer behaviour.
- It is statistically true that the median age of Australia's population is increasing but happening so slowly that it won't be an issue in the short term.
- The Baby Boomers are so keen to spend their kids' inheritance that the marketing exercise to attract them is relatively straightforward.
- While the marketing message and media selections may need to be modified for Baby Boomers, the physical product and packaging is equally appropriate for all age groups.
- Older are not interested in technology and have no relevance in the current discussion of internet-based social networking activities.
- 7. There are no unique senior considerations when designing a website for the 50+ market.
- 8. Australia's seniors are keen to retire as soon as their financial position allows it.
- A company's inability to attract and retain mature age employees is solely HR's problem; it doesn't impact our marketing and sales performance.
- 10. In marketing to older Australians, what we call them is unimportant; boomers, seniors, retirees, mature age, golden oldies, elderly citizens, the message far outweighs the nomenclature.

Graeme proceeded to comprehensively debunk each of these myths and explain the attitude businesses should be taking to the Boomers and Beyond. He then responded to several questions from the floor.

Chairman Geoff Hill thanked Graeme for his thought provoking talk and presented him with an Unley Rotary pen.

Advocacy paying off in India's polio fight Rotary World - October 2008

If strong gains continue against polio in Uttar Pradesh, the northern Indian state may not have to bear the stigma of being the poliovirus capital of the world much longer. In 2007, India's most populous state not only accounted for almost 40 percent of the country's 864 polio cases but also more than a quarter of all cases worldwide.

Eighty percent of Uttar Pradesh's 339 cases that year occurred in the Muslim community. But a Rotary-led initiative helped drop that rate to 16 percent of 48 cases during the first four and a half months of 2008.

Overseeing Uttar Pradesh's effort to end the disease is the Ulema Committee for Polio Eradication, established by Rotary International in 2007. (Ulemas are leading Muslim experts in Islamic law.) The group has distributed a booklet published by the India PolioPlus Committee to Muslim clerics and school representatives that links polio immunization to the duties of parents as explained in the Quran.

Ulema Committee members have also visited districts in Uttar Pradesh with large numbers of polio cases to convince parents that the vaccine is safe and consistent with Islam.

"When we went to the slums, Rotary went with us. Rotary tried to understand the background of the resistance," says Nita Chowdhury, principle health secretary of Uttar Pradesh, explaining that Rotarians worked with other nongovernmental organizations to create an advocacy plan for the area. "Rotary is able to do this work because of the conviction people feel flowing from their actions."

Around the Rotary World Rotary World - October 2008

Sewing machines to Nicaragua: A cooperative of seamstresses in the mountain village of San Juan del Río Coco received six sewing machines and fabric from the Rotary Club of Rancho Bernardo Sunrise (San Diego), California, USA, in 2007. The co-op has used the pedal-operated machines to provide free sewing lessons to over 40 women, who have used their skills to produce and sell clothing. Casa Materna, a village shelter for expectant mothers, is using one machine to teach women to sew cloth diapers and blankets. Rotarian Nasrin Barbee led the San Diego club's effort to raise US\$2,500 for the sewing machines and other supplies for Casa Materna.

Mobility in Italy: The Rotary Club of Chiavari-Tigullio in February presented a wheelchair-accessible van to the Centro Benedetto Acquarone, a Roman Catholic health and assistance center serving 100 people. Provided with funds from the club, District 1780 (France), and The Rotary Foundation, the US\$47,000 van transports seven passengers, including two in wheelchairs. Within the last 10 years, the club has also helped fund two other accessible vehicles for nonprofit organizations.



Libraries across Turkey: Forty villages have received more than 30,000 books as a result of Turkish Rotarians' efforts to set up libraries across the country. The Rotary Club of Bursa-Tophane, with support from District 2440 and several other Rotary clubs, has delivered books and cabinets worth US\$60,000 to areas previously lacking libraries. Rotarians collected books from households and government facilities and enlisted other organizations to work toward establishing 150 libraries by the end of 2008. The club also sent 400 Turkish books and CDs to the Rotary Club of Ramos Mejia Sur, Buenos Aires, Argentina, for its multilingual library project.
