Joint Christmas Meeting

This week's meeting was the annual Christmas joint breakfast meeting of the Rotary Clubs of Unley, Hyde Park and Eastwood. This year the meeting was hosted by the Unley club.

Pres. Jerry welcomed the members of the Rotary clubs of Hyde Park and Eastwood, in particular Richard DeGaris, President of the Rotary Club of Hyde Park, and Judy Hare, President of the Rotary Club of Eastwood. Special guests at this meeting were our District Governor Peter and Margaret Shipp and Assistant Governor for Group 6, Roy and Marilyn Armstrong.

DG Peter commented on the Donations In Kind project to provide soft toys at Christmas for indigenous children in the Northern Territory. DIK Chair Norm O'Flaherty's ambitious target of 3,000-4,000 toys was passed with Districts 9500 and 9520 "Making Dreams Real" for 17,000 children. Now Norm is looking to go national next year, so even more soft toys will need to be found for next Christmas. DG Peter also reported that 47 Operation Cleft operations in Bangladesh have now been funded.

Guest Speaker - Pastor Richard Haar: "What's the Meaning of Christmas?"

Pres Jerry introduced our guest speaker Richard Haar, the Senior Pastor at St John's Lutheran Church, Malvern. Pastor Richard had officiated at Ron Schubert's funeral the day before this meeting. Richard came to Australia from New Zealand in 1977 and after completing his seminary studies went to Papua New Guinea as a missionary, which is probably a good reason for Rotary clubs to invite him to be a guest speaker. He has been in Adelaide for 12 years and is married with two children, one studying law at the University of Adelaide and the other just finishing year nine.

Richard began his talk by acknowledging Ron Schubert and the contribution he made during his life to our community and to the lives of those close to him. It was Ron who asked Richard to speak to us this morning about the meaning of Christmas, not just as a Christian celebration but as a celebration that is embraced by the whole of the community.

Christmas is about peace and goodwill. Christmas transcends religious affiliation and embraces everyone, which is fitting from a Christian perspective because Christmas is a message for all humanity. When we think about Christmas we think about peace and goodwill, so Rotarians should be great

supporters of Christmas because that is what Rotary is all about, encouraging peace and goodwill in our local community. Although peace and goodwill may sound a bit clichéd, when we think about some of the terrible things that happen in our world, for example the recent events in Mumbai, we need so many more people committed to peace, goodwill, justice and treating each other with respect. And so Christmas is a time when we reflect on the importance of that message and to live it out. And of course that message is anchored in the events of Christmas. We know the story of the angel's announcement to the shepherds that the saviour of the world was born and that God's peace and goodwill was towards humanity and we are invited to share in that.

Christmas is about family and bringing the family together, so it is also fitting that the 'Grandma' (Unley), 'Mother' (Hyde Park) and 'Granddaughter' (Eastwood) clubs should get together at Christmas, making those connections and feeling that we are one family together. And hopefully the peace and goodwill also extends to families. Sometimes after lunch on Christmas day the peace and goodwill gets strained a bit when families get together, particularly if they haven't seen each other for most of the year and after a few glasses of red or 'coldies' there can sometimes be a distinct lack of peace and goodwill amongst families, sadly, and some tensions. So at Christmas is worth considering how we are going to treat each other, how are we going to build bridges between people who maybe during the year don't have much to do with each other because there are certain underlying problems. Christmas is about transcending some of those barriers and about reconnecting, which goes back again to the heart of the Christmas message about God joining the human families, the story about the divine taking on [the flesh and blood of] humanity; the whole intent of that is that God wants us to be part of His family, to draw us into a relationship with Himself. God's whole intent is wrapped up in a little baby called Jesus.

Christmas is about gifts. With apologies to those in the retail business, sometimes Christmas gets completely out of control and becomes a spending frenzy. Venturing into the political arena Richard questioned the idea of giving everyone on pensions a huge Christmas gift when, in our present economic crisis, commentators are saying that we globally are in this problem because people have overspent and we have lived beyond our means and there has to be this massive correction, we want to fix this problem by getting people to spend more. That doesn't make sense.

Christmas is about giving, but people have lost the idea about giving and think that the most important thing is getting gifts. One of the core values of Rotary is about giving to make a difference, about being committed to giving someone else a hand up and to helping one another have better lives. As we get older we discover that, as much as it's nice to get a good gift from someone, it's nothing quite like the pleasure of seeing the joy of someone else when you give them a gift or the joy of touching another person's life and enriching their journey. So gifts are more about giving than receiving, which links in again to the Christmas story of the wise men who presented their gifts to the baby Jesus. A bit later in history there is the story of the Christian Saint Nicholas, known for giving gifts to poor families and who would go through villages at night and throw coins through the windows so that people could have some help and blessing at Christmas. In the last 100 years or so St Nicholas has morphed into Santa Claus who oddly comes with a message that if you are not good you won't get any presents from him at Christmas. What a tragic message to send our children, that you earn you Christmas gifts by your good behaviour. That's the opposite of Christmas, which is about Mum and Dad giving you a gift because they love you. But the message we should give to our children is that the real gift is not what comes wrapped up in the parcel but what comes wrapped in our hearts and the love and connection that we have for our children.

Sadly in our society there is a sense of entitlement, that you deserve your Christmas gifts, that you deserve the holiday break, that somehow by being good you get that wonderful reward. Christmas is a message of God's love for humanity, irrespective of our behaviour. It is not that we are so good that God should come and share in our humanity in the baby Jesus; it is because God is so good that he wants to share himself with us. The most important gift that we can give at Christmas is ourselves, our time, our heart and connecting together. If we do that then Christmas will truly be peaceful, joyful and everything we want it to be.

Rotary Action Group Joins AIDS prevention effort

Rotarians for Fighting AIDS (RFFA), a Rotarian Action Group, has joined a broad coalition of organizations in a new initiative designed to combat the spread of AIDS among young people. Coordinated by the U.S. government, Partnership for an HIV-Free Generation is bringing together public- and private-sector leaders to create marketing campaigns that will promote healthy living among at-risk youth, and to monitor the effectiveness of the messages with cutting-edge market research. The initiative is being launched in Nairobi, Kenya, with the goal of reducing new HIV infections in 10- to 24-year-olds by 50 percent during the next five years. In addition, participating organizations will provide mentoring and promote business and educational opportunities for youth.

"Never before have so many top-quality private-sector organizations banded together with the U.S. government to make a difference in reducing HIV infection among youth," says Marion Bunch, RFFA chair. "We are proud to be a part of this leading-edge program, which has a chance of creating a best-practice model for dramatically reducing HIV infections in all of Sub-Saharan Africa."

According to Partnership for an HIV-Free Generation, youth are particularly at risk of contracting AIDS, because they lack information and education and have a low perception of the risk. They also tend to have less access to, and make less use of, health care services.

RFFA will mobilize volunteers at the grassroots to mentor and counsel Nairobi's young people, while working to improve health care and education opportunities. "RFFA will develop more Rotary Community Corps and mentor them, because these groups actually live and work in the targeted slum areas and get the right messages through to the youth more readily than the Rotary club members," says Bunch. According to the partnership, girls are particularly at risk of AIDS, for biological, cultural, and sociological reasons. In many countries, infection rates are two to eight times higher for girls.

Economic empowerment is seen as part of the solution. Bunch says Rotarians will provide job counseling, job leads, and information on how to start a microbusiness. And Rotarian business leaders will work with government officials to improve the quality of schools. Warner Bros. has created an interactive, multiplayer computer game to show teens how to identify and avoid risky behaviors.

It is incumbent upon them-and upon all Rotarians who travel internationally-to act in accordance with this Mission Statement and so extend the goal of international peace and understanding wherever they travel and with whomever they come in contact with.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu to Speak at 2009 Peace Symposium From the RI Website

The Rotary Foundation has announced that Archbishop Emeritus Desmond Tutu of South Africa will be the keynote speaker at the 2009 Rotary World Peace Symposium on 18 June in Birmingham, England. Tutu, a Nobel Peace Prize recipient, will address Rotarians and Rotary peace programs alumni on the challenges of peace-building.

Rotary's peace symposium, a preconvention event scheduled for 18-19 June, will focus on issues related to migration and refugees, recovery and development, and the role of religion and ethnicity.

The Rotary World Peace Fellowships program is a peace studies initiative that provides the next generation of leaders and diplomats with the skills needed to resolve conflicts and promote peace. Attending alumni are dedicating their careers to preventing and resolving the root causes of conflict, such as poverty, hunger, illiteracy, and environmental degradation.
