Sergeant's Session

Once again our Sergeant Bob Laws hit our Rotarians hard in the name of good works. Norm Wallace won the wine and Stephen Baker won the Lucky Square.

Guest Speaker: Tony Wight - "Australian Poetry Recital"

Chairperson for the evening, Joan Reed, introduced our guest speaker Tony Wight to present three Australian poems: 'Clancy of the Overflow', The Songs of a Sentimental Bloke: The Play' and 'The Man from Snowy River'. Tony began his presentation with some background information about each of the poems and their authors. He then presented the three poems followed by an encore.

Clancy of the Overflow by A.B. Banjo Paterson

The title of the poem comes from the address of a letter that the city-dweller Banjo Paterson sends, "The Overflow" being the name of the sheep station where Clancy was working when they met. The poem is based on a true story that was experienced by Paterson. He was working as a lawyer when someone asked him to send a letter to a man named Thomas Gerald Clancy, asking for a payment that was never received. Banjo sent the letter to "The Overflow" and soon received a reply that provided him with the inspiration for the poem, along with the meter.

I had written him a letter which I had, for want of better Knowledge, sent to where I met him down the Lachlan, years ago, He was shearing when I knew him, so I sent the letter to him, Just `on spec', addressed as follows, `Clancy, of The Overflow'.

And an answer came directed in a writing unexpected, (And I think the same was written with a thumb-nail dipped in tar) 'Twas his shearing mate who wrote it, and verbatim I will quote it: `Clancy's gone to Queensland droving, and we don't know where he are.'

The Songs of a Sentimental Bloke: The Play by C.J. Dennis.

The 'sentimental bloke' is a Melbourne larrikin, who vows to abandon his life of gambling and drinking when he falls in love with Doreen, who works in a pickle factory. In the poems we also meet Ginger Mick, the Bloke's mate. The narrative poems describe various episodes and incidents in the group's lives and relationships. The poems are written in the vernacular of the street gangs and working class of the day, around 1916.

One story is based around the Bloke and Doreen going to a play, *Romeo and Juliet*, with Doreen identifying with the romance, while the Bloke admires the fight scenes more.




The Book Cover
