Guest Speaker: PDG Euan Miller

"Update on The Rotary Foundation"

Chairman David Middleton introduced Past District Governor Euan Miller to present an update on the operations of The Rotary Foundation.

Euan is a member of the Rotary Club of Norwood and in 2004-05 was District Governor of D9520. His day job is as Deputy Commissioner for Consumer Affairs for SA. He is Chair of the Grants Committee of TRF and Promotional Chair for RAWCS for Districts 9520 and 9500.

Euan Miller: The mission of The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty. It is a not for profit organisation supported solely voluntary contributions from Rotarians friends of the Foundation throughout the world. TRF was set up in 1917 by Arch Klumpf from the Rotary Club of Cleveland, USA. From an initial

endowment of \$26.50 TRF funds have since grown dramatically, particularly following the death of Paul Harris in 1947, the year that the first Ambassadorial Scholarships were granted.

As TRF is run as a trust there are strict requirements on accountability for how the Foundation's money is spent, which is where the goats come in. The inability of Rotary Clubs in D9520 and in Nepal to account for the whereabouts of some TRF funded breeding goats for Nepal resulted in D9520 being black-listed by TRF until the goats could be located and accounted for; a salutary warning for all.

In 1957 the concept of Paul Harris Fellows was implemented, which led to a continuing uplift in contributions to TRF.

Group Study Exchange and Matching Grants, such as for the recent project undertaken by Unley and the Rotary Club of Dharmavaran, India, were set up in 1965.

In 1978 the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3H) Program was set up to provide some large grants to fund projects such as the current anti-malaria campaign in the Solomon Islands. The 3H program was suspended in the 1990s due to loss of fund earnings during a recession and issuing of grants only resumed three years ago.

In 1985 the PolioPlus campaign came into being with the objective of ridding the world of polio. This has now been

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achieved in all but four countries: Afghanistan, India, Nigeria and Pakistan.

In 2002 the Rotary Peace Fellows program commenced and now funds peace studies scholars at seven universities around the world, including in Queensland, Australia.

Up to 2008 more than US\$1 billion has been raised for TRF's various funds: Annual Programs Fund (47%), Permanent Fund (6%) and other (1%). Currently fundraising exceeds US\$200 million per year. Rotary Australia's Centurion Fund is part of the "Every Rotarian Every Year" campaign that aims to have Rotarians donate A\$100 to TRF each year. Currently TRF grants are distributed 61% to the PolioPlus campaign, 27% to

Humanitarian grants, 11% to Educational grants and 1% to other activities.

The current Global Financial Crisis has caused a significant drop in TRF fund income and TRF trustees have announced a significant drop in the level of grants for the foreseeable future.

Euan concluded by relating the full story of the goats in Nepal along with the salutary lessons learned, particularly the value of Rotary changing presidents every year. The money provided by TRF to Rotary clubs for our projects is given in trust and so must be managed and accounted for carefully.

Thanks Euan for a most interesting briefing on TRF.

Recognition of Paul Harris Fellows

Chairman David Middleton opened Paul Harris Fellows Recognitions segment of the meeting by acknowledging the mission of



The Rotary Foundation.

David Middleton: The mission of The Rotary Foundation is to enable Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill, and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education, and the alleviation of poverty.

The Foundation is a not-for-profit corporation supported solely by voluntary contributions from Rotarians and friends of the Foundation who share its vision of a better world.

Tonight we heard from Euan Miller about the role and recent achievements of The Rotary Foundation.

A Paul Harris Fellow is awarded in recognition of a donation of US\$1,000 to the Projects Fund of The Rotary Foundation. In Australia it is the custom for Rotary club's to make such donations on behalf of persons whom the club wishes to recognise for their contributions to Rotary and/or the community. It is the highest award that a Rotary club can make. The awarding of a Paul Harris Fellow is not restricted to Rotarians.

David then asked Rotarians and guests to acknowledge and toast the many Paul Harris Fellows present at this special meeting.

Chairman David then introduced President Jerry who proceeded to award three Paul Harris Fellows.

The first PHF awardee was **Bob Mills**, a Rotarian who is well known to members of this club for his continued involvement in a variety of activities and who has always contributed to the control and running of the club's activities. He became a member of Rotary in 1979.

Since that time Bob has chaired every committee and held most Board positions, culminating in Presidency of the club in 1994/95. During that year the Rotunda was rebuilt in the Unley Memorial Gardens. From 1997 to 1999 he was Assistant District Governor. For the past eight years he has managed the Police Officer of the Year programme working alongside Bill Rojas, then of SAPOL. For a similar period he has been the club's Historian.

Bob Mills had already been made a Paul Harris Fellow for his devotion to Rotary and the Community. Pres. Jerry asked the club to applaud Bob's commitment to the Police Officer of the Year project and awarded him a Sapphire Pin in recognition of this work. It was also nice to note that he was receiving this award on his birthday.

The next awardee was **Stephen Westgarth**, a Rotarian who has been with Unley Rotary since 1995. As with Bob, he has served the club on the Board for many years and chaired several committees. Stephen has also served as Thrift Shop Committee Chairman, as the "best Bulletin Editor in District 9520, possibly Australia", and as our club's Webmaster since 2001.

Stephen became President in 2006/07, a difficult year for the club and one which he skilfully navigated leaving the club stronger.

Not many of us can lay claim to having a suburb (Westgarth in Melbourne) named after their family, but he can. His only failing may be that he barracks for the Western Bulldogs.

The final awardee was **Bill Rojas**, a non Rotarian. Married with one daughter Bill now lives in Canberra serving the Federal Police as Ceremonial and Protocol Officer. His career with the police began in 1987 on joining SAPOL. First working in Financial Services and then Protocol he managed Special Events for the next 11 years, which involved coordinating activity with the Rotary club of Unley for the Police Officer of the Year Award.

It is now our chance to recognise Bill Rojas for his dedication and support over that time as we award him a Paul Harris Fellowship.

Pres. Jerry then presented the awardees for the Paul Harris Fellow for 2008/09 to the assembled Rotarians and guests.

Constitution & By Laws

From the DG's March Newsletter

CONSTITUTION: The only amendments the club can make to the standard Rotary club constitution are the name and/or the locality of the club, and then only subject to approval by the Board of Rotary International. If the club does not wish to modify either, no further amendment is required but the club must adopt the revised constitution (to retain membership in RI) and report that to the relevant Government agency for incorporated bodies.

Some examples of amendments made to the standard club constitution at the last Council on Legislation included:

A new article 5 on Four Avenues of Service is inserted with subsequent renumbering;

- 10.5(b) a future club President becomes President-elect on 1 July in the year before taking office as President (even if no successor has then been appointed);
- 10.5(c) a President-elect may not assume office as President if required training has not been completed, in which case the previous President must continue in office as President:
- 12.4(1) a member must attend or makeup at least 50% of club regular meetings in each half of the year;
- 12.4(2) Assistant Governors are excused from the requirement to attend at least 30% of club meetings.

It is recommended all club Board members make themselves aware of the full text of the current standard club constitution.

BYLAWS: The club can (and may have in the past) amend the standard club Bylaws approved by Rotary International, provided such amendments are not in conflict with the Constitution and Bylaws of RI and the Constitution of the club.

Bylaw amendments include:

- Board: variations now allow a club to include or exclude Directors and the Vice President on the Board:
- 3.1 Directors and Officers: a revised final sentence to state when a person can take the title of President-elect;
- 4.4 Secretary: wording of duties varied to include paying per capita dues to RI;
- 11 Leave of Absence: delete reference to specific clauses of the Constitution in the footnote.

VARIOUS:

- Amend changes due to renumbering of Articles in the Constitution:
- A number of clubs, because they use the model RI Constitution, refer to the requirements of the SA Associations Incorporations Act 1985 in their Bylaws. If this is the case with your club Bylaws, you will need to send a copy of the amended Bylaws to the Office of Consumer and Business Affairs each time a change is made.

Walking to Beat Polio

Bad weather and loneliness couldn't keep Hans Wiesner from completing his Walk to Beat Polio. The Canadian Rotarian encountered headwinds of 15 miles per hour and near-freezing temperatures during the toughest part of his 620-mile journey along the Via de la Plata, part of an ancient network of trails in northwestern Spain used by pilgrims to reach the cathedral in Santiago de Compostela.

"I thought about quitting, but I really had no choice but to keep going," he recalls. "At the point of the journey I was at, there is really nothing around you anyway. What inspired me most was all the people who were supporting me: Rotarians from all the clubs in District 5360 [parts of Alberta; Saskatchewan, Canada]."

Wiesner, a member of the Rotary Club of Red Deer East, Alberta, completed his 35-day Walk to Beat Polio in November, raising C\$54,000 (about A\$62,500) for Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge to benefit PolioPlus. Before the walk, he visited roughly half the clubs in his district and e-mailed the others to donations.

The idea for the walk stemmed from a trip Wiesner completed in 2007 on the same network, called the Camino de

Santiago (Way of St. James), shortly after he retired as a chemical engineer. He says he made the journey as a personal challenge and for spiritual reasons.

After joining his club later that year, Wiesner thought about repeating the trip. A close friend, who had served as best man in his wedding, contracted polio as a child. The friend survived, but was weakened by the disease. "He was born in 1944, I in 1945. We went through the era where a lot of people got polio," Wiesner recalls. "I was fortunate, he was not. It seemed like a nice segue using this walk to raise funds for PolioPlus."

Wiesner feels positive about the whole experience of preparing for and doing the walk. He is happy with the amount he raised, which he calls "a fair chunk of change," and is already planning future hikes in France and Spain.


Today I was almost successful in an attempt to assassinate one of my tormentors by weaving around his feet as he was walking. I
