Guest Speaker: Bob Ellis - "The Curse of Land Mines"

Introduction: Chairman Colin Schirmer introduced our guest speaker Bob Ellis to talk on the subject of "The Curse of Land Mines". Bob is President of the Viet Nam Veterans Federation and a member of the State Minister for Veterans Affairs Advisory Committee. He joined the Army in 1963 and in 1965 he began a tour in Viet Nam with the Field Engineers. He then moved into administration and left the Army in 1993 with the rank of Major and joined the Reserves, finally retiring in 2000. Bob is married with four adult children and his main hobby has been motor bikes (he once owned 49) and he is a member of the Viet Nam Veterans Motorcycle Club. He is Head Trainer for the North Adelaide FC and an accomplished quilter.

Bob Ellis: Bob began and concluded his talk by outlining the activities of the Viet Nam Veterans Federation which represents veterans in dealings with the Department of Veterans Affairs and supports social and craft activities among its members and provides charitable support for people in need in Viet Nam.

Bob believes that mines in any shape or form are abominations, but it is only relatively recently that world organisations have begun to realise this and promote the abolition of land mines.

Anti-personnel mines are aimed at people and range from the size of a Vegemite jar (M14 mine) lid to a jam tin (M16 mine). Often made of plastic and containing only tiny metal parts, the small M14 mines are difficult to detect and often you only become aware they have been laid when someone steps on one.

Anti-personal mines are designed to maim rather than kill. Regardless of who you are, whether soldier, farmer, animal or service person of some kind, if your foot is blown off you are effectively removed from the conflict and maimed people require many people, often for years, to care for them compared to a

corpse. M16 "Bouncing Betty" or "Jumping Jack" mines are designed to kill the person who steps on them and to maim and injure anyone within a radius of up to a hundred metres. The M14 and M16 mines were designed in the USA which has a total stock of around 3 million mines and which, along with several other countries, is opposed to their abolition.

Mines are still made in a number of countries and are still in widespread use. The rules of war impose restrictions on the use of mines, but these are often ignored.

Metal detectors and attempts at electronic devices to locate, remove or explode mines are only partially effective. So finding and clearing

"wild" mines and mine fields remains slow, dirty and dangerous work mostly carried out by volunteers probing the ground on hands and knees.

An effective, universally adopted treaty to abolish land mines permanently has yet to be achieved. Until there is such a treaty, and/or all mines are cleared, people in current and former conflict areas around the world will continue to die or be maimed in large numbers on a daily basis. Bob urged everyone to support organisations that are committed to the abolition and clearing of land mines.

Great Australian Bike Ride Reportage

From the DG's April Newsletter

The ride departed from Melbourne on the 21 March 2009 and, after 17,875km travelling anticlockwise around Australia, will arrive back in Melbourne on 10 October 2009.

The aims of the GABR are:

- To promote mental health and well being to promote Rotary, the organization and its Clubs;
- To promote Australian Rotary Health, a pre-eminent body in the provision of funds for medical research "In Australia, by Australians, for Australians;" and
- To convey a health message about fitness and cycling.

Dick Wilson, ARH Regional Coordinator, is the stage manager for the SA section of the ride. The riders and crew will cross the WA border on Thursday 10 September, arrive in Adelaide on Thursday 24 September, and leave again on Sunday 27 September for Nuriootpa.

Prof. Michael Sawyer, an Honorary Member from the RC Mitcham and Chairman of the ARH Research Fund, will be riding from Adelaide to Melbourne.

Another rider Robin O'Donnell, a non-Rotarian, took part in the last D9520 Conference "Fund Ride" from Strathalbyn to Mt Gambier as part of the Lonsdale EFM team. He is looking for sponsorship so that he can join the GABR so if anyone wants to help out, please call Dick Wilson.

Watch this space – there are big plans afoot when the GABR is in Adelaide. Many Rotary Clubs en route are already involved in hosting and raising money for ARH.

Hopes of raising \$1 million for mental health research have helped propel a group of cyclists through the Border. Rotary's Great Australian Bike Ride began in Melbourne on March 21 and travelled from Rutherglen to Henty yesterday. Ride director Geoff Kennedy said four cyclists would ride the almost 18,000km journey, which is expected to take 204 days, with others joining at various stages. Fourteen riders passed through the Border en route to Sydney.

The cyclists enjoyed their first rest day in two weeks at Rutherglen on Saturday. "...the Rotary club in Rutherglen took us on a couple of winery tours - we all certainly

appreciated the day's break," he said.

The ride is expected to end in Melbourne on October 10.

Daily Advertiser, Wagga Wagga - 6 April 2009

Eight Rotary bike riders will leave `Wagga today on a 17,800 kilometre tour around Australia to raise money for mental health research. The riders stopped in Wagga last night after visiting Henty and Lockhart, and will today travel to Junee and Cootamundra.

Starting in Melbourne, the Great Australian Bike Ride aims to raise awareness and money for mental health and ends on Mental Health Day in October.

More than 100 riders have, registered to take part, but only four will ride the entire distance, over 204 days, visiting every Rotary district in the country.

Rotary Founder: Paul Harris

Born in Racine, Wisconsin, USA, on 19 April 1868, Paul P. Harris was the second of six children of George N. and Cornelia Bryan Harris.


At age three, he moved to Wallingford, Vermont, where he grew up in the care of his paternal grandparents, Howard and Pamela Harris. He attended the University of Vermont and Princeton University and received his law degree from the University of Iowa in 1891.

While he was in school, both of Harris's grandparents died, and he spent the five years after graduation traveling around the country and working odd jobs. After arriving penniless in San Francisco in 1891, he worked as a reporter for the *San Francisco Chronicle* and then as a ranch hand, grape picker, actor, and cowboy. He was also a hotel night clerk in Jacksonville, Florida, and a traveling marble and granite salesman.

In 1896, he settled in Chicago and opened a law practice. Along with Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey, he founded the Rotary Club of Chicago in 1905 and was elected its president in 1907.

Club membership grew rapidly. Many members were originally from small towns and found an opportunity for fellowship in the Chicago club. Harris was convinced that the club could be expanded into a service movement and strove to extend Rotary to other communities.

In 1910, he met Jean Thompson during an outing with the Prairie Club, a Chicago-based organization

for wilderness enthusiasts. Harris and Thompson married three months later and settled on Chicago's South Side.

In the same year, the National Association of Rotary Clubs was formed, and Harris was elected its first president. He held the office for two years and afterward became president emeritus, serving as the public face of the organisation and promoting membership extension and service around the world.

He wrote several books about Rotary and his life and travels, including *The Founder of Rotary* and *This Rotarian Age.*

In addition to his work with Rotary, Harris was involved in other civic organizations, including the Chicago Association of Commerce and Industry, City Club of Chicago, Chicago Bar Association, Prairie Club, and Easter Seals. He was also recognized by the Boy Scouts of America and honored by the governments of Brazil, Chile, the Dominican Republic, Ecuador, and Peru

Harris died on 27 January 1947, leaving a rich legacy of fellowship, professionalism, service, and friendship. His passing also sparked an outpouring of donations to The Rotary Foundation from all over the world, allowing the Foundation to greatly expand its programs and services.


Two nuns in Transylvania
