Spot Speakers

Hon Member Mayor Richard Thorne & Jennifer Thorne spoke about the work their niece Emma has been doing in Nepal.

Emma Taylor was born and educated in Adelaide at Annesley College, but four years ago gave up a successful corporate career to work amongst the poor in Kathmandu. This came about following a six week stint as an orphanage volunteer during which she was so appalled by the conditions the children were living under that she decided she could do better for them.

She now not only houses and cares for 79 orphaned and abandoned children, but has breakfast every morning with some of the rough, tough, glue addicted street kids, and visits the local river bank slums where she has organised immunisation, health checks, schooling and vocational training for the people who live there. She runs a sponsorship program for her orphanage children, and now wants to buy land and build - accommodation, school and vocational training centre, all of which she hopes will eventually become self-sustainable.

The fundraiser is on Saturday, 25^{th} July - 6:30 for 7 pm start – at Gillingham Hall, Annesley College, Cnr. King William & Greenhill Roads, Wayville - cost \$110, which includes a 3 course meal from award winning restaurant 'Beyond India', live music, dancing and entertainment, with MC Sonya Feldhoff from ABC Radio, and speaker Duncan Chessell, adventurer and mountaineer. IPP David Middleton: Looking back over the past year

IPP David Middleton introduced his review of the club's past year by saying how a year ago he had stood in the very same location at the end of his year as President, looking forward to one year as Immediate Past President before toddling off into welcome obscurity. That dream will be unfulfilled. David went on to say:

Usually, at the meeting before changeover it is customary for the Immediate Past President to propose a vote of thanks to the outgoing President. But this year we have a different situation.

Jerry Casburn has indeed been an excellent President of the Rotary Club of Unley and as you all know he will continue in that role for a further year. This is a first for this club. In fact, our 75th year will be only the second where we will have a President who has served in that role previously and the first where this has happened in consecutive years.

It is my happy duty tonight to confirm Jerry's appointment to the role of President for 2009/ 2010 and in doing so to reflect on the achievements of our club over the past twelve months.

Jerry has prepared his President's report for the 2008/2009 Rotary Year and it will soon appear on the club's website. In his report Jerry displays the torment that besieges all who have served in the role of president. The speed of the year's passing, the achievements of the club that have been notable, but are offset by the disappointment of ambitions unfulfilled.

In reality, Jerry has a lot to be proud of.

After meeting at the same location for a long, long time, the club has had four homes in as many years. This year we successfully relocated to Tiffins on the Park and the club is operating well in this new environment.

The club has operated efficiently in the course of the year seeking to Make Dreams Real for those in need. With seventy five years of tradition, well established processes along with our committed members, the Rotary Club of Unley continues to make a meaningful contribution to both our local and international communities.

In the past year fund raising has remained strong with good results from our main revenue raiser, the Thrift Shop. This is largely due to the ongoing efforts of the Thrift Shop committee headed by Bob Laws.

Our Service Teams were ably led by Reno Elms (Community), Chandra Sluggett (International) and Stephen Baker (Vocational and New Generations). Traditional events, such as the Carols at the Rotunda and the Police Officer of the Year were implemented with commendable efficiency. But there are also new initiatives, many of which will come to fruition in the coming year.

Prior to my year, the President of the time, Stephen Westgarth, Jerry and I had a very long three hour meeting in the confines of Stephen's car (Sheila Evans was also there). We decided to implement the new Club Leadership Plan. We were committed to the concept, and in Jerry's first year he has sought to consolidate this change.

The Leadership Plan forces the Board to focus on the future rather than the present. In fact, the present operations of the club are largely left to the talented management of the various club committees. The future is all about finances, membership and public relations and the Directors with these specific roles have worked well in the past year.

Perhaps our greatest success was in the area of membership and the club has increased in size by four members in the past twelve months

Considerable effort was expended investigating the possibility of broadening our revenue base with a Family Fun Day at the Adelaide Showgrounds. In the end it was a stretch too far for the club and, while this is a disappointment, it is not a failure.

Sometimes the best decision is to not take on more than you can achieve and to continue looking for ways to improve.

The greatest testament to the success of the past year is that the club remains in high spirits. Attendance at club meetings was higher than in the previous year and the weekly meeting program has continued to impress. The club's committees are working hard and all members are contributing in many diverse ways to assist the club achieve success.

Jerry, you have had an excellent year and the members have enjoyed having you as our President. We thank you for your efforts and look forward to the coming year.

IPP David invited all present to toast President Jerry Casburn.

Throughout the year, as Jerry ably fulfilled the role of president, he was, at the same time, working with Jenn in the family business. This has, no doubt, put added pressure on Jenn and her support for Jerry has helped the club immeasurably. The club expressed by acclamation its thanks for Jenn's support in the past year and in anticipation of the year to come.

"Er, no!" said the Council, "that car park is your responsibility."


"Er, no!" said Bristol Zoo Management, "the attendant was employed by the City Council, wasn't he?"
