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Guest Speaker - Birendra Bhandari: "My RYLA Experience"

Introduction: Chairman Stephen Baker introduced Birendra Bhandari to speak on his experiences at this year's RYLA Seminar. Birendra comes from the north west province of Nepal and is living here in Adelaide while he studies International Studies - majoring in International Relations - at Flinders University. His parents and an older sister are back in Nepal. Before coming to Australia, Birendra was a member of Rotaract. He was sponsored to attend RYLA by the Rotary Club of Unley.

Birendra Bhandari gave us a comprehensive report on his week at the 2009 RYLA Seminar, complete with photos of the various happenings.

Saturday: Following its formal opening by District 9520 District Governor Peter Shipp, president of Brownhill Creek, Richard Heathcote, and district chair Wendy Gaborit on Monday morning, RYLA 2009 commenced with Lieutenant Governor Hieu Van Le's inspiring life story. He made the point that life is rarely predictable, offering many unexpected and challenging opportunities. His struggle from a Vietnamese refugee, a navigator to the governor of South Australia was, I think, very inspiring to many RYLArians. The skits by different groups in the evening, was wonderful, whereby everyone got an opportunity to show their acting skills.

Sunday: On Sunday morning, Michael Hourigan took course members through a cycle of stories- some horrible, some motivating; from Rwanda to Iraq. The sweatshop stories and the child labour stories made us realise that were directly or indirectly responsible. Helen Liebelt, Jackie Stewart and Anna Peshanoff taught us the right ways of spending money and gave a concept on Community Banks. That evening, we were introduced to Bush Dancing (Old Gum Tree-0) by Chris McCrea and team. It was awesome.

Monday: The Monday morning introduced all the participants to a planned series of physical activities and self-defence techniques. That very cold evening took us to orienteering to Belair National Park. With torches in hands and darkness around, it was an unforgettable experience. With loads of exercise the whole day long, everyone was eager to bed. The following morning many of us were fined for late rising.

Tuesday: David Griggs taught RYLArians some of the best advice they'll ever get on public speaking and involved us in interesting activities. His oratory skills were in a true sense highly practical and useful.. In the evening, all the directors in their amazing outfits took us to rounds of adventures. We walked down the ramp clad with the best newspaper designs made in half-an hour. Hilarious!

Wednesday: After breakfast, Phil Hoffman, brainwashed us on leadership values, and then Bob Kearney's lessons on team building were fascinating. Bob spoke about the significant difficulties of leadership in the 2009 Victoria Bushfire — probably the greatest test of management that he had ever faced. The pinnacle of creativity was the Wednesday evening. We were told to make anything we wished n connect that to our story. The set was marvelous. The lights were switched off, the only source of

light was the candles in the middle; the beds lay around. We were there with our pillows and blankets. No cameras! Absolute silence! Many came with heart-wrenching stories ... the stories of their lives in the refugee camps, how they narrowly escaped bombings, member of the family missing, neglected by the family, stories of hunger, the diseases they are fighting with and many more.

Thursday: On Thursday morning, Liz Williamson spoke on Conflict resolution. Wendy Gaborit introduced us to different Social Cultural issues, the aborigines, their situation, lifestyles, and their territories in Australia.

After the lunch, we prepared a skit for the much awaited Graduation Dinner at the Belair Country Club. All were dressed in their best outfit. The sponsors, the directors, the secretaries, the DG, the presidents were all there along with the participants. All the RYLArians were recognized with a certificate of participation. Lots of photos and of course lots of drinks. The skit was there at the end. A night ... so special.

Friday: It was the last day of our seminar. Many of us were sad to leave behind such a beautiful family we made. Funds were raised for a charity. Unwillingly, we started packing up and cleaning the site at 10 am. The directors guided us to life after RYLA. We had the last lunch together at 12:30 and the official closure was announced at 1:30. Lots of hugs and photos. We exchanged our mailing addresses and phone numbers. A long, strenuous and very full week concluded!

Besides the morning bagpipes' MUST wakeup calls, the yoga classes, the fining sessions, the Q/As at the dinner, the warm fuzzies and the lollies... everything was wonderful.

Message from District Governor Dick Cuttle

Welcome to 2009-10, where you hold the "Future of Rotary in Your Hands". RI President John Kenny is asking each of us to share the responsibility for the current and future success of Rotary, through active club participation, effective service programs and projects, through a modest increase in membership, and through continuing support for our Rotary Foundation and our PolioPlus program. None of the targets John has set are beyond us, and I am confident that we can build on the recent successful years we have enjoyed.

I would like to formally congratulate Bruce Richardson and Kathy following Bruce's appointment as DGE for 2011-12. Bruce has extensive knowledge of many District Committees through his role as District Secretary for DG Arthur Manser and his work on the GSE committee. This will be the second DG in recent years from the Rotary Club of Berri, one of our smaller clubs.

The District Assembly at Waikerie was attended by well over 250 Rotarians. I thank District Trainer Ian Oliver for developing and managing the day's program, and the Rotary Club of Waikerie for their work in organising the day. Feedback has been generally positive, particularly about the hands-on approach in the secretaries' sessions. During the afternoon I was able to sit in with a number of other sessions and was very impressed with the presentations and discussion generated. Again, thank you to all who contributed to the success of the day.

The presentation by Rotarian Lynn Arnold (CE, Anglicare) was very topical, and highlighted the role that effective PR has in all organisations, including voluntary groups like our own. There is a PR seminar planned with 9500 on July 19th, and will be a good opportunity to develop some strategies to help improve your club's ability to attract new members. This will also generate community support for your service programs.

Preparation for the two outgoing GSE teams for this year is continuing. The team for Colorado is working with team leader Michael Cook from RC Berri. At this stage the selection process for the team leader for Brazil is proceeding, to be completed late July.

Past team leader to Brazil Peter Poulton is helping the team. Both teams are working together very well, and like our just returned team from North Carolina, I am confident that they will represent our district with distinction, and learn a lot about their respective host countries. On a not so positive note, the Foundation has indicated that the centrally funded GSE program will change from an annual two way exchange to a two way over two Rotary years. I think we should try to maintain an annual program, and have asked PDG Peter Sandercock from the Foundation, how it may be achieved.
