Visit to the National Wine Centre (Martin Cooper: Chair)

A wet and windy Tuesday evening, trees falling, SES rushing and waters flooding but we were safely ensconced inside Adelaide's very own Ark; better known as the National Wine Centre.

The inside of the building is every bit as revolutionary as the outside; mud wall to acoustically screen the main function room; post stressed roof and the Southern Hemispheres largest above ground cellar; never mind the quality Mr President, feel the width.

Our guide Ryan also pointed out the grape sniffers, the 120 year old vine showing all its root system and the intricate grape bunch models, which clearly demonstrated the substantial physical differences between varietals. Then off to do some wine making; President Jerry surpassed himself with the computerised simulator declaring his Cabernet Sauvignon "Faulty"; he would be better working for the Petro Chemical Industry! Jerry just asked if he could try a glass of his brew anyway. Treasurer Lindsay held the club's side up with a distinguished silver medal for his Chardonnay.

Then it was time to meet Gavin, University lecturer and specialist wine merchant. Gavin led us through a most informative tutored tasting of three South Australian Cabernets; Gavin took great care to point out how much temperature affected alcohol levels and how the complexity of a wine influenced longevity.

Great Australian Bike Ride

Martin Cooper has mad us aware of the GABR, here's some more information on the event.

WHAT is it?: THE GREAT AUSTRALIAN BIKE RIDE is an epic 17,800 kilometre ride around Australia. The Ride set out from Melbourne in March, toured Tasmania and then travelled through Victoria, NSW, Queensland and the Northern Territory. After more than 100 days in the saddle the riders are heading for Broome.

WHY do it? To raise money for mental health research and education programs funded by Australian Rotary Health; the largest nongovernment funding body of mental health research programs in Australia.

The Ride is also addressing the stigma and myths associated with mental illness.

After experiencing the stigma of having a depressive illness, former NSW Leader of the Opposition and mental health advocate John Brogden, said he would have preferred "a diagnosis of cancer, as having <u>that</u> disease is socially acceptable. Unfortunately compassion for people with a physical illness is generally not extended to people with a mental illness" he said.

One in five Australians had a mental illness in 2007 and almost one in two (or 7.3 million) people have experienced a mental illness at some point in their lives.(Australian Bureau of Statistics, Australian Social Trends, March 2009)

The World Health Organisation estimates that by 2020 depression will be one of the world's greatest health problems.

World RI President John Kenny's September Message

My fellow Rotarians,

Lord Byron wrote, "The days of our youth are the days of our glory." For me, that is the line that springs to mind whenever Rotary's youth programs are mentioned. In Rotary, September is New Generations Month – a time to focus our attention on our programs for youth and the role they play in shaping the Rotarians of tomorrow.

Our youth programs – Interact, Rotaract, Rotary Youth Leadership Awards, and Rotary Youth Exchange – are some of the most important programs of Rotary. I say this because of the unparalleled potential they have to influence young minds and souls toward peace, goodwill, and harmony. That potential is the greatest in youth because the experiences of our early years never leave us; they shape who we later become. In the words often attributed to St. Francis Xavier, "Give me a boy until he is seven, and I will give you the man." For myself, I would give it a bit longer than that – but there is no doubt that the experiences of our youth have a greater formative power, and a greater ability to shape character, than any we may have in our adulthood.

When a teenager from the United States has the chance to travel to India to participate in a National Immunization Day, or when a student from Brazil spends a year studying in Japan, that person will be forever changed. These young people will have formed connections and affections that will endure. They will never think about their own country, or the world, in the same way again. Their perspective, their priorities, and their values will have been permanently shaped by that experience in a way that no later experiences will have the power to do. Your hard work ensures that these experiences continue to be possible – that these programs continue to be available, to be well run, and to earn the trust of the participants and their families.

The impressions of youth are strong, and they are lasting. There is never a second chance at them. We may grow and change as we get older, and we are surely changed by all of our experiences. But there is never another chance to build who we are. That happens only once: in our youth.

The days of our youth truly are the days of our glory – but through Rotary's youth programs, those days become the glory of all of Rotary.
