Guest Speakers - Indigenous Health Students

Natalie Moore

In 2006 Natalie commenced her degree as Bachelor of Health Science, specialising in Paramedics Studies. In November 2008, she completed the University component of her degree and graduated early in 2009. Over the last 3 years we had the privilege of sponsoring Natalie, and each year Natalie shared with us her study experiences. Although we are not currently sponsoring Natalie, she shared with us her training experiences as an intern at the SA Ambulance.

In January 2009, Natalie commenced her 16 month long internship with the SA Ambulance and she expects to finish it in April/May 2010. The internship is made of number of stages and each stage focuses on different areas of training, including working with other Paramedics. The components of current training included:

Stage 1: Four weeks induction to the service, equipment, policies and procedures.

Stage 2: ATS/Transfer Services component – 16 weeks.

Stage 3: Emergency Supervised component (Paramedic Internship Development Team) – 16 weeks

Stage 4: Medical Block: Revisit key concepts, exams – written, oral and practical.

Stage 5-6: Lateral Team Component: Work with any paramedic, less supervision, allowed to have university students on board, begin to provide direction for new interns.

Stage 7: Trauma Block: Revisit key concepts exams – written, oral and practical.

Qualified: Continue working metro until May 2010. After completing the internship, there is a possibility of moving to the country for a minimum of two years, depending on vacancies.




Lauren Sperring

Lauren is currently completing her 2nd year in Bachelor of Medicine at the Adelaide University. Unley Rotary is co-sponsoring Lauren with Dr Helen Sage, who could not be here tonight, due to other commitments. I learnt that Olivia, our first student, used to share with us her study experiences eg practice her presentations etc. So tonight, you will hear from Lauren, her recent experiences completing an assignment.

Lauren shared her experience on completing a project on Early Development Attachment (aka Pregnancy attachment). The aims of this project were to improve communication skills, observe the processes involved in Obstetrics appointments, and to observe the family situation during pregnancy and early life of the baby.

The project involved following a mother to-be and her family through the pregnancy and up until the baby is 6 weeks old. At first Lauren was nervous. This nervousness eased as she got to know both mother & father to be more intimately at various stages of the pregnancy. This experience helped Lauren to gain insight into family dynamics and various issues and concerns confronting first-time



parents. Regrettably, Lauren was not present for the birth of this baby. However she looks forward to following up on the family and the new born baby when the baby is 6 weeks old.

District Governor's Visit -DG Dick Cuttle

Dick opened his talk by focussing on the Rotary theme for the year "The Future of Rotary is in Your Hands" and our need to pass on and share all of the benefits of Rotary. He spoke of his dealings with the International President John Kenny who holds the view that Rotary is about people and not programmes. The focus for international as in recent years and for the next two will be the completion of the Polioplus initiative. Second will be water and health.

He reminded us that there is still an emphasis on membership as an issue, with the numbers for District 9520 dropping by 45 in the last year and the need to stop the slide. Supporting this through increased Rotary awareness will be a joint 9520/9500 initiative to bolster PR with a \$10,000 budget for the purpose. There is a new deal with the Messenger group of Newspapers if Rotary helps them to handle their projects. A new DVD has also been compiled by the Rotary Club of Lane Cove with Roger Climpson as presenter. Some will know Roger as a newsreader in NSW.



Dick provided an update on the Bushfire Appeal, to date some \$30,000 of \$130,000 has been spent and there are options for individual clubs to suggest projects, PDG Peter Shipp has more details.

The presentation was concluded with an outline of the coming conference and description of the full programme.

Harris envisions a professional club that brings together men from a variety of vocations. Gustavus Loehr, Hiram Shorey, and Silvester Schiele attend. The meeting sets the groundwork for the world's first service club: the Rotary Club of Chicago

Rotary International officially adopts The Four-Way

Test, one of the world's most widely printed and quoted statements of business ethics. Herbert J. Taylor, a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago who would later become the 1954-55 RI president, drafts the 24-word test in 1932 to help an aluminum company on the verge of bankruptcy after the Great Depression.
