

Guest Speaker - James Bruce: "Honorary British Consul"

James is a fourth generation Adelaidean; his great grandparents moved here in 1852 and set up the family auctioneering business in 1878. Besides a brief spell in the USA James spent 15 years with Christie and Co., London; today he is Managing Director of Theodore Bruce Auctions Pty Ltd. Winner of the 2003 Golden Gavel Award, Commonwealth Government Fine Arts advisor since 2005 and was appointed Honourary British Consul in 2006.

James gave us a most interesting insight into the duties and functions of the consular service and as the great speaker that he is he managed to convey a large amount of factual data made interesting by his ready wit and humour, including the lady who was, she claimed, wrongly "interred" in the Watch House, the more serious side of the comatose 84 year old visiting Brit who was being refused admittance to Modbury Hospital (this story did though have a happy ending) and the Brits who having broken into the backpackers spirit store were found crashed and cuddling the evidence. Sergeant Bob graciously excused James's phone going off in the middle of his presentation after it was explained that it was a pre-requisite that the Consul was on call 24/7; many thanks James.

Extracts from October's Commentary from the DG's Newsletter

I recently received the first official update of members from RI, and this shows a drop below 1500. The official figure is about 20 less than Theo Ruckert's figure of a drop of about 1510. I have checked some of the club lists, and it is clear that some new members have not yet been listed with RI through the Member Access Portal. I strongly encourage clubs to keep their figures up to date. If you are not sure how to do this, a quick call to Mary Galea or to Joy Walker in Parramatta will help. During our visits so far membership and membership development has had a very high priority with clubs. We need new members to help us carry out our current programmes, and also to renew our clubs and the district in general. October is Vocational Service month. From your club bulletins I note that many clubs have vocational visits or speakers planned. There is also renewed interest in Pride of Workmanship in a number of areas. These are great activities for the recognition of local people, and for lifting our profile in the community generally and particularly with local businesses.

A reminder that there is money available from the Bushfire Relief Fund to support clubs responding to requests for help from the bushfire areas. All requests that come from a Rotary club or district have

been cleared through by the coordinating group in Victoria, and are eligible for support from the fund. PDG Peter Shipp and Judy have just returned from the area, and can give you up to date information about needs that will exist for months and probably years to come. The clubs in Victoria have been very active in relief and reconstruction work, and they need our help to serve their local communities. There continues to be plenty of activity within the Foundation committees. I encourage all clubs to learn more about these programmes, and also to contribute as much as you can to keep the Foundation active. Remember that Australian clubs have a great record of getting grants from the Foundation and to maintain this we need to maintain our support.

This month we are hosting the GSE team from Colorado. I strongly encourage all Rotarians to attend one of their presentations, and to meet them. Our own team has completed their exchange to Colorado, and again I encourage all clubs to invite either the whole team or one member to speak at your club. GSE is a wonderful part of the Foundation programme, and the more Rotarians who take part the more successful it will be.
