

#### President's Announcements

- For the last time, I am again circulating the sheet showing the GSE visit, events and the approximate cost. Please indicate if you will be attending and the numbers attending, in particular for the Group 6 Intercity Meeting guests welcome. There are limited places on the Coorong trip and the Melbourne Cup lunch so first in best dressed.
- Bob Mullins, Sheila Evans and I met today with Chris Linnell and Jane Doogue from Unley Council re., our involvement in the work being undertaken at the Orphanage grounds down at Goodwood Road. This will be an ongoing Rotary project for the current Rotary Year and will mark our 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

The map shows the Orphanage grounds and the work being completed by Council with our support. The first element of the work will be to plant some 3000 plants in the area marked as the Northern Family Area. This work will take place as part of two working bees on Saturday 21st and Sunday 22nd of November from 10am to 1pm, followed by a BBQ and some Fellowship. Council will provide all tools and we will need to wear appropriate clothing and bring gardening gloves, also remember the sun block. I would also suggest those attending bring chairs, plates, cutlery, glasses and grog.

We, with Council, will issue a joint press statement to go into the Eastern Courier seeking volunteers to work with us. This is a great opportunity to showcase Rotary and our club and may lead to future new members. We will also attempt to use the new connection with Messenger newspapers to get an article on the activity into the paper the following week. Council has also promised a slot in the next issue of Unley Life in January and some coverage on the website.

I can also advise that with Council's assistance we have sought a grant through the Natural Resource Management Investment Unit of the State Government. The grant may secure an additional \$28,000 above the \$10,000 already pledged by the club and would be wholly recognised as having been invested by the club.

#### Guest Speaker - General Eva Burrows: "Who Cares"

Our guest speaker was General Eva Burrows AC, Paul Harris Fellow and former world leader of The Salvation Army 1986-93.

The General was in Unley for the 125<sup>th</sup> Celebrations of the Unley Worship & Community Centre. Her visit to the Rotary Club of Unley was her last engagement before flying back to Melbourne.

Eva Burrows came to a personal faith during her years at University in Queensland and felt her calling was to give herself fully to the ministry of Christ. Her Salvation Army background opened doors for her and as an ordained minister/Salvation Army Officer she spent 17 years in Rhodesia working in education and teacher training. As she taught she learnt to be an African and had devoted her entire life to ministry on the African continent. This experience enabled her to give leadership to the

International College for Officers in London as well as heading up social service Gen departments of The Salvation Army. Before giving worldwide leadership of The Salvation Army, Eva Burrows led the Salvation Army troops in Sri Lanka, followed by Scotland and then Australia.

As General, with great faith Eva Burrows re-opened the work of The Salvation Army in the eastern block countries after the fall of the Berlin wall which continues to have great impact in rebuilding these countries today.

Now retired, Eva Burrows continues to be in demand and travels the world frequently speaking at Universities, Conferences and Salvation Army events. Her passion though is the people in the street and she spends most of her time with the homeless and disadvantaged in the streets and lanes of the City of Melbourne where she is affectionately know as GenEva.

Her message to us Rotarians was "Who Cares?" The General had lost count at the number of times she had spoken at Rotary Clubs around the world but she did remember the occasion when the

number one Rotary Club in the world, the Chicago Club desperately wanted her to speak but it was going to clash with the opening of a Salvation Army Centre on the other side of the city. "We'll get you there on time", was the guarantee by Rotary but the General could not see how until she was ushered away from the opening in a Police car, lights flashing and sirens sounding. Upon arrival at the hotel where the club held their meetings, the General was cordially met by the president of the club who also happened to be the city's chief of police!

A Peanuts cartoon that General Eva loves has Lucy saying, "I love humanity; it's people that I just can't stand!" She also shared what the Founder of The Salvation Army General William Booth said to the politicians of his day, "If a cab horse falls on a cobbled roadway you don't yell at it to get up and get moving. You lift it first and give it food, shelter and warmth. If it is done for a horse why can't it be done for people too!"

Everybody is equal and deserves equal respect.

A quote, "When I was young clever people used to impress me, now that I am older caring people catch my admiration". General Burrows spent time with Mother Teresa as The Salvation Army and the Sisters of Charity partnered on projects for the poor and disadvantaged. Upon being asked by the General about her fame across the world, Mother Teresa said that she cared nothing for such praise, but then she paused and added, "I have helped people *talk to the poor*, not just about the poor". Mumbai and Calcutta are not the only places you find the poor. The General has visited with local Salvation Army teams cardboard communities all around the great cities of the world. Once in London one of the Captains found Tom unconscious in his cardboard dwelling and got him quickly to hospital. The next morning the Captain came to visit Tom and he called out through the ward, "Hi Captain, thanks for saving my life. I've written you down as my next of kin!" The Salvation Army loves to be the next to kin of the homeless.

But there is more:

If you take an alcoholic to a doctor you get a healthy alcoholic.

If you take an alcoholic to a psychologist, you get a well behaved alcoholic.

If you take an alcoholic to AA you get a sober alcoholic.

But if you give an alcoholic faith and belief you end up with a transformed life!

A participant in one of the Army's programs was asked by the General in a furniture workshop what he was doing and his reply was, "I am doing what you are doing, turning junk into something useful".

A former Prime Minister of Canada once said of The Salvation Army that some people thought that it was a welfare agency; however The Salvation Army was actually a vital spiritual force with a passion to transform lives.

Some people may think that our thinking is simple, but "man cannot live by bread alone". The world has a spiritual hunger and when people discover that it makes them better people which leads to a better world. It's the simple things that make a difference and caring certainly makes a difference.

The General concluded: "I am glad that I am part of the Salvation Army who cares, and I am glad to be a partner with Rotary who sees Service above Self".

#### Dolly Parton to speak at 2010 convention

Country music legend and philanthropist Dolly Parton will be a keynote speaker during the 2010 RI Convention in Montréal, Québec, Canada, 20-23 June. Parton will speak at the morning plenary session on 23 June to promote reading among preschool children. She and the Dollywood Foundation's Imagination Library teamed up with Rotary International in March to help provide age-appropriate books each month to children from birth until age five. Parton will speak to Rotarians about the importance of early childhood reading and how the collaboration with Rotary International has augmented the success of the Imagination Library. The singer developed a personal love of books while growing up in rural Tennessee, USA, where she saw firsthand the toll that illiteracy can take on families.

"I am thrilled about our partnership with Rotary International," she said in March. "Rotarians love kids as much as I do, so I truly believe we can do something extraordinary together to help even more children love to read and succeed."

Since its launch in 1996, the Imagination Library has provided more than 23 million books to preschoolers.
