

We hosted the GSE team, of Jeff Wadley, Ashley Cantrell, Candice Walton, Laurel Prud'homme and Christina Gair for the last four days of their visit. Thanks almost solely to the efforts of **Chandra Sluggett** they had a fabulous experience over that time. I would also like to thank **Wendy Andrews** who did much to smooth the administrative part of the various events.

The trip to the Coorong was the only time they had been able to enjoy and experience our indigenous background, they met with elders of the Ngarrindjeri people. The day saw us all in the Ngarrindjeri people cultural museum at Camp Coorong, then enjoying a bush walk on which we were educated on the use of herbs and plants, used in Aboriginal life for a variety of purposes, medicinal to insecticides. The day finished with a lunch of local fish and a talk by George Trevorrow on aboriginal life and reconciliation. George is the owner director of the business and the chair of the Tendi, the governing body of elders of the Ngarrindjeri people.

Tuesday brought the trip to the city and the migration museum where we were able to enjoy a guided tour by the Director Christine Finnimore, the museum shows in a very innovative way, the cultural input provided by the many immigrants to Australia. The team then, facilitated by on **Colin Schirmer**, enjoyed the cultural event of the year, the Melbourne Cup. Colin had arranged for our group to be hosted by the SKAL Club of Adelaide to lunch in the Strathmore hotel. Lunch over, our own honorary member **David Pisoni**, member for Unley, took the team on a guided tour of the State Parliament.

Wednesday was a Vocational Day followed by the Group 6 meeting at Belair as reported by Stephen Baker. That was a great event and was well supported by the clubs in Group 6.

Thursday was a day of rest concluded by a farewell dinner to the team, attended by host families, Presidents and District officials involved in the programme. We enjoyed record attendance of 81 for the event and it was a fitting way to say goodbye.

Guest Speakers - The Colorado GSE Team

At the meeting of the Group 6 Rotary Clubs hosted by the Rotary Club of Unley on 4 November 2009 at the Belair Park Country Club, the Group Study Exchange Team members from Colorado were our guest speakers.



Host Club Sergeant David Middleton opened the meeting at 7pm

Assistant District Governor Roy Armstrong proposed the toast to Australia and Colorado and David Middleton toasted Rotary International.

Host club President Jerry Casburn welcomed special guests Tony Wright and David Pisoni MP, the other participating clubs [Brownhill Creek, Eastwood, Hyde Park and Mitcham], the GSE team led by Jeff Wadley, and exchange student Leena Kasurinan

MC Joan Reed introduced story teller Tony Wright. Tony entertained the gathering with his rendition of 'Cinderella' from Raold Dahl's Revolving Rhymes, followed by 'The Man from Snowy River' by Banjo Patterson, topped up with an unusual version of 'Goldilocks and the Three Bears'

GSE team Leader Jeff Wadley thanked the Rotary Foundation and the GSE Committee for making the exchange possible. The team comes from District 5470 in mid Colorado. Each team member then described their home of Colorado:

- Laurel Prud'homme outlined the similarities with South Australia with both having extensive plains; however in Colorado there
 are 14 mountains of over 14.000 feet.
- Ashley Cantrell told how the State was known for its mining, its provision of water to other States through the Colorado River; there had been extensive effort in solar and wind power.
- Candice Walton talked about the recreational opportunities including skiing, hiking and hunting which made Colorado a prime tourist destination; Colorado is known as the fittest (least fat) State.
- Cristina Gair poetically described the wildlife.

Each member then talked about their home town, their vocation and their family:

- Ashley hails from Aspen which is the playground of the rich and famous with great skiing, food and wine. She is an Environmental Health Specialist with the City, specializing in recycling and waste reduction and enjoys skiing and hiking.
- Laurel comes from Colorado Springs which is the second largest city in Colorado and is well known for its military presence, space technology, software industry and Olympics management. She is a graphic designer specializing in advertising and marketing, currently employed by Kaiser Permanente and enjoys outdoor activities.
- Cristina comes from Eagle, a small town in the Vail Valley. She works for Youth Non-Profit as Executive Director with the Eagle River Youth Coalition. Her hobbies are travel and nature.
- Candice hails from Grand Junction, a high desert town with a strong wine industry and through which the Colorado River runs (providing water for 25m people). She is a Financial Planner with Ameriprise Financial, enjoys travel and football and is a member of Rotaract.
- Jeff lives in the small town of Carbondale which is well known for its annual mountain fair. He is a fire-fighter and construction contractor with his next project being an eco village. His hobbies include biking and camping. The team has been in South Australia for 5 weeks and is thoroughly enjoying the experience.

Questions followed on the US health care system, bears, financial planning, best local experiences, strange Australian language and Laurel's surname derivation.

My fellow Rotarians:
