GSE Team from District 9520 to North Carolina, USA, District 7710

Margaret Northcote, Past President of the Rotary Club of Campbelltown, team leader and retired teacher, provided an informative and often humorous insight into the exchange experiences for herself and her team. The visit occurred in April of this year. Team members were Corey Pearson, sponsored by Blackwood club who works in the Crime Scene Investigation Unit, SA Police, Tim Gilchrist sponsored by the Kent Town club who works with museum exhibitions, Kelly Fyfe, sponsored by the Mildura Deakin club who works with water management and Scott Endersby, sponsored by the Edwardstown club, and who works as an estate agent.



Margaret gave an overview of some of the differences between the two districts. For example, the whole district of 9500 is larger than the state of North Carolina. The state is divided into one hundred counties, each having three to five law enforcement agencies. This translates to approximately five hundred different sets of legislation, five hundred different types of police cars, five hundred different police uniforms and countless policies and procedures. Some Rotary differences that were noticed were that there no community projects for fund raising and monies for project support were donated through the cheque accounts of Rotarians. Also, Paul Harris Fellows were purchased by Rotarians and not awarded. (Scribe's note - this was the original concept relating to Paul Harris Fellows; awards have been adopted in Australia).

The team benefited from a well-planned schedule embracing both vocational and social visits. Margaret commented on the newly created mentor role and its value in contributing to successful vocational days. The team was able to experience positives and negatives of their various professions in both countries. This cultural and professional insight is the integral function of the group study exchange program.

Only one hundred and ten people attended this year's district conference for district 7710 held at Wilmington. Apparently this low number is not uncommon. Due to the structure of the program and 'break out' sessions it meant that the team had an audience of only thirty people for its presentation. At the conference dinner Scott was able to display his skills as an auctioneer and raised over \$7000:00 towards the PolioPlus Program. Margaret gained a reputation she is most proud of. She had sixteen separate dancing partners at the function. In North Carolina, a dance is referred to as a 'shag'. In other words she had sixteen shags throughout the evening and was dubbed 'the shag queen'. What wonderful ambassadors these folks were for Australia!

Prior to leaving, the team prepared and hosted an Aussie meal including roast lamb and Pavlova. The former is most expensive so not commonly eaten and Pavlova was an unknown entity. Both were enthusiastically received.

Rotary District 9520 - Water and Sanitation Project, Timor Lesté



Imagine living on less than 55c a day, having your wife and children trek for 2hrs every day to collect just enough water for the essentials of life, drinking and cooking. Your children don't go to school because (a) they are fetching water each day and (b) the school doesn't have a toilet. Your own house doesn't have a toilet for that matter but the family have been using the smelly, boggy ground around 'the back' since you were a kid, so what? Imaging a life without toilet paper and no water to wash your hands? Imagine the risks to health and the worry that your child may succumb to intestinal infection and become one of the 6,000 children under 5 years that die every day from a water-born disease.

This is was what life was like in July 2008 in the villages of Glai and Lebuae, just one hours drive from Dili. Now, thanks to the commitment of 29 Rotary clubs within District 9520, all 325 people living in those villages have access to clean water and a sustainable sanitation system. Life expectancy has improved and so too has the productivity of the villages as

women now spend time growing crops and the children attend school. The first steps to a life beyond poverty have been taken thanks to Rotary.

The hills of Liquica District of Timor are a world away from the October 2007 District Conference in Adelaide yet the inspiring presentation by Tom Thorfinson, now RI Director, sowed the seed and within 6 months a project was born. The concept for the project,

based on partnering a specialist NGO, has proven highly successful in Haiti and due process was followed to identify an appropriate Australian partner. In April 2008 a contract was signed with Water Aid Australia to deliver the necessary infrastructure. A simple task but our requirements were complex, we required a sustainable project, one that would be adopted by the communities which meant engaging the communities in months of discussion about the siting of the facilities, obtaining their commitment to provide the free labour for construction and their commitment to maintain the assets in years to come. This process was reinforced by involving villagers in the financing of the project – each household contributes 25c a month towards a maintenance fund that is managed by the community. Of course none of this guarantees the facilities will be used. A great deal of effort, and approx. 1/3 of the cost, is put into educating first the children then their parents in practical hygiene. The first stage was completed in November 2008 however, with the ongoing support of Clubs it is hoped to maintain a rolling programme across similar villages in the coming years. Already Clubs in other Districts are showing an interest in replicating the initiative. It is hoped that as clubs 'adopt' the initiative a steady income stream will be Building Break Pressure Tank - Glai village developed and supplemented with funds from The Rotary Foundation, initially in the form of Matching Grants and later 3-H Grants.

The main features of the first stage are:

Glai Village Lebuae Village

- 204 adults 121 adults
- 3 water intake structures 3 water intake structures
- 2 reservoir tanks + 2 'break pressure' tanks 4 reservoir / 'break tanks'
- 13 public water taps 7 public water taps
- · 3200m of pipelines 3600m of pipelines
- 39 household latrines 28 household latrines

An inspection tour of the villages and future challenges for the District is being organised for April /May 2009. Rotarians interested in joining the tour, at their own cost, should contact Don Richardson.

The District's partnership with Water Aid Australia ensures Rotarians pay only the 'in country' cost of delivery i.e. we pay nothing towards the charity's overheads, travel etc. The cost of delivering the initial phase was A\$50,000.
