President's Announcements

- 1. First, it is with regret that I have to advise of the resignation of **Martin Cooper** as both Secretary and a member of this club. I wish both Martin and Angie well for the future. They have both been tremendous workers for this club in its events and activities and will be a loss to Rotary.
- 2. I would also like to advise the club of funds raised to the amount of \$804. This came through a donation of surplus furniture made available through **Angie Cooper's** company which she and Martin arranged to be auctioned, with the net proceeds donated to the club. Martin will be advising me of the names from both Angie's firm and the auctioneers who gave favourable rates for the auction process. I will be writing to them to thank them once this information is available.
- 3. I have had a complaint from a Rotarian relating to the use of email addresses for purposes other than contact to Rotarians on Rotary matters. Email addresses are provided to allow private contact between members of this club and should NOT be disclosed to any third party without the express authority of the Rotarian in question. I have asked Stephen to add a rider to the Web based Directory emphasising this fact. - 4. A reminder to Board members that we have a Board meeting on Thursday 10th December which will be held at the offices of **Greg McLeod**, a separate email has been sent to the Board members.
- 5. Last week I missed the Christmas Dinner which I hear went astoundingly well, with lots of fellowship and fun. I want to thank **Joan Reed** for standing in for me while Jenn and I were in NZ.
- 6. On the subject of being away, while in NZ Jenn and I went to two Rotary meetings for the clubs of Kerri Kerri and the Bay of Islands and it wasn't just for a cheap meal. They were good meetings and we were made very welcome to both. I would strongly advocate doing a make-up if you are away, it is a great opportunity to meet local people and get new ideas for activities and the way the run their meetings. As an instance Kerri Kerri run a Garden Safari annually in which they have a large number of local people, not just Rotarians, who have an open weekend for their gardens. The club nets in excess of \$25,000. They are also planning a cross north island event which can be seen on www.northerncrossing.co.nz this will involve a swim, cycle ride and run, while they expect it to build they anticipate its becoming a multi thousand dollar event.
- 7. I have received advice from the Department of Water, Land & Biodiversity Conservation that we were unsuccessful in gaining a grant towards the costs associated with the Orphanage project. There is another window of opportunity towards the end of the financial year and I will liaise with Unley Council to see if we can apply for this.

Stephen Baker: introduced Graham Jaeschke State Manager of the Smith Family foundation. Graham is the General Manager for South Australia. He joined The Smith Family in June 2008 after working in State and Federal politics for 15 years. Previously Graham was the State Director of the Liberal Party in New South Wales, South Australia and Queensland. Graham's tertiary qualifications are in politics and geography from Flinders University.

Graham's mother is a member of the Rotary club of Prospect and his father was a member of the Clare Rotary Club and was involved in the Rabbit program.

Graham Jaeschke: The Smith Family has a long and proud association with Christmas. The organization was founded in 1922 when five businessmen decided to deliver toys to orphans on Christmas Eve. When ever they were asked who they were they replied Mr. Smith, hence the name. Since then we have grown and developed and what we do has changed to meet the needs of an ever-changing society, but we still deliver toy and book gift packs and hampers to families at Christmas.

This gesture of goodwill ensures that all Australian families can come together at Christmas to share food and gifts and celebrate life. The Smith Family continues to provide opportunities for disadvantaged Australians to participate fully and society and we believe that Christmas is a time when all Australians should feel they belong.

Christmas hampers

Each year at Christmas time, tens of thousands of food hampers are distributed to needy children and families across Australia. This process is made possible by hundreds of volunteers.

The Smith Family believes that every family should be able to sit down in their own home to a traditional feast at Christmas time. Unfortunately, for families living in financial disadvantage, Christmas often adds additional strain to existing budget pressures. We try to ease the burden on these families by providing food and gifts in addition to our ongoing financial, personal and educational support.

Every Christmas an estimated 20,000 toy and book gift packs and 10,000 food hampers are distributed to needy families. Hundreds of community volunteers, corporate volunteers from our corporate partners and a few celebrity packers donate their time to ensure that everything is ready to go in time for Christmas. Each food hamper contains all the essentials for a traditional Christmas lunch and each toy and book gift pack is chosen to suit the age and gender of the children in the household.

The Smith Family believes that Christmas is a time for social cohesion and participation. Providing assistance at Christmas is also a major part of our history and traditions and we intend to continue this gesture of goodwill well into the future.

Leena's Presentation on her home in Finland

Since I've been here for almost 5 months now, I think that it's time for all of you to get to know my country and me a little bit better

We pay a lot of taxes in Finland and the government takes good care of us, that's why we have a good healthcare system and "free" school lunches and many other benefits. Many people may think that Finland is just a dark and cold country... ok it can be dark and cold but hey it's much more than that actually...

In Finland we have almost 200 000 lakes, lots of forests (mainly conifer, pine and birch trees) and that's why the wood industry is important for us (furniture and paper factories).

We have 4 very different seasons in Finland. In spring the snow is melting and everything is wet and the whole of nature is waking up. Temperature about 10 degrees. The summer is the best time in Finland –after the winter of course. Everything is green and beautiful and people are happy. The typical summer temperature is 15 to 25 degrees. In the autumn all the leaves turn to yellow, orange and red. It's very beautiful. And the temperature it's in 10 degrees and it rains a lot so it can be quite miserable sometimes and of course we have the real winter in

Finland with snow... Then the temperature is normally from -10 to -25 degrees. In Lapland the summers are very light because the sun doesn't set for two months in summertime and winters are very dark. In the winter you can see the Northern Lights in Lapland.

So now you know something about the country but what about the people?

A stereotypical Finn is shy and quiet, eats a lot of rye bread, likes ice-hockey, listens to heavy metal music and owns a summer cottage by a lake with sauna.

I have two very close friends and a boyfriend, Henri. I love all of them cos with them I can be myself and we always have a good time. I have been playing soccer, the real football, for almost 9 years in our local teams. I used to have training three times a week and games in the weekends. Apart from soccer I also like snowboarding and almost every year our family goes to Lapland for a skiing trip. I'm interested in music and I've played piano for 8 years but just as a hobby.


In the forests we have animals. Brown bear (national animal) whooper swan (national bird) and moose. Because Finland is very far north our climate is very different to what it is here.

Siilinjärvi is where I live. My town has 20 000 people. We have few primary schools, one school for years seven eight and nine and one high school which is the one I go to. Plus I also had morning training three times a week at school so back home soccer was a big part of my life.

We are pretty close family and we like to travel together around Finland and in Europe but the best childhood memories I have are from our home. As I said before, many Finns own a summer cottage somewhere by a lake, but our home is already by a lake so to relax you don't have to go anywhere and you can feel like you are on a summer cottage already. My parents are Janne and Marja-Leena I have a twenty-year-old big brother Kalle, a middle brother Jaakko is 13 years old and he started year 7 this year in a new school and my little brother Vaino, he is 7 years old and he has started school this year.

Rotary News

An extract from the DG's Newsletter



During the last 4 weeks or so the Prime Minister's Office and the RI Office in Parramatta have been 'talking' about Rotary implementing a policy of inviting an Indian student to dinner. This was as a result of the attacks on international students, mainly Indian, in the eastern states. I am not sure how this might work, but it clearly will not be easy.

In D9520 we are responding to Hieu Van Le's challenge to us to provide more social opportunities for international students in and around Adelaide. The first function to do this, hosted by RC Norwood was held on Sunday 29th November. It was supported and attended by a number of Rotarians from other clubs. I hope that this will be a great start to a programme that will be of benefit to the students, our clubs and our community at large. I see room for our Victorian and NSW clubs to perhaps be involved in functions like weekend home hosting. In SA alone, some 30,000 international students make this industry our 4th biggest export earner. I think there is a role for Rotary to support these students, one that we are well equipped to do.

A number of Group 8 clubs have been active in bushfire relief again. Thank you to all Rotarians and partners who supported this project. In the last couple of weeks Rotarian Kevin Roberts has been in the affected areas liaising with Rotary clubs about the next stage. More details will follow, but it is almost certain that we will be asking for Rotarians, partners and friends to join work groups towards the end of summer.

We have just completed the first payment for the new Timor Leste Water project with PLAN. This is a major project, with a total cost of over \$680,000. Our share will be \$59,000, to be paid in full by June 2010. This comes from the money donated by clubs over the last couple of years, some allocation of carryover funds from the district, and some Foundation money. We have also joined with D9500, two districts from Victoria and a Philippine district in a major sanitation project in a village in the Philippines. This will require some financial support from clubs in addition to our Foundation contribution, plus grants from USAid etc. A separate request to clubs to support this project has been circulated.

Our suburban clubs have gained good exposure through the Messenger Newspaper group in the last few weeks. This has been achieved through Rotary support of local Salvation Army charities in the different Messenger areas. The opportunity for further support by Messenger for Rotary Club activities is now available, so please approach your local Messenger with appropriate stories and pictures. Let's make the most of this opportunity.

The latest report on PolioPlus indicates that progress has been good over the last few months. One immunisation day in Afghanistan in September reached 880,000 children in one day, in areas that have been affected by war in recent times. Please keep up your support for this important project and the Foundation generally. Now is a good time to donate......the exchange rate is VERY good.

December is Family Month in Rotary. It is a time to perhaps step back a little from our Rotary and community work, and spend more time with family and friends. In January we move into Rotary Awareness month, ready for the second half of our year.

Karina and I wish you all the compliments of the season and hope that your time at home, at the beach or elsewhere will be restful, enjoyable and safe!
