

Mark Huddleston: The Rotary Foundation Grants

In her introduction, Chairman Chandra Sluggett advised that Mark Huddleston joined Rotaract at 18 years of age and 10 years later was invited to join the Rotary Club of Edwardstown, where he has been a member for over 12 years. At 41, Mark feels privileged to have spent over half of his life in a Rotary environment.

Mark was President of the Rotary Club of Edwardstown in 2006-07. During this year he prepared a matching grant to support a literacy programme in Mexico, and last year Mark completed another matching grant to purchase medical diagnostic equipment in Ukraine. Mark is very passionate not only about supporting the Rotary Foundation but in helping clubs get the most out of the Rotary Foundation programs and grants. He joined the District Rotary Foundation Committee this year as Grants Chair. Mark is married to Debra, and has two children Aaron, 6, and Elise 3, and with Debra he runs a sugar free confectionery business.

Mark believes that every Rotarian should have a basic knowledge of how The Rotary Foundation works as it leads to a desire to donate and presents a greater likelihood of taking advantage of the various grants available to further that member's Club's projects.

In 1917, an endowment was set up to do good works in Rotary's name. As it grew, the endowment was renamed in 1928 during President Arch Klumph's term **THE ROTARY FOUNDATION**

Attendance

There are two main aspects to The Rotary Foundation, namely FUNDING and PROGRAMS. Mark's address concentrated on FUNDING. FUNDING has two main arms, namely the *Annual Programs Fund* and *The Permanent Fund*. The Annual Programs Fund is the engine of the Foundation and is where Paul Harris Fellow recognition payments are made and individual and corporate donations are received. At the end of each year, moneys go into a 3-year investment cycle. The capital is returned to a program called Share, 50% of which goes to the <u>World Fund</u> and 50% of which goes to the <u>District Designated Fund</u>.

A District Designated Fund enables a District to decide how funds are to be allocated but in the case of the World Fund, the Rotary Foundation trustees decide on the allocation of funds. The World Fund pays for Group Study Exchange, matching grants and peace scholars. The global financial crisis has led to a restriction in the spending of World Fund moneys and in the availability of matching grant funds.

The District Designated Fund(s) pay for ambassadorial scholars, matching grant funding, donations to special appeals, PolioPlus, etc. Some District Designated Fund moneys have been made available to prop up World Fund expenditure. The capital of *The Permanent Fund* is never spent and represents a reservoir of funds to enable the daily operations of the Foundation to be maintained.

Mark stressed that Clubs should become aware of the range of grants that are available to them, not all of the funding sources being necessarily for international Club projects. In the case of his own Club, funding for an active Group Study Exchange involvement has been obtained as well as matching grants, District Simplified Grants and a Public Relations Grant.

A short video explaining aspects of the workings of The Rotary Foundation was then shown.

Chairman Chandra thanked Mark for his address and presented him with a small gift.

Rotary's involvement in peace work began early



Although advancing the cause of world peace was not one of the original ideas behind Rotary, the concept took such a strong hold so early on that peace and Rotary have come to be inextricably linked in the minds of anyone familiar with the organisation.

In 1914, at the onset of World War I, delegates to Rotary's international convention in Houston adopted a resolution that called for the convening of an international peace conference and urged all Rotarians to support worthy efforts such as the international peace movement. In September of that year, the Rotary Club of Minneapolis, Minnesota, USA, submitted a proposal to the International Association of Rotary Clubs asking that Rotarians become advocates for peace in their communities.

In 1922, as the organization took the name Rotary International, the fourth object of Rotary was ratified: "The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service."

At the convention in Havana in 1940, delegates approved a resolution that identified "freedom, justice, truth, sanctity of the pledged word, and respect for human rights" as "vital to international peace" and called on each Rotarian to protect these principles. Even as World War II was raging, Rotarians were able to organize a conference in London, attended by representatives of 21 countries that laid out a plan for peace. This led to the formation of an international group that would later evolve into UNESCO, but not before the historic 1945 meeting in San Francisco at which the United Nations was chartered. About 40 Rotarians took part as delegates and observers at that meeting. Rotary played a critical role in the formative days of the UN, with five Rotarians elected to the post of president of the General Assembly during the first 12 years.



Throughout the second half of the century, Rotarians around the world continued to work for peace as individuals and in their local clubs, both through financial contributions and a wide range of projects to improve the quality of peoples' lives through health care and education. In 2002, The Rotary Foundation embarked on a new initiative that will help it imprint its peacemaking mark on the 21st century: an international studies program in conflict resolution at seven peace centers at prestigious universities on five continents.

With more than 400 alumni of the Rotary Centers for International Studies in peace and conflict resolution working in peace-related jobs throughout the world, Rotary is well on the way to achieving its goal of inspiring a new generation of peacemakers.
