

Vocational Visit to Sinclair's Gully Winery at Norton Summit



We toured the winery grounds...



...and saw a koala (circled) go up and down a tree.

When Sean and Sue Delaney purchased the property at Sinclair's Gully it was badly degraded due to livestock grazing and no weed management. Blackberry bushes had taken over the creek bed. Much work has been undertaken to remove these bushes and restore the area to its natural state. Now that the area has its natural vegetation and measures have been taken to control predators like foxes, there has been a return of wildlife in the form of many species of birds (including black cockatoos), koalas, wallabies and kangaroos.

In the years of early settlement many Candle Bark trees were cut down in the area with few remaining today except for Sinclair's Gully which was spared, the reason unknown. These trees, besides being beautiful, are the nesting habitat of the Black Cockatoo and many now come to the area to nest. Each day they fly long distances in search of food, flying as far as Victor Harbour.

After purchasing the property a small vineyard was established in 1998 on 1 hectare. Herbicides and pesticides were uses in the vineyard until Sean and Sue realised that not only were they living amongst these health risks but as the vineyard was on the ridge of a hill the residue was draining into the creek, the health of which they were trying to restore. They then adopted biodynamic farming methods which is much better for the environment. The first vintage was produced in 2003. They now produce nine different wines. tasted Sauvignon Blanc, Wooded Chardonnay and Sparkling

Sean and Sue have won numerous environmental, conservation and tourism awards and are committed conservationists.

We were treated to a wonderful evening of wildlife with a koala running up and down a tree and wallabies on the embankment near where we sitting outside, at one with nature. We dined on a smorgasbord of local produce and sampled wines.

Rotary Aid Volunteers - Bushfire Relief Project

District 9520 News -- March 2010

The Rotary Club of Brownhill Creek in District 9520 is coordinating a Bushfire Relief Project in the Victorian Bushfire Regions of Kinglake and Traralgon. The club urgently requires teams of 4-8 or individuals to volunteer their services to assist for a week between 18th April and July 31st 2010.

Volunteers will be engaged in cleaning up properties, cutting firewood, restoration of fencing, small rural construction work, replanting of trees and vegetation, construction and erection of bird and wildlife nesting boxes or any other necessary jobs to help give relief to people, affected by the fires, that will help them to re-establish their lives and properties. There is still a great need for assistance in the regions.

All meals and accommodation will be provided for volunteers and some fuel and travel costs will be met.

The work is not heavy or difficult and the personal satisfaction is great.
