

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Guest Speaker - "The Modern Athlete"

Chairman Stephen Baker introduced the speaker for the meeting <u>Adam Steinhardt</u>. Adam, South Australian born, was an elite international pole vaulter from 1984 to 1997. He represented Australia at the Commonwealth Games in 1990 and 1994. His highest vault of 5.51 metres was the best in the State at that time – this compares with Australian and world champion Steve Hooker clearing 6 metres. Adam started up a highly successful business called New Byte in 1994 and continues to prosper in marketing.

Adam recalled that he had commenced as a decathlon athlete in his teens whilst at Pembroke and had then concentrated on pole vaulting. prowess and particularly coming 7th in the junior world championships, earned him a Washington scholarship. Most elite athletes are broke most of the time. It is only the few who win gold who make a financial success of athletics. With incentives to take up professional sport most of Australia's talented young are enticed into high paying sports such as football - Modra and Koutifides were quoted as potential elite athletes. He said the future of athletics in Australia was looking particularly grim following the release of the Crawford Report which recommended greater support for team sports rather than athletics. Australia's success in track and field was poor until the advent of world champion pole vaulter Steve Hooker. Adam described the progress of Steve Hooker, the set-backs and the triumphs in the Beijing Olympics and the most recent World Games, where he won despite injury. He compared his progress to that of Sergei Bubka who is recognised as the greatest pole vaulter in history and still holds the world record of 6.15 metres. Steve's best is 6.06 metres...but has set his sights on breaking the all-time record.

Adam made the point that Australia's talent had to be better nurtured. Participating (and more importantly winning) at world level counts far more than a successful season in AFL or rugby. Wearing the green and gold representing Australia in the world arena is ultra special. The main difference today compared to 20 years ago is training and physio now can take up to 7 hours a day which leaves no time for other employment...hence the need for strong government support.

Call for Rotary Peace Fellow Applications

Now is the time to search for applications for 2011-12 Rotary Peace Fellowships. Completed applications must reach District 9520 Chair Satish Gupta by 15 may 2010.

In these uncertain times, there is a growing demand for well trained international leaders to promote national and international cooperation and peace throughout their lives, in their careers and through service activities. The challenges of the 21st century require people skilled in the art of diplomacy, mediation and conflict resolution. The Rotary Peace Fellowship program was developed to meet this very need.

Rotary is seeking non-Rotarian professionals interested in expanding their knowledge in international relations, public administration, sustainable development, public health, human rights, peace studies and conflict resolution or a related field. Each year, up to 100 Rotary Peace Fellowships (50 master's degree fellowships and 50 professional development certificate fellowships) are offered on a competitive basis at Rotary Peace Centres in six prestigious universities around the world.

Participants in the master's degree program gain access to:

- **Up to two years of fully funded graduate study** toward a master's degree at one of our six Rotary Peace Study Centers in the US, the UK, Argentina, Japan and Australia;
- **Training** in the root causes of conflict, theories of international relations, and effective models of cooperation, conflict resolution, and negotiation including a 3 month Applied Field Experience –(AFE);
- A growing linked network of committed alumni employed around the world in diplomacy, government, non-governmental organizations and private corporations;
- Funding for round trip travel, tuition and fees, room and board and other limited expenses including the AFE averages \$US70,000.

Mid career professionals already working in the field of peace and conflict studies may opt for the **three-month professional development certificate** program at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok. Both programs require, at minimum, a bachelor's degree in a related field; 3 years of relevant work experience for the MA program and 5 years for the professional development certificate. As well as excellent leadership skills, candidates must demonstrate a commitment to peace and international understanding through their professional and academic achievements and/or personal and community service activities.

Use your networks to urge employers to tell potential candidates of these generous opportunities for career development; such as non-government humanitarian organisations, government departments, religious and service institutions, local universities, police and armed services. They will know how to contact people working both, for them and with them.

In Vino Veritas

To my friends who enjoy a glass of wine and those who don't and are always seen with a bottle of water in their hand,
