Police Officer of the Year Presentation

The announcement of the recipient of the Police Officer of the Year award for 2009 was made by President Jerry in Rundle Mall before a crowd of about 100 people following entertainment provided by elements of the Police Band and vocalist. Unley Rotary's involvement was well publicised in the speech of the M.C., Assistant Commissioner of Police **Tony Harrison**, and by a large banner and the display of lots of information sheets about Unley Rotary activities. Deputy Commissioner Harrison acknowledged that Unley Rotary had provided the award for the last 32 years and expressed the wish that it would continue for at least another 32 years.

The presentation dinner was held at the Glenelg Golf Club, with a large contingent of SAPOL members in attendance. DG **Dick Cuttle** spoke of the award from a Rotary perspective and its impact especially in country towns and Stephen Baker as Chairman then formally announced the winner to be Senior

Constable First Class **Michelle Hollis** who is based in the Elizabeth operations area where she works as a suburban police officer with particular responsibility for a designated area. President Jerry presented Michelle with the award certificate and shield.

SC Michelle Hollis' address to the Club follows:

"It is a huge honour to be receiving this award today. When I was first told that I had won the award it came as a total shock, as I was unaware that I had been nominated. When my manager wanted to see me I thought I was being summonsed to his office for a complaint or something similar. It is not very often that members of SAPOL get recognised for the work they do to keep the community safe. So I would like to take this opportunity to thank the Rotary Club of Unley for their sponsorship of the Police Officer of the Year Award. It is through this award that the human side of policing is recognised and thus promotes SAPOL members in a positive light.

I have been a police officer for nearly 18 years, so I guess it is safe to say that I love my job. The majority of my career has seen me as a patrol officer in the Elizabeth Local Service Area. For a few years I strayed into the Eastern suburbs and Adelaide, but the last 4 years has seen me return to Elizabeth where I am currently relishing in my role as the Suburban Police Officer for Salisbury North. The concept of the Suburban Police Officer commenced in 2004. Since its introduction it has had outstanding community and other government support and this was reflected in 2006 when my fellow colleague Athalie Edman won this very award.

The position of the Suburban Police Officer is a unique position. An officer is allocated to a particular suburb, where they take ownership and are accountable for the crime trends and addressing the concerns of the community. It is a very personal approach style of policing. Whilst working in this role I have forged some very good friendships with various members of the community and also individuals in the other government agencies with whom I have interaction. For this reason when I receive a phone call about a particular issue it becomes natural for me to just want to help out in anyway I can, just like you would want to help out a friend or family member.

As a "people person" I can sometimes struggle working by myself, but I love that my role gives me an opportunity to meet new people outside of the organisation on a daily basis and interact closely with other government agencies. At this point I would like to thank Salisbury Council for nominating me for this award and for the other agencies such as Salisbury High School, Housing SA and NHW group who supported this nomination.

Although this is an individual award it really has been a team effort. I am very fortunate to have a solid support group at my current posting at Elizabeth. I am quite often asked why I like working there. My answer to that is the people. Without a doubt the camaraderie at Elizabeth is second to none. As I mentioned I quite often work solo but I am still attached to a team within the Elizabeth Uniform Tactical Team. The team fully support me in my role - even if sometimes they may not always understand what I'm doing – they are just happy to help out whenever I need it. As I am a people person and love the team atmosphere – their support means a lot – so to my team mates – thank you.

I would also like to thank the Senior Management of the Elizabeth LSA for the full support they give towards the Suburban Police Officer project and my specific role. Even when I am faced with particular issues in the community the management continue to encourage me to keep up the good work and they don't focus on the negative, but only offer help if needed.

I would also like to acknowledge my family and friends who have always been there for me and encouraging me in all that I do. At times policing can be stressful and to have independent people to vent to is very much appreciated.

In closing I would like to acknowledge the community of Salisbury North and the various agencies that continue to provide support to me in the role of Suburban Police Officer. I love helping people and to be appreciated as I am by this community has made my job one of the most rewarding in my policing career. Thank you."

Senior Constable First Class **Andrew** "**Spud**" **Murphy**, last year's award recipient, reflected on the impact of the award and the attendant community support and gave an insight into his own duties as a police officer and the job satisfaction that he receives.

Deputy Commissioner **Gary Burns** was presented by President Jerry with the perpetual shield. The Deputy Commissioner warmly congratulated Michelle Hollis and spoke on the challenges facing SAPOL members and the community in the 21st century.

Most of the awardees going back to 2000 were present and were presented with an official badge approved by Commissioner Hyde for wearing on the uniform in recognition of the receipt of the POOTY award. This was an initiative of the Club and well supported by the Commissioner. Recognition badges will be made available to all other awardees.
