

#### Guest Speakers

Chairman Peter O'Neil introduced our Exchange Student **Leena Kasurinen** who gave her final address to the Club. Her address is reproduced below:


"First when I came to Australia, one year seemed like a long time to be away from your home, family and friends. The idea of being in a whole new country surrounded by people who don't even speak the same language, made me a bit scared.

When I came here everything was different and new. I felt like I was in a wonderland. There were so many little things that were different to what I was used to or what I was expecting. First of all, it was cold. Bloody cold. I had to layer up and I thought "Oh God, this is crazy. I'm in Australia. Shouldn't it be warm?" And what people kept asking me was "You're from Finland, shouldn't you be used to this?" Well, maybe yes, but not when it's 15 degrees outside AND inside.

Then there's this thing with the taps. Why on earth do you have to have two taps? It takes ages to get the right temperature! And when you go to the supermarket to do grocery shopping you don't have to pack your groceries yourself. Then they even give you cash after packing all your vegemite, iced coffee and Tim Tams!

I have done so many new things that I could never imagine I would have been doing. The list is almost endless. The school camp to Kangaroo Island was amazing, the island was so beautiful and I had a great time and made lots of new friends over there. I had my first real camping experience in the Flinders Ranges with some friends from school. The trip to Eyre Peninsula with Sue Middleton and her daughter's family was one of the highlights of my summer holidays and one of the highlights of the whole year. Over that trip we did some fishing, went swimming with sea lions and dolphins and we also went feeding some tuna fish and I got bitten by one. A trip I will never forget.

I've also been to Victoria to visit Joan's brother and to do some shopping in Melbourne. I went to Brisbane to visit my relatives and had the ultimate Finnish experience of sauna over there. Listening to my relatives' stories how they have been here for 37 years and how they still have stayed so Finnish was amazing. That really opened my eyes and made me think differently and see things in a different light. Going to the Big Day Out festival and see all these world famous bands and Australian bands was something very special. And, of course, the formal. I had great time, the whole night was fantastic. It was one of the best nights in my life so far.

Then there are the Aussie experiences with the other Rotary exchange students. Like kicking football, singing Aussie songs, feeding kangaroos, shearing a sheep, going spotlighting kangaroos and other creatures in the middle of the night. I think it is a great thing that Rotary is organising. I don't have any words to say how happy I am that I've met all these other exchange students from all over the world. We have been supporting each other and sharing our good and bad moments. Who else would understand an exchange student better than another exchange student? All of us are fantastic people and we have been very brave to do this kind of thing. We don't even speak the same language all the time but you can still feel the same kind of spirit that we have and that brings us together. We are like a one big family.

I have experienced and survived the 40 degree heat and I even enjoyed it a bit, except when I had to be in school and wear my lovely school uniform and black school shoes. That wasn't very pleasant. But now I actually find 20 degrees a bit cool. I will be in a trouble when I go back to Finland.

I've seen how a Lutheran school community works. The school itself has been a very different experience to what we have in Finland. It took a long time to get used to wearing the uniforms, making your own lunch, going to the chapel and assemblies and doing almost all your work on computers. But now I think it will be weird to go back to school in Finland without a uniform and there's no chapel or assemblies and have a warm school lunch and use textbooks and hardly any computers.

One thing I really love about Australia is the Aussie lifestyle. Almost all the people without an exception are so friendly and relaxed. You enjoy your weather and spend time outdoors on the beach, playing sports or having a BBQ. You couldn't do that in Finland because you never know if it's going to rain or not and in the winter you can't do much outside because of the snow. I've learnt so much about your culture and how much of a multicultural country you actually are. And I find it very fascinating. I have tasted many different foods and fallen in love with roast, hot chips, meat pies, iced coffee, curries and other Asian foods, but nothing beats the good old Aussie BBQ. I have also met so many new people during this year from different countries and cultures and made friends for life.

Some of you might think about what I have missed from Finland. My family and friends, of course, but apart from that, I've missed rye bread, salted liquorice, houses with good heating systems and light summer nights, but not that much snow. And I've also missed warm school lunches. I am really looking forward to seeing my family and friends again but I'm also a bit scared to go back home and see how much things have changed and how much I have changed.

Many people may think that a year as an exchange student is like one massive holiday. But don't see it like that. For me it has been a big learning curve. This year hasn't been easy for me but it is probably the most memorable year of my life. I feel like I am a different person now. I feel more independent and more confident. My understanding of the world has changed. I think differently and I've become aware of the issues that we have in this world. Before I was thinking that I will go to Uni. after I've finished school, but now I have no idea. This year has opened my eyes to so many new possibilities and opportunities.

I've learnt so much about Rotary. All the programs and fundraising that you are doing to help people around the world. It's amazing. I had no idea about these things when I first came here. Now I can really see what Rotary is about.

It is a great once in a lifetime opportunity that Rotary International has given me. I'm very, very thankful to you, the Rotary Club of Unley, for sponsoring me this year. Without you I wouldn't be here. Thankyou for making my dream come true.

I want to thank all the club members for your time and effort to make me feel welcome. You really are great people.

Thankyou Nat, for being my counsellor. Thankyou President Jerry and Jenn. Thanks all of you who have taken me to places and family dinners and other things. I really appreciate that.

I would also like to thank my parents, who obviously aren't here, but who have been the greatest support and who have always believed in me and helped me through this year.

There is one person in this room who I think I can't thank enough and she is, of course, Joan. She has given up a lot of things to have me staying with her. Some of you may not even realise how big thing it is to host an exchange student and normally people do it for 3-4 months. But Joan has had me for the whole year and by herself. I really don't have enough words to describe how thankful I am, so I'll just say: Thank you, Joan. We have had our good times and bad times but that's what families do. I really hope that you will come and visit me in Finland and go to a sauna!!

Now when I look back I can't believe how fast the time has gone. My wonderland has become my home and I wish I could stay here.

This year has made me think how lucky I am to have something that makes goodbye so hard. And I would like to end my speech with Charles M. Schultz's words:

Why can't we get all the people together in the world that we really like and then just stay together? I guess that wouldn't work. Someone would leave. Someone always leaves. Then we would have to say goodbye. I hate goodbyes. I know what I need. I need more hellos. So come and say hello to me in Finland."

- 7. **Nelson Piquet:** F1 driver with an ego! Heroes are human.
- **8.** George Harrison: Loved him and his music. Similar loves in life.
- **9. Neil French:** Copy writer great copy writer, a compelling author and mentor.
- 10. Edna Walling: A writer and a great garden designer. Excelled in all facets of her career.

#### Giving Ugandan children a second chance

Mulambuzi Joshuah is not likely to forget his fifth birthday. He spent the day recovering from heart surgery that will allow him to attend school again in his village outside of Kampala, Uganda. Mulambuzi was one of 20 Ugandan children who received free heart surgery through Gift of Life India. The program is among 65 throughout the world established and supported by Rotary clubs to arrange cardiac care for children whose families cannot afford it.

The surgeries were funded by a US\$105,000 Rotary Foundation Matching Grant sponsored by the Rotary Club of Delhi Midwest and District 3010 (India), and all 17 districts in Korea.

The children, between the ages of 11 months and 12 years, arrived in New Delhi over a three-month period starting in January. Doctors at the Escorts Heart Institute and Research Centre and the National Heart Institute performed surgeries to correct their congenital heart defects. Several of the children needed immediate attention.

District 7250 (New York, USA) established Gift of Life India in 2002. Since its inception, the program has treated more than 500 children from India, Kenya, Nepal, Pakistan, Sri Lanka, and Sudan, with support from Rotary clubs and Matching Grant funds. It also receives help -- including medical team coordination and prospective patient lists -- from Gift of Life International, formed in 2003 to assist Gift of Life programs around the world.

#### Making connections

January's Matching Grant project arose because of connections from a similar effort a year earlier, when the Indian program agreed to arrange two surgeries as part of Gift of Life International's Our Hearts Are in Uganda campaign. Sixty Ugandan children were treated in 13 countries. Bret Halvorson, a member of the Rotary Club of Emerald City (Seattle), Washington, USA, and a native of Korea, escorted one of the children and her mother from the airport in Seoul to a local hospital. Wanting to help more Ugandan youth, Korean Past District Governor Sangkoo Yun and Youngsuk Yoon, then district governor-elect, suggested a follow-up project to Halvorson, a Gift of Life beneficiary himself. The three met with Peter, Past RI Director Sushil Gupta, and Gift of Life International founder Robert Donno at the 2009 RI Convention in Birmingham, England, where they worked through details of the January Matching Grant project.

Korean Rotarians pooled District Designated Fund (DDF) allocations. Grace Agwaru, a member of the Rotary Club of Soroti Central, Uganda, and the first Gift of Life beneficiary, worked with fellow Ugandan Rotarians to identify candidates for the program and help their families understand the surgery and make travel arrangements. Delhi East End club members met the children at the airport and visited them almost daily in the hospital.

Gift of Life India also recently received a pledge of \$110,000 from Rotarians in Taiwan for future surgeries.
