

As the music swells and the lights fade on Jerry's glorious presidency, he can add one more triumph to his achievements with the taking of victory (by the barest of margins, but victory nonetheless) in the inaugural Superquiz Challenge between Brownhill Creek and Unley.

There was an excellent night's attendance of about 54 people (24 from Brownhill Creek and 30 of our stalwarts).

President Bill Giles and the plucky crew from Brownhill Creek were welcomed to the dinner dungeon at Tiffins on the Park and settled for a most entertaining and challenging night of questions.

Our quizmaster, Bruce Brazenall, and his wife Jane ran the evening like clockwork, ably assisted by Jenny and Margaret, all from the Birthing Kit Foundation, our charity recipient for the night.

Over the dinner break, Jenny Weaver, Chair of the Birthing Kit Foundation, played us a new video that explained why it exists and what it does. In short, it is shocking to learn that still in the 21st century, over half a million women in developing countries die in labour due to simple ignorance, shortage of supplies and medical assistance, and a lack of hygienic practices. The simple birthing kit the Foundation produces, assembled by voluntary labour, is now making a difference with over 600,000 kits distributed so far to over 30 countries. On the night, our two clubs contributed a cheque for \$1,000 towards this worthy cause and raised another \$300 through raffles and 'buying' answers.

The inaugural trophy was presented to President Jerry and will proudly be displayed with the Club's other silverware!
