Guest Speaker - Martin Cusack: "Anifex Animation"

For those who couldn't make it along to hear our speaker, Michael Cusack, unfortunately this will hardly suffice as an explanation of what he does, what his presentation was like or how significant Anifex is as an Australian film production house. Yes, you missed a good night.

That said; let's try to fill in some of the holes. Michael is one of the partners of a company called Anifex, a specialist Adelaide animation production company. His company is one of those South Australian icons of business, punching well above their weight. Anifex draws its work from the key advertising industry cities in Australia – Melbourne and Sydney – as well as from overseas. Its reputation and demonstration reel speak for themselves.

The TV commercials you'd be most aware of that Michael has created the animation for include Schmackos (Dorothy and her dog, Roger) and Home Hardware (Rusty and Sandy, the dogs), just to name the two most recent and most prominent.

As a film director, Michael has won two Australian Film Institute awards for best short animation. He's also won advertising awards at Cannes, London and New York.

Michael explained how he goes about producing animation with the 'puppets', which are mostly made out of a plastic foam sculpted in a mould, with a metal armature providing a 'skeleton' that allows the figure to be posed incrementally.

Each second of animation created this way takes 25 separate changes of pose, photographed as a frame by the film camera. Yes, it's a long process. It can take up to 10 weeks just to create a 30-second commercial this way. It also takes a lot of planning, as Michael has to think about what the characters are in the process of doing as well as what they are going to do, so that the movements appear 'natural'.

Michael brought in two of his stars: Dorothy, the lady with the chicken-wing arms, and her dog, Roger, along with an armature 'skeleton', a sample script from an advertising agency (the idea that Michael works to fulfill), a storyboard (illustrations that correspond to each second of what they will film) and a fascinating voice planner that breaks down every word recorded by the voice of the character, so that each syllable can be mimed by the puppet. He also played us a few of his commercials to finish.

All in all, it was a fascinating presentation. If you'd like to see more of Michael's work, visit www.anifex.com.au.

Foundation donations record looming

Clubs and members are to be congratulated for their outstanding efforts for 2009/10. A Special Group helping Animals impacted by the Bushfires

A joint project between the Rotary Club of Victor Harbor and the Victor Harbor High School Special Education Unit is helping to rehouse birds affected by the Victorian bushfires by building nesting boxes for the fire-ravaged areas. The projects will contribute 50 nesting boxes for the Victorian Wildlife Department.

Many hollow trees, which had provided a natural breeding haven for birds and some animals, were destroyed by the bushfires. The Rotary club has funded the workshop project for the Special Education Unit, involving up to 12 students on a regular basis working under the supervision of Peter Hellak, School Support Officer. A local businessman, Allan Ashmoore, has provided the timber used from imported crates that transported motorcycles.

This untreated Canadian pine is then recycled ready for the students to cut and assemble bird boxes.

Jeff Collins, the unit Supervisor, said this latest project had helped raise the students' self esteem as they can see they are helping others who are in a disaster zone. Due to the success of this project, the students are now going to build a number of nesting boxes to assist the possum population similarly affected by the bushfires.

The efforts by the Rotary club to assist the Special Education Unit with these projects have received wide positive response from the local communities.
