Alex Jonson: Chandra's brother & sister have donated approximately 4 tons of export quality dried currents and various other goods to send to Timor Lesté. They have also donated \$13,000.00 dollars towards the cost of shipping the container and the balance to be donated to another project of their choosing. We have arranged with The Rotary Club of Dili in conjunction with DIK to transport the goods. The balance of the container is to be filled with school desks, chairs etc supplied by DIK required by the Rotary Club of Dili

We are in urgent need of a microscope, low level English picture books, readers for primary students, exercise books, old or new pencils, coloured pencils, children's clothing, (all types including winter & all sizes but mainly small sizes) etc..

We urgently require assistance from Rotary members to help clean, sort, pack and dismantle the desks and chairs and any other goods available at DIK to pack in the container.

We require 10 volunteers each day for the following dates:

Saturday & Sunday 28th & 29th August to clean, sort & pack the goods and Saturday & Sunday 4th & 5th September to load the container for shipping.

We are currently negotiating with DIK for more suitable times to avoid whole week ends.

Vocational Service & New Generations Committee: Stephen Baker

1. POOTY

A Post Evaluation of this year's POOTY 2009 has been undertaken with the Police. Most was positive. Three issues are to be pursued in preparation for POOTY 2010:

- a. Gain a clear determination from the Commissioner as to when the new special badges can be worn
- b. Increase the submission time and delay the presentation to maximize entries (only 11 received for 2010)
- c. Put greater effort into publicity ex ante and ex post

2. RYLA, RYPEN, NYSF, Science Forums

- The work on RYLA, RYPEN and NYSF for this year is complete; 3 NYSF nominations were made
- The allocated schools of Annesley and Walford will again be visited in late September to engender interest in The Science Experience available during the school holidays at SA universities

3. Indigenous Medical Scholarships

- New student Dannielle Ghezzi has been introduced to the club. The club will hear from her, Dr Helen Sage and possibly former scholarship holder Lauren Sperring in October

4. Youth Exchange

- Joan is still recovering

5. Campbelltown Shareskills Inc

- A new project is to be launched involving vocational training of young pregnant women in conjunction with Centacare Catholic Family Services at Louise Place Fullarton

6. Mentoring and Training

Club members continue to assist with work related mock interviews at Urrbrae High School

All projects are to be reexamined by the Committee to work through how best to assist with increasing club membership. A change in tactics on RYLA may well be useful.

Community Service Committee: Wendy Andrews

Earlier on in the year, John, Janet, Reno and I attended a gathering at the Unley Council to obtain information about services provided by Council. I left my details with some of the workers and Karen Messsert who is co-ordinator of Lifelinks contacted me and arranged a meeting which John and I attended. Lifelinks is a part of "Home and Community Care". Karen is responsible for the Supported Residential Facilities in an area stretching from Unley to Brighton. The residents of these facilities included people who have been discharged from mental institutions, rehabilitation, hospitals (with nowhere to go) or "off the streets". There are three of these facilities in the Unley area. Karen suggested we could provide Welcome Packs for Aldridge Court and Rose Terrace Lodge, as the residents often arrive with no possessions. This has been done. The other facility, St Michaels, is assisted by the Rotary Club of Hyde Park. They also need some hands to help putting together Christmas Gift Packs for all the residents. This we should be able to do. Reno is organising a date for a BBQ for Aldridge Court.

Deb Richardson also contacted me with possible projects. These were projects that missed out on funding under Council's Community Grants, but the committee felt that these were not suitable for Rotary projects.

We received a "Thank You Certificate" for a donation of \$250 towards a Christmas Party for Special Children. President Joan suggested we display it at the Thrift Shop

Reno's application for the Carols was successful and a grant of \$3,000 has been received. The Carols will be two weeks before Christmas and Reno and David Middleton will need all hands on deck.

The committee felt we maybe able to meet the financial needs for children who are caring for a parent or sibling, similar to a program run by Rotary in Victoria. I contacted Unley High School, and spoke to the Deputy Principal, who said she was "heartened and excited" and would get back to me in two weeks when she had been in touch with class teachers and counsellors. This she did to say there were no "known" carers. I then got the idea to contact the S.A.Carers Association, on King William Road, and a meeting was arranged this morning. David Mackrell and I attended and we were excited by the meeting we had with Simon the Business Development and Manager, and Kate, Education. They filled us in on the details of the work they do, and some of the gaps in services that we maybe

able to fill. We were impressed by the passion they had for their jobs. As this meeting was only this morning I hope members of the committee can stay for a short while after tonight's meeting so we can discuss how we can help with the ideas they have given us.

John and Jim would like to see what we can do about aged care, so that is the next project on the agenda as well as helping women in domestic violence situations.

Although most of these ideas are still in the pipeline, I hope I can get back to you next assembly with some exciting projects. It is difficult to pin point programs so please share you ideas with myself or a member of the committee.

Public Relations: David Mackrell

Over the last few weeks, two press releases have been prepared and sent (attached).

- 1) A report on our \$10,000 75th anniversary gift to the City of Unley and our planting days at Orphanage Park. This was sent to the editor of The Messenger and RDU and, to date, has not appeared, to my knowledge in either.
- 2) A frivolous but timely concoction after Julia Gillard's ascension to power that made the connection of Unley producing both a female Prime Minister and female president in the same month. This was sent to The Advertiser, The Messenger and selected radio personalities. To date, this has not been picked up either, to my knowledge.

DIK Story

I am in the process of preparing another story on our DIK donation to a local family that Jerry passed to me. This will be sent to RDU and The Messenger.

75th Birthday

I am also in the process of writing a story on our 75th birthday for general distribution.

Gordon Armstrong

Since the Gordon Armstrong talk, I have been back in touch with him to seek his support for getting stories into print. He has given us his moral support and suggested to persevere (he will not intervene at this stage).

CPR/Nicole Haack

I have made contact with a business colleague, Nicole Haack, at CPR, which, as the name suggests, is a PR company. I have asked to borrow her mind for an hour or so to help me come to grips with the task and seek how to engage effectively with the media at our level. She has responded and I am hoping we can meet next week some time to pick her brains. Update: now meeting with Nicole on Friday 13 August.

Strategy Planning

Subsequent to my talks with Nicole, I propose to write a short strategy for our media engagement. The idea is to spread the stories so we can have a drip-feed of items, I think. To do this, I would like to prevail on the board members and committee chairs to consider ways in which each committee can create stories for us to put out. For instance, the Christmas carols night is a feel-good story that should get suburban media attention. POOTY should get city-wide media attention. Items such as the DIK donation are nice as well, from time to time. The Thrift Shop may have a good story to tell, or it may need additional volunteers. Alex Jonson's story about the eyewear from Passport is a ripper and deserves exploration. I am talking to him and Chandra about it when he gets out of hospital after his op. (Good luck, Alex.) Please contact me if you need help with any form of advertising/PR/communication help.

PR aims go beyond mere PR

In my mind, I think we are aiming to gain some of the share of the public's attention for Rotary and its works in order to gain new club members (to carry out our good works), understand what Rotary is about (which makes it easier to gain new members) and to support our good works.

Part of the strategy may well be to create opportunities for engagement (such as publicising the planting days at The Orphanage, where we can meet people and they can see who we are and what we do). It is also why I suggested we could go to The Messenger and jointly run a campaign to seek community projects we can contribute to. Not only would that highlight our work within the community and clearly establish us as a charitable, humanitarian organisation. If we do find projects out of that, it would make it very hard for The Messenger not to run a story on it, as it would have been instrumental in creating the opportunity.

My point is that we have to think bigger than merely having PR act as a follow-up to what is in the pipeline. Everyone needs to think about how what we're doing can then become a story for the good of the organisation and create more beneficial outcomes.

UNLEY ROTARY HOES INTO ORPHANAGE PARK PLANTING: TO CELEBRATE ITS 75TH BIRTHDAY.

While most of us receive presents on our birthday, the very giving people at the Rotary Club of Unley are marking the club's 75th birthday in 2010 with a lasting gift to the local residents. After donating \$10,000 to Unley Council towards the Orphanage Park transformation, the members are also spending several weekends planting some of the 11,622 new plants that are helping to regenerate the park.

So far, over two sessions, about a thousand seedlings have had their roots tickled and tamped into fresh soil. The first plantings in November last year around the pétanque pitch by the driveway entrance are already putting on lovely growth in the welcome winter rain. On Saturday 5 June, Rotary volunteers got their green thumbs dirty again in a long bed running between the soccer pitch and Tabor College. President of Unley Rotary, Jerry Casburn, said: "Our club spent quite some time deliberating over just the right project to commemorate our 75th birthday and we were thrilled to find this way to do it. So many people use this park daily for sport, exercise, dogwalking, playing, picnicking or just to enjoy its ambience that it seemed like a great fit. This is what Rotary is really all about: service to the community. That's why we've enjoyed the chance to be really hands-on, so to speak, and help with the planting."
