Guest Speaker - Professor Graeme Hugo: "Population Growth the Future"

Chairperson John Russell introduced our guest speaker Graeme Hugo, who is a University Professorial Research Fellow, Professor of Geography and Director of the National Centre for Social Applications of Geographical Information Systems at the University of Adelaide. He is the author of over two hundred books, articles in scholarly journals and chapters in books, as well as a large number of conference papers and reports. In 2002 he secured a \$1.125 million ARC Federation Fellowship over five years for his research project, "The new paradigm of international migration to and from Australia: dimensions, causes and implications".

His talk covered population movement on a Global basis, focusing attention on the impact on Australian population growth of mortality, fertility, and migration.


The current Australian growth per annum is 2.1%. Only three Asian countries have a higher current growth rate. It surprised most of us to hear that our national growth is currently almost twice that of Indonesia.

Some interesting facts shown by the graphs and charts that Graeme produced;

- Until about 1970, South Australia's growth rate was above the rest of Australia, but since that time, our growth rate is well behind the national average.
- Population is of course dependent on birth and death figures. Between 1901 & 1910, a 50 year old male could anticipate a further 21.2 years of life, and a female 23.7 years. In 2008, the relative figures were 31.5 and 35.2 years. Between1901 and 1960, the fertility rate per 1000 females moved between about 3 and 4. Since the introduction of the Pill in 1960, the comparative rate dropped by about 50%.
- Immigration is another factor effecting our growth. Net overseas migration in 2008-09 was about 300,000.

Population growth in the future will affect so many aspects of the life of all Australians. The graph of Structural Ageing for South Australia, above, shows the population of those over 65 up to 2031.

- There will be Labour Force implications.
 - Imminent loss of a third of the workforce,
 - Ageing of workers
 - Retirement policy
- Health Services will be stressed
- Climate Change will need to be considered.
- Where new growth be located.
- The importance of water supply.
- Etc., etc.

Graeme concluded his talk with a statement of what is needed nationally:

- · To recognise the significance of population issues for the nation
- Vigorous informed debate inclusive of all groups.
- Research gaps need to be filled.
- A comprehensive population policy.
- Need to integrate with other areas of policy
- · Need for a vision of Australia's population future
