Guest Speaker - Andy Packer:

Children's Theatre & the Come Out Festival

Andy Packer is your basic overachiever. He's been a performer, writer, conceiver and director of theatre and opera, creative producer of youth arts programs, and producer and director of large-scale outdoor events.

Three years ago, he founded Slingsby, a theatre company producing original productions for adults and young people aged 10 and up.

His first production, *The Tragical Life of Cheeseboy*, presented 62 performances across five continents; this year it's touring North America, including a fortnight on New York's 42nd Street.

His latest production, *Man Covets Bird*, premiered at the 2010 Adelaide Festival to rave reviews, and won the 2010 Ruby Award for Best Work, amongst others.

Andy currently divides his life between Slingsby, his role as Creative Director for COME OUT (the world's largest children's festival in which we will play a role this year, providing the barbecue), and in his spare time plays dad to three boys, and husband to Jane at their home in Fullarton.

Andy talked to us about the vital importance of supporting children's confidence in their own unique creativity, about COME OUT and the remarkable story of how he's

managed to grow Slingsby from an idea into an international touring company with an annual turnover of close to a million dollars. To start, Andy told us that he'd grown up with COME OUT: he was born in 1972 and the festival started in 1974. That's why it means so much to him, personally. It was always one of his secret ambitions to run COME OUT: a dream job, indeed. Today, the festival's shows sell 35,000 to 40,000 tickets, making it a significant cultural event to rival something the size of the Cabaret Festival. This year, he's brought back a part of COME OUT that hasn't been seen for a decade: the opening parade, in which kids take to the streets, marching down the city's main thoroughfares.

As part of this parade, 2,000 children will take part in the Mighty Choir of Small Voices to deliver a Choir of Complaints to the Town Hall (an idea from Finland, in which kids sing what grieves them, from world problems to the taste of broccoli). They will then receive the keys to the city from the mayor. Our barbecue will be part of the Big Family Outing on the River Torrens, with two days of great activities for whole families to participate in together.

One fabulous notion is the Toddlerthéque, which Andy described as "Big Day Out for Toddlers." As for his production company, Slingsby, its early catch cry was: Yorke Peninsula one day; New York the next. This year, that catch cry becomes a reality as Andy's first production, *The Tragical Life of Cheeseboy*, runs for a fortnight on New York's 42nd Street.

From Andy's experience and research, children of 10 are already contemplating the big questions of life that rebound and resound for the rest of their lives. So Slingsby's productions reflect this depth of thinking: children's theatre isn't glove puppets and pantomime. The next project Andy's tackling at the moment is an opera, co-written with his wife, on the life and works of Edward Lear, called *Ode to Nonsense*. We thank Andy for his time and for the opportunity to participate in COME OUT.

Creating a new generation of peacemakers in Uganda

For more than 20 years, northern Uganda lived in the grip of a civil war that killed over 300,000 people, displaced 1.8 million more, and forced 36,000 child soldiers as young as seven years old to fight in the resistance movement.

Although a truce brought an end to the violence in 2006, much work remains to secure a lasting peace.

In November, The Rotary Foundation awarded a US\$16,096 global grant to the Rotary clubs of Rubaga, Uganda, and Lambert Airport, Missouri, USA, to provide training in peace-building to 200 teachers and 1,300 students at 10 high schools in the region. The sponsor clubs will work with the Great Lakes Center for Conflict Resolution in Gulu to carry out the project. The effort also will create "peace clubs" at the schools, which will use music, drama, and other means to provide ongoing education about conflict prevention and resolution to the surrounding communities.

The Great Lakes Center is the brainchild of two former Rotary Peace Fellows, Robert Opira (2005-07) and Godfrey Mukalazi (2004-06), who came up with the idea while studying at the University of Queensland in Australia. The nongovernmental organization is working to address conflict and security challenges in the five-country Great Lakes region, where more than five million people have died since the mid-1990s in conflicts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Rwanda, and Uganda alone.

After the grant project is completed, the center will integrate the training curriculum and peace clubs into its activities and continue to work with the 10 schools. The knowledge and skills acquired by the teachers and students will enable them to become lifelong agents for peace in their communities and the nation.

The project, which is aligned with the peace and conflict prevention/resolution area of focus under the Future Vision Plan, is supported by districts 1911 (Hungary), 5890 (Texas, USA), 6060 (Missouri, USA), 6200 (Louisiana, USA), and 9200 (Eritrea; Ethiopia; Kenya; Tanzania; Uganda). The districts together contributed \$14,597 from their District Designated Fund, and the Rubaga club provided \$3,000.

Rubaga club members helped plan the project's training curriculum and will participate in the training and promote the effort in the local media. They will also assess the project's impact to help ensure its sustainability.

and at the same time show support for the people who are suffering from floods. As this is Australia's largest regional art show, this initiative has the potential to raise in excess of \$20,000.

Also the Rotary Club of Mount Barker has committed \$5,000 to the Flood Appeal and other clubs are making plans to assist.
