

Guest Speaker - Sheradeen Callaghan: "Into Africa"

Our guest speaker Sheradeen Callaghan told us of her trip to Kenya and Tanzania. In these countries nuns and priests are often abducted for ransom. On one of their day trips the driver had to drive at a group of people and ram them to get through to avoid them being abducted.

On her first day in Kenya she met a nun, also a registered nurse who was paralysed. On returning from Tanzania they met again. Sheradeen took her too many doctors and hospitals trying to find out what was wrong with her and learning much about their health system along the way. The nun was unable to gain admission to hospital for treatment as she could not pay or sign her name due to the paralysis. Sheradeen drew on the skills she had gained as a Nursing Sister and eventually marched into a hospital, took over, signed the forms herself and finally had the nun admitted.

The nun lived and worked in the slums and took her to a centre for women and children who are ill and had nowhere to go. The centre was in an iron shed. Inside it was very clean, neat and tidy. On one of the beds on the floor she noticed a very ill woman. The woman called Elizabeth had aids and was an albino. Albinos in Tanzania are hunted and shunned so she had no one to help or support her. She also had a three year old daughter called Rosina.

Elizabeth did not have long to live and was concerned about what would happen to Rosina. When Sheradeen came back to Australia she began raising money to help support Rosina.

Elizabeth died about a month after Sheradeen left and eventually another lady from the centre who was having chemotherapy was well enough to take care of Rosina.

Sheradeen had been to our Thrift Shop before she went overseas and bought women's clothing (some designer labels) to take with her and give to the local women. She also attended three Rotary meetings while she was in Kenya and Tanzania.

Thrift Shop Culling & Clean-up Day

Last Saturday was Culling and Clean-up Day at the Thrift Shop. Most of a regular team of Rotarians and partners rolled-in to the Thrift Shop around 1pm to commence culling or re-pricing slow-moving stock, dumping inferior stock, pricing new stock, and filling racks and shelves with recently donated goods, along with cleaning, dusting, vacuuming and scrubbing. Some unsold and inferior stock was packed for donation to the St Vincent de Paul Society, or was unceremoniously loaded in the trailer for transport to the dump.

John Russell demonstrated his skill with windows (the see-through kind) and his dusting and vacuuming skills (was Barbara making notes?) and made the shop look a picture. Bob Mullins took on the cleaning the bathroom and kitchenette to keep them pristine for our volunteers. David Payne sorted the electrical goods, Bob Laws sorted the books and Lindsay England and John Russell culled clothing. With much trepidation Stephen Westgarth priced all sorts of goods and tried to find places for them on already crowded displays.

Particular thanks go to partners and friends of Rotary: Glenyss Steedman, Barbara Russell, Linda England and Sarah Marr who managed the culling of clothing and reducing the backlog of unpriced goods. Stock awaiting sale has been placed under dust covers ready to be put on display as current display stock is sold and new seasons arrive.

Culling days are held on the second Saturday of each month; all Rotarians, partners and friends are welcome to join in.

Historic Moments: The First Four Rotarians

Rotary International News - 10 February 2011

On 23 February 1905, Paul P. Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram E. Shorey gathered in Loehr's office for what would become known as the first Rotary club meeting.

Harris's desire for camaraderie among business associates brought together these four men and eventually led to an international organization of service and fellowship.

Read about each of the first four Rotarians below, and about Harry L. Ruggles, who is often called the "fifth Rotarian."

Rotary's founder, Harris, was born in Wisconsin, USA, on 19 April 1868. He was raised by his paternal grandparents in Vermont and attended the University of Vermont, Princeton, and the University of Iowa. He was Rotary president from 1910 to 1912 and a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago until his death on 27 January 1947.

Loehr, a mining engineer, was born on 18 October 1864 in Carlinville, Illinois. He was a Rotarian for only a few years, never holding office at the club or international level. But that first Rotary meeting was held in his office, Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. He died in Chicago on 23 May 1918.

A Rotarian for only a few years, Shorey served as recording secretary during the club's first year. He was born in Maine in August 1862 and died in March 1944.

Schiele, a coal dealer, served as the Chicago club's first president in 1905 and Rotary International's third treasurer in 1945. Born in Terre Haute, Indiana, in 1870, Schiele attended Terre Haute Business College and served in the U.S. Army during the Spanish-American War. He was president of the Schiele Coal Company from 1902 until his retirement in 1939. He and Harris became lifelong friends and lived near each other on the South Side of Chicago. Schiele died on 17 December 1945 and is buried near Harris at Mount Hope Cemetery.

Originally from Michigan, Ruggles was a graduate of Northwestern University in Evanston, Illinois, and joined Rotary at its second meeting. He was treasurer of the Chicago club during its first year, president from 1908 to 1910, and a Rotary director from 1912 to 1913. He is known for having introduced singing to Rotary club meetings. His printing company, H.L. Ruggles & Co., printed the first issue of *The National Rotarian* and the first Rotary songbook. He died on 26 October 1959, an honorary member of seven clubs in addition to his home club, the Rotary Club of Chicago.
