Guest Speaker - Adrian Francis: "The Kalahari Experience"

Chairman Stephen Baker introduced guest speaker Adrian Francis. Adrian is a mathematics teacher who has been with Concordia College for 8 year. He coordinates the Kalahari program for the Southern Hemisphere. He had previously taught at private and public high schools. He was to be joined by student Theresa Davis but a car accident (not injurious) prevented her arrival.

In the Moshawang Valley of the Kalahari Desert (750k south west of Johannesburg) in South Africa there are hundred of displaced tribes people who live in abject poverty. In 1991 the Frankfurt Institute began a program of assistance. Over the years a number of schools from across the globe have joined in the effort. Adrian joined Concordia College to the program in 2009. There are three other Australian schools assisting.

Each year a contingent of teachers and students from the schools travel to South Africa to assist in the education of the children. The teachers instruct and the students mentor. In 2005 there were no Moshawang students who passed year 12 – last year 54% of year 12 students succeeded. While the team from Concordia concentrates on Year 10-12 students (who range in age from 16-26), other teams are assisting with the primary and middle schools. In addition to teaching, there have been physical improvements made to the schools (e.g. windows and blackboards) to make them more liveable.

The conditions in the region are harsh with extreme heat and cold. It is estimated that 60% of families are affected by AIDS. There is little or no work available. Many have to walk 15k to reach school.

With the success of the education program, attention is now being turned to building accommodation closer to school, sustainable agriculture, further education (TAFE-like) programs and business micro financing. The impact on the participating college students from Concordia has been dramatic.

Adrian presented a citation to President Joan Reed, thanking Unley Rotary for its assistance.

Sergeant's Session was capably done by David Middleton sparing no one in the room.

Rotaract Council tackles age limit, dues

About 350 Rotaractors voted on proposed recommendations for the RI Board on 20 May, including increasing the age limit for membership, collecting RI dues, and changing the program's name and emblem.

The first Rotaract Council, modeled after Rotary's Council on Legislation, allowed Rotaractors to vote on suggestions about which direction the program should go.

"This was a historic event," said Rotarian and council chair William Duane Benton. "There was excited participation by the Rotaractors. They took it seriously and had very thoughtful debates."

The Rotaractors approved 7 of 15 resolutions proposed by clubs worldwide. The resolutions will be reviewed by the 2011-12 Rotaract and Interact Committee then forwarded to the RI Board of Directors for its September meeting.

The council narrowly approved a recommendation to increase the program's upper age limit from 30 to 35. The clubs that submitted the proposal argued that increasing the limit would allow Rotaractors more time to establish their careers, easing the transition to becoming a Rotarian. Opponents felt it would only prolong the transition.

One Rotaractor said that at 35, he would find it difficult to relate to 18- and 19-year-old members.

In other decisions, the Rotaract Council:

- Rejected a resolution to require club members to pay dues to the district and RI.
 Proponents felt the measure would help fund current district and RI programs and
 prepare Rotaractors for the financial obligations of Rotary club membership.
 Opponents said current club fees and dues are enough, and any additional cost
 would deter people from joining.
- Approved a resolution to give club presidents and officers the opportunity to participate in district training events.
- Rejected a proposal to change the Rotaract emblem. Proponents argued that
 modernizing the emblem would make the program more relevant to younger
 generations. Opponents felt that changing the emblem would be costly and hurt the
 program's brand recognition. The group also rejected a proposal to change the
 program's name.

"This council is such a great catalyst for Rotaract to move forward in the right direction," said Andrea Tirone, a member of the Rotaract and Interact Committee. "We have a unique opportunity to provide input on issues that affect us directly."
