

Vocational Visit: The Unley Museum

In somewhat wet conditions, our plucky crew of 27 brave souls headed into the uncharted waters of the Unley Museum at 80 Edmund Avenue. For many, it was a revelation that Unley indeed has a museum. For others, it was a moment of exquisite nostalgia to see what was originally the old Unley fire station now reused in this way.

Our host, Elizabeth Hartnell, is the enthusiastic curator of this small but fascinating museum, who is driving it into exciting new territories. Elizabeth, who hails from Ohio in the US of A, is a distinguished academic who is also currently a Research Associate in the Archaeology Department at Flinders University. She holds a PhD and MA in anthropology and archaeology from the University of Massachusetts and several other distinctions. However, Elizabeth has not just studied books: she's also spent time as a field archaeologist. One wonders what treasures she might unearth at the Thrift Shop...

On display for our viewing pleasure was the current exhibition, Land of Cakes, which is a warm, diverse and engaging exploration of our cooking heritage. Seeing one recipe, Pauline Daly recounted how she'd once cooked half a pig's head. (Judging by Ken's appetite later, no doubt he would have eaten it.) A few of us rebuilt a cow (see picture for explanation) and debated whether the aitch bone should have had a 'h' at the start.

The art display in another room, which is running in conjunction with SALA, is a unique collection (quite literally) by local artist, Helen Sherriff, who has used found objects from the streets of Unley in her artworks, entitled *Pieces of Peace*. Stephen Baker suggested that his mother might have been somewhat critical of one piece of patchwork as the edges were unfinished. This probably explains a lot about Stephen's drive for perfection.

In the back room is the permanent exhibition on the history of Unley per se. Through some very clever interactive devices, you can learn a lot. For example, our house is on land once owned by Thomas Hardy, father of the South Australian wine industry. Shame he didn't leave any of his product. There was also the interesting fact that in 1923, Unley was South Australia's second largest city with a population of 35,034. After 88 years and enormous change, the population is still roughly the same. Go figure.

We then adjourned to Mamma Carmela's, also now known as Café Pellegrini, where the servings are as generous as the host's welcome. If you didn't make it along, we'd encourage you to go see Unley Museum for yourself and "get a bit of culture" as Mr Baker suggested.

Burton is choice for 2013-14 RI president

Ron D. Burton, a member of the Rotary Club of Norman, Oklahoma, USA, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in 2013-14. Burton will become the president-nominee on 1 October if there are no challenging candidates.

Burton retired as president of the University of Oklahoma Foundation Inc. in 2007. He is a member of the American Bar Association, as well as the bar associations of Cleveland County and the state of Oklahoma. He is admitted to practice in Oklahoma and before the U.S. Supreme Court.

Active in his community, Burton is a founder and past president of the Norman Public School Foundation, and founder and past board member of the Norman Community Foundation. A recipient of the Silver Beaver Award, he is a past vice president of the Last Frontier Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

A Rotarian since 1979, Burton is vice chair of the Future Vision Committee and a member of the Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force for the United States. He has served RI as director; Rotary Foundation trustee and trustee vice chair; International Assembly moderator, assistant moderator, and group discussion leader; and district governor.

His other service to Rotary includes chair of the 2011 New Orleans Convention Committee, vice chair of the Investment Advisory Committee, liaison trustee of the Vocational Service Committee, Permanent Fund national adviser, and regional Rotary Foundation coordinator. He was aide to 2006-07 RI President William B. Boyd.

Burton has received the RI Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, and International Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

Burton and his wife, Jetta, have two children and three grandchildren.

Rotary's First General Secretary - a leetle bit of history

When John Hewko takes office on 1 July, he will be the 12th person to serve as Rotary's general secretary. The first was Chesley Reynolds Perry, a Spanish-American War veteran and former Chicago Public Library employee.

In August 1910, the newly formed National Association of Rotary Clubs unanimously selected Perry for the role, then known as secretary. He accepted the part-time position at \$100 per month, with an agreement that the amount of time he would devote would remain unspecified.

By 1912, the job had evolved into a full-time executive role, and the Board of Directors agreed to increase Perry's salary. His office on LaSalle Street in Chicago served as the first headquarters of the National Association. In 1911, Rotary established an office in the First National Bank Building at Dearborn and Monroe streets. The headquarters would move five more times during Perry's term -- always into rented facilities.

Perry served in the position longer than any of his successors. He also served as editor and business manager of *The Rotarian* from 1911 to 1928, and he opened Rotary's first international office, in Zurich, in February 1925. During his final year in office in 1941-42, the position's title was changed to general secretary.

In 1940, when Perry announced his plans to retire, he agreed to remain in his post while the organization trained his replacement, Philip C. Lovejoy. A number of clubs sought to nominate Perry for RI president in 1942-43, but he declined, saying, "I am gratefully conscious of the high compliment thereby being paid to me."

After retiring, Perry remained a member of the Rotary Club of Chicago, and served as its president in 1944-45. In 1954, Rotary offered him the title "Secretary Emeritus" to honor his years of service, but he again declined, preferring the role of ordinary Rotarian. Perry died on 21 February 1960 at the age of 87.
