Mavis Martin outlined plans for twinning with the Rotary Club of Yorkshire. The three initiatives under discussion are: A student exchange, a quiz, and interaction through Skype. In relation to the proposed quiz Messrs Casburn, Middleton, Peacham and White volunteered to dream up questions about Australia which the Yorkies would have no hope of answering.

Jerry Casburn advised that he has sent a note to all club members which relates to a potential weekend visit to Calperum. He has booked the only available weekend until the New Year, this is the weekend of November 11th to 13th. He is looking for expressions of interest from members and partners to form a minimum group of 10, two to cook and eight to carry out working parties, more can be catered for if required.

As this will be the first weekend it will be more an induction to learn how the station works and the activities undertaken by working groups. Several Clubs have indicated they can't put up a full working party, but have individual Rotarians who would like to go to the Station. Here is an opportunity for a mixed group to do just that. Apart from contributing to the ever present workload at Calperum this is a great opportunity for a splendid social get-together. David is one of our most experienced "Calperum People", so the group will be in good hands.

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Guest Speaker - Adam Gould: "Suicide Prevention"

With chair Joan Reed on the sick list, Stephen Baker introduced guest speaker Adam Gould of *Mental Illness Fellowship of SA*. Adam is an education support officer with MIFSA which was established in 1983. He grew up and was schooled in country Victoria. He graduated as a Bachelor of Engineering from Swinburne University. After a number of jobs he came to SA in 2007 to run Time Share. He suffers from a Bipolar disorder. He spent a year 'living' in and around Hindley St and wrote a book about his experiences. He has first-hand knowledge of the pressures including drug and alcohol abuses which play a role in suicide. He has fond memories of Rotary which assisted him with a youth project when he was 13.

Adam explained that from a 2009 study about 1.5% of all deaths can be attributed to suicide...more than the national road toll. While women may attempt it more often, men are 4 times more effective. Male suicides peak at age 20 but there is now a discernable trend for increasing incidence in the 65+ age group. Female suicide rates stay relatively constant over their lives. One pleasing but inexplicable statistic is that suicide rates appeared to be slowly declining since 2007...perhaps the publicity given to mental illness through Beyond Blue etc is helping.

1 in 4 Australians will be affected by mental illness and there are up to 40,000 people today in SA who are falling through the cracks without visible means of support. A number will pursue suicide as a solution to their problems. Adam stressed the importance of bringing the discussion of suicide out into the open. Bullying and breakups are two prevalent pressure points among young people. The link between marijuana overuse and schizophrenia is now a well established contributor.

The early warning signs include:

- Social withdrawal
- Giving away of possessions
- Decline in performance
- Risk taking behaviour
- Self harm commonly cutting of wrists and back of legs

Suicide is not a middle or higher class phenomenon – quite the opposite – it is more common amongst poorer people.

There is an agreed national framework for handling people at risk – *LIFE* (*Living Is For Everyone*). Two of the most common points of help/intervention are *Emergency Assessment and Crisis Intervention Service* and *Lifeline*.

Adam provided a pamphlet which detailed how people with potential suicidal tendencies should be managed.

The Club thanked Adam in the normal fashion and provided a donation to MIFSA plus the mandatory RCU pen.

Linking New Generations programs keeps participants on track to becoming Rotarians

A mentoring program in District 5160 (California, USA) helps incoming college freshmen – particularly those who are Interact alumni – get connected with university-based Rotaractors. It's just one example of the efforts undertaken by many districts to keep Interactors, Rotaractors, RYLArians, and Rotary Youth Exchange participants in the fold – and on track to become Rotarians.

"It's important to recapture people who fall through the holes, such as an Interactor who graduates from high school, moves away to college, and has trouble finding a Rotaract club," says Joanna Kwong, Rotaract District 5160 representative. "We often refer alumni or recent graduates to the next relevant program. Interactors pool from RYLA and Youth Exchange, and Rotaractors seek membership from former Interactors."

Jim Cambier, past president of the Rotary Club of Danville, California, says that building relationships between New Generations programs is the first step toward ensuring successful transitions.

"Whether it's Interact, Rotaract, RYLA, or Youth Exchange, it's important to let everyone know that these programs all flow together," says Cambier. "When they see the whole connection, they can really understand just how multifaceted New Generations Service is."

To make the transitions seamless, District 5160 is also setting up a district alumni database to track Interactors and Rotaractors in order to link them with a New Generations group, whether within or outside the district.

Rotarians improve access to clean drinking water

Rotarians have teamed up with nongovernmental organizations in Belgium to bring clean drinking water and improved sanitation to thousands of families in the poorest districts of Toamasina, Madagascar. The Rotary clubs of Brussel-Cantersteen, Belgium, and Tamatave, Madagascar, launched the project in 2009 with help from a Rotary Foundation Matching Grant. Lack of access to clean drinking water and poor hygiene have contributed to a high mortality rate in Toamasina, says Luc Daems, president of the Tamatave Water Project. The effort is nearing completion, with the planned installation of more than 200 latrines for local families and schools, as well as drinking fountains to provide clean water for 2,000 people.

Over the past 10 years, the Foundation has awarded more than US\$36 million in grants for projects supporting clean water and sanitation. Individual Rotary clubs have contributed at least another \$50 million.

During World Water Week in Stockholm, Sweden, 21-27 August, experts from around the globe will meet to exchange ideas and develop solutions to the most urgent water-related issues. This year's program explores challenges to water and sanitation in an increasingly urbanized world.

Many Rotary club and district projects include training in the technical knowledge needed to maintain equipment, and in the business skills necessary to manage a water system, such as collecting fees for operations and repairs.

In 2009, Rotary International and USAID launched the International H2O Collaboration to implement long-term water, sanitation, and hygiene projects in the Dominican Republic, Ghana, and the Philippines. Entering its third year, the collaboration is funding hygiene training and bio-sand water filters in the Dominican Republic; mechanized water systems, wells, rainwater collection vessels, and hygiene education benefiting over 85,000 people in more than 110 villages in Ghana; and a project to improve sewage collection and treatment that will help more than 150,000 people in the Philippines.
