
Lauren Manser

Chairman Stephen Baker introduced Lauren Manser who recently attended the International Space Settlement Design Competition in Houston Texas. Lauren is a Year 12 student at Annesley College and is studying Maths, Special Maths, Physics and Chemistry. Lauren had been supported by Unley in her application to attend the NYSF and part sponsored for her Competition participation. Home is in Keith. Her ambitions are to be an engineer and be part of space travel.

Lauren provided a power point presentation. The International Competition was established for secondary school students with an interest in space. This year eight country groups from around the world formed themselves into 4 teams in Houston. Australia had 13 attendees (including students, advisers and supervisors). After an initial orientation the team went sightseeing parts of America including Universal Studios, Epcot, Kennedy Space Centre, Smithsonian National Air and Space Museum, Washington Capitol and memorials and many of the top attractions of New York. At Kennedy Space Centre they were among the first in the world to see the last landing of the now retired Atlantis Space Shuttle....never to be forgotten.

Each team was set the task of successfully populating Mars and given 48 hours to do so...no time for sleep. Australia was paired with California, Iowa and Argentina – the *Grumbo* team. Lauren's special task was human engineering and she was a presenter in the 35 minute contribution. The final results were delivered in the Johnson Space Centre Theatre – Grumbo finished a close second.

In Lauren's own words "My experiences have not only inspired me to follow my dreams, but they have also ignited my passion for space travel. The people I met were incredible individuals and the friendships I have made with members of the Australian and international teams will remain with me forever. Coming back to Australia I feel more confident as an individual and as a leader. I am extremely grateful to the Rotary Club of Unley for providing me with sponsorship to pursue this opportunity – because of your support I have experienced an incredible journey, one that will most definitely remain with me for the rest of my life.

From Canada - The Rotary Foundation

Horn of Africa Fund

In response to the humanitarian crisis in parts of Ethiopia, Kenya, and Somalia, The Rotary Foundation (Canada) has established the Rotary Horn of Africa Famine and Refugee Relief Fund, which will support recovery projects in the affected areas. The worst drought in 60 years has gripped the Horn of Africa, leading to acute famine in parts of Somalia, where hundreds of thousands of people are now fleeing to Ethiopia and Kenya for aid. More than 10 million people are affected in the drought-stricken countries, including 3.7 million who are at risk of starvation.

Voice of change

When Jessica Xavier embarked on a singing career a few years back, one of her first gigs was a Rotary club Christmas concert. She recorded a hit song and appeared on magazine covers and on TV, but then she gave it all up.

"I realized that singing isn't my passion," she says. "Working with kids has always been my dream."

Xavier recently spent a month volunteering in the village of Yupukari, where a nonprofit called Rupununi Learners has set up schools, a cultural center, and a research station devoted to the endangered black caiman, a relative of the alligator. Xavier taught classes, helped write grant proposals, and worked in the library.

Back in Guyana's capital, Georgetown, she runs her own marketing company. Her club is filled with young Rotarians, she says, "and we're one of the most active in terms of outreach."

The club holds an annual career fair for teenagers and organizes two-week medical missions to indigenous communities to screen for diseases such as HIV, cervical cancer, and diabetes. So, even though she still gets stopped on the street and occasionally hears her voice on the radio, Xavier is focusing on others. "Volunteering is an amazing thing," she says. "It's nice to know I can do more than just work for myself."

Papa


A few days later, he received a letter from his son.
