

Guest Speaker - Dr Kerry Ettridge: "Cancer Research"

Dr Kerry Ettridge is the Acting Manager of Research at Cancer Council SA. She has a background in psychology and behavioural research, and her research interests include the factors that influence the uptake of healthy behaviours and the cessation of risk behaviours to prevent cancer. This includes research in the areas of sun protection, bowel cancer screening, diet and physical activity and alcohol consumption.

Kerry indicated that one-third of cancer deaths could be prevented by:

- stopping smoking/not smoking
- maintaining a healthy weight
- sun protection
- sufficient physical activity
- following a healthy diet
- limiting alcohol consumption
- appropriate screening

Her research includes determining whether and to what extent the community knows about links between lifestyle related risk factors and cancer risks and determining what the barriers are to adopting healthier behaviours. Much survey work is undertaken and evaluation of existing health campaigns and policy to ascertain their effectiveness in informing the community on how to become more aware of and better prepared to deal with matters affecting health. Education of the young on the importance of sun protection is very important, as is the monitoring of trends in smoking and the development of alternative strategies to reduce the availability of tobacco products.

Rotary News

India presses its advantage against polio

With just one case of polio reported in the last 10 months, India is more determined than ever to ensure eradication of the disease.

As part of that effort, Rotarians helped administer bivalent oral polio vaccine to more than 35 million children during a Subnational Immunization Day on 13 November. The vaccine is effective against the two remaining types of the virus.

Sporting their signature yellow vests and caps, the Rotarians also helped organize free health camps and polio awareness rallies, as well as distribute banners, caps, face masks, comic books, and other items to the children.

On 20 November, a team of Rotarians from District 3700 (Korea) served in a health camp in Meerut, Uttar Pradesh, which included immunization of children against polio. The camp was organized by Indian Rotarians in cooperation with local health officials and UNICEF.

The following day, the team took part in a door-to-door mop-up campaign, administering vaccine to children who otherwise would have missed receiving it. A TV news crew from Korea accompanied the Rotarians throughout their visit, taking the End Polio Now message back to their country.

And in Mumbai, Rotary leaders John Germ, chair of Rotary's US\$200 Million Challenge Committee; Rotary Foundation Trustee Ashok Mahajan; and RI General Secretary John Hewko joined Indian Rotarians in immunizing children.

"This year, there have been just over 500 cases worldwide. The fact that only one of those cases is in India is a tremendous achievement that reflects the determination of the nation's leaders and its citizens to finally rid their country -- and the world -- of this terrible scourge," Hewko wrote in an article published earlier this month in the Hindu Business Line.

India's next National Immunization Days are scheduled for January and February, and a series of supplementary activities are planned through June. At the same time, intensive surveillance for the wild poliovirus is continuing throughout the country.

"Rotary has invested heavily in surveillance in India over the last 12 months," said Bruce Aylward, the World Health Organization's assistant director-general for polio eradication and related areas, at a September meeting of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "That's the reason we can say with confidence that we think we're getting close to zero [cases] in India."

The comeback of Comely Bank

For nearly 40 years, Paul and Jean Harris hosted Rotary board meetings and entertained visiting dignitaries in their home on Chicago's South Side, which they affectionately called Comely Bank after the street where Jean grew up in Edinburgh, Scotland. Today, the house stands in disrepair, its walls stripped to bare studs, as the group of Rotarians that owns it struggles to raise the money for a restoration.

"Comely Bank is the Mount Vernon of Rotary – it's the home of our founder, and it's too important an asset to not do something about it," says Robert Knuepfer, 2010-11 governor of District 6450 (Illinois) and president of the Paul and Jean Harris Home Foundation.

After Paul Harris died in 1947, Jean sold the home. It remained in private hands until the spring of 2005, when the Harris Home Foundation, headed by local Rotarians who had frequently inquired about the house, purchased it with \$500,000 borrowed from the charitable foundation of the nearby Rotary Club of Naperville. The group made some immediate structural repairs to the century-old, Tudor-style home, such as putting in a new basement floor and shoring up the old stone foundation, so the site would be safe for Rotarians visiting during that centennial year.

The Harris Home Foundation's vision for the future is to restore the house to the way it looked in 1947, but with a few "special technical surprises," as Knuepfer puts it. The foundation plans to digitize archival materials including videos, recordings of Harris' speeches, and still photographs, and to install digital monitors in each room to show visitors what life was like there.

But without the money to complete the repairs, the restoration project has been at a standstill, the rooms littered with bundles of insulation and construction debris.

Rotarians of the Harris Home Foundation have embarked on a campaign to raise \$3 million to pay off the debt and interest on the house, complete the renovations, and establish an endowment to pay for maintenance in perpetuity. When the restoration is complete, Knuepfer says, the home could be used as a meeting place for the RI Board and local or visiting clubs, and as a venue for Rotary Foundation functions. The Harris Home Foundation board also envisions creating a Rotary history trail, with stops at Comely Bank, the nearby gravesite of Paul Harris, and Room 711 at RI World Headquarters in Evanston – a re-creation of the office where the first Rotary meeting was held.
