Guest Speaker - Darren Birbeck from ECH

Mavis Martin, Chair for the night introduced Mr. Darren Birbeck, General Manager, Corporate Services, Elderly Citizens Homes (ECH). Darren has a B. Economics and MBA, has worked at ECH for the past seven years and is married with two children. He has a diversity of roles and skills relating to information technology, professional development for staff, and succession planning in order to enable ECH to provide care that reflects contemporary service provision to our elderly citizens.

Elderly Citizens Homes of SA Incorporated was registered on July 2nd 1964 and is a non-denominational, non-for-profit charity providing care services for older people. Since its inception ECH has diversified and now consists of 1625 Independent Living Units across 96 locations, 7 Residential Care Centres with 794 bed licences, 4 Community Service Sites, 4 Therapy Service Locations, 5 Day

Programs and 2 Living Well programs. There are over 1300 employees. The focus of ECH is to provide quality affordable homes and support to enrich the lives of older people; its values are focused around integrity, respect and empathy. The older models of care provision based on rigid medical and organisational routines that created resident dependence have gone. In their place are models for flexible care and service delivery and resident choices enabling promotion of resident independence. Examples are home like environments that have had resident input to presentation, sleep ins for people who are not early risers and exercise programs that focus on 'can do' as opposed to 'cannot do'. For people suffering memory loss and confusion there are programs linking them with the community enabling them to re-acquaint themselves with previous skills and share their attributes with others. An example is the Art Project with students of Pembroke School. Staff are involved in retreats focusing on how want to be treated when older, to try and put them in the shoes of those they care for.

There are various active programs in place for ongoing site upgrades and unit refurbishment including kitchen and bathroom renovations as determined by residents and aesthetically and more user-friendly outdoor areas.

Darren answered a variety of questions from members that further added to the excellent insight he gave us to the ultra-contemporary provision of care and services for older people in South Australia.

Rotarian Robert Pennicott together with Mick Souter and cameraman Zorro Gamarnik recently became the first people to achieve a very Australian record; the circumnavigation of Australia (including Tasmania) in two 5.4 metre yellow rubber dinghies propelled by twin 60 horsepower outboards.

Robert will present highlights of the journey including details of some of their travelling companions.

The trip raised nearly \$275,000 for Rotary' PolioPlus. Robert's two children, Mia and Noah, came aboard for the final leg from Hobart to Sydney. "I'm very proud of them, it can be rough. They did 14 or 15 hours across Bass Strait.

Robert, entrepreneur, environmentalist, adventurer, philanthropist and multi-award-winning pioneer of Tasmania's eco-tourism industry was named as Tasmania's 2012 Australian of the Year for Rob's achievements in a range of areas over a number of years.
