Club Assembly

President Sheila opened proceedings and the following reports were provided.

Treasurer Heather Kilsby provided members with copies of the accounts as at 31 March 2012 and reported that the audit of the 2010/11 books had been completed; the thrift shop receipts were \$7000 lower than at the same time last year; and members subscriptions were at this stage just sufficient to cover servicing costs.

Thrift Shop Director Lindsay England thanked Briony Lyon for her special efforts to rearrange the thrift shop; announced that the shop will be improved by proposed carpet replacement and painting; estimated that there had to be \$37,000 in takings before a profit is made...and this year the revenue may be down by as much as \$9,000; talked about the challenges of managing 55 volunteers.

Membership Director John Peacham emphasized the need for greater effort on membership recruitment in the carrying out of club projects; mentioned the development of brochures and materials for handing out at the local football and for placement in areas such as doctors' surgeries – 'Humanities in Motion' and the Group 6 bulletin are about to emerge; community liaison should be given a higher priority.

Community Service Director Wendy Andrews outlined donations to Unley Primary School (iPad); children with special needs for a zoo visit; Salvation Army for a new gate and Christmas lunch for the needy; Christmas cakes for delivery by Meals on Wheels; support for Louise Place; and the Young Carers Retreat at Hindmarsh Island. Wendy outlined the very positive feedback received from the 23 carers who attended the retreat.....it was a big winner and did much for their morale! The net cost after donations will be about \$3,000.

International Director Alex Jonson outlined the projects being supported under his budget which had been reduced to \$15,000. The main components include donations to The Rotary Foundation including the annual program (we now have sufficient credit for over 20 Paul Harris Fellows) and the Polio Challenge; a project for purchase of equipment for disabled students is pending. RAWCS (Rotary Australia World Community Service) is being supported with eye wear for the Gift of Sight Nepal Project, and donations for Shelter Boxes and ROMAC. Other contributions include OSSAA, and musical instruments for a school in Penang Malaysia. The Wasleys have donated a further \$18,500 to the club, have dried 3-4 tonnes of grapes and are collecting clothing with the assistance of Riverland Clubs for the next DIK container to Timor Lesté. Two projects awaiting finalization are the bore wells in India and the VW Kombi in Brazil.

Vocational Service Director Stephen Baker announced that there had been 15 nominations for POOTY this year and with the support of Group 6 clubs the presentation dinner should be well attended - the aim is to make it a State Rotary event. He outlined progress with RYPEN, RYLA, CSI and NYSF. One challenge is to get more secondary students

involved in The Science Experience conducted by our three Universities during the main school break.

Stephen Westgarth suggested that the next club consultation should be dedicated to discussing the challenges set by Stuart Heal with particular emphasis on membership recruitment. Mavis Martin pointed to Rotary Down Under as a good source of ideas that could be pursued.

VENUE and CATERING

Stephen Baker outlined the need to provide greater certainty of tenure for the Unley Park Sports Club. A motion moved by Stephen Westgarth to commit the club to attendance at the UPSC until 30 June was approved by the club. A committee, comprising volunteers Stephen Westgarth, Briony Lyon, John Peacham and Alex Jonson will look into available opportunities.

Sergeant's Session

Rotary News

A Snippet from RIBI (Rotary International in Great Britain and Ireland)

A nationwide project aimed at supporting families living with dementia has hailed the news of increased Government support for dementia research as a positive step in the right direction.

REPoD (Rotarians Easing Problems of Dementia) is a network for Rotary clubs across Great Britain and Ireland who provide practical support to local families living with dementia.

Prime Minister David Cameron today announced that funding for research into diagnosis would be increased to £66m by 2015, adding that the issue should be treated as a "national crisis".

REPoD chairman Dr Geri Parlby said: "Dementia research has been seriously underfunded for some time, and it is something Rotary clubs have been very proactive in supporting. This Government announcement is a very positive step towards finding a cure, but there is still an enormous amount of community support needed to help families who are currently living with dementia".

Alongside fundraising some of the many projects that Rotary clubs are involved with include Memory Cafes offering support to both carers and people with dementia, forget-me-not community gardens, befriending, hospital visiting and Memory Box donations.

Rotary clubs support many projects across Great Britain and Ireland and overseas by working with people, charities and organisations to improve the lives of others. Rotary clubs are based within local communities, with their members meeting on a regular basis to enjoying friendship, networking, and to plan projects that will benefit the lives of others.

Rotary International signs project partner agreement with ShelterBox

Rotary International and ShelterBox, a grassroots disaster relief organization, signed a project partner agreement this month, allowing the two organizations to collaborate more closely to provide relief and temporary shelter to survivors of natural disasters.

"Project partner" is a special status RI gives to groups started or managed by Rotary clubs. The agreement will build on the strengths of both organizations in responding to disasters all over the world.

"Our Rotary friends have always been there ready to assist - from generous donations to direct operational support on the ground Rotary has always been part of our DNA," said Tom Henderson, ShelterBox CEO. "I feel like we have 34,000 ShelterBox offices around the world working together to help those who have lost everything when they need us the most."

"For more than 10 years, ShelterBox has given light to over one hundred thousand families worldwide in their darkest hour," said RI General Secretary John Hewko.

ShelterBox CEO Tom Henderson noted, "This partnership with Rotary International is a formal recognition of our good work over the past 12 years. It will help Rotarians get a better understanding of what we do. I hope Rotarians worldwide will see us as a coherent and able disaster relief organization."

Earlier this month, a ShelterBox team distributed more than 550 tents to communities in Madagascar where powerful cyclones left more than 250,000 people homeless.
