# Ceremony in the Mall

**Assistant Commissioner Bryan Fahy,** in the presence of DG Bruce Richardson and the Police Band, opened proceedings for the presentation of the South Australia Police Officer of the Year 2011 at 12.30pm in the Rundle Mall, as organized by the SA Police.

**President Sheila Evans** announced that Sergeant Caroline Bristow, the Murray Mallee Crime Prevention Section Supervisor stationed at Berri Police Station was the 2011 recipient of the award. Caroline (preferring Carol) joined the force in 1986, and was first assigned to patrol work in Adelaide. Two years later she went country and has been there ever since serving on patrols in Port Pirie, as a prosecutor in Berri, thence to the Riverland Community Program and is now supervising crime prevention.

Carol, during her over 20 years in the Riverland, has made major contributions to the Juvenile Justice Framework, Blue Light, and Neighbourhood Watch, and very often in her own time.

It is worth noting that Carol has been at the forefront of change. Examples of her initiatives are:

- being a driving force behind the successful 'Calperum on the Land Program' which changes the lives of 'at risk' juveniles through upskilling, lifting pride through success, and treatment for substance abuse. This program, which she continues to manage, was recognised with a Certificate of Merit at the 2011 Australian Crime and Violence Prevention Awards.
- being the catalyst behind the establishment of E-business Watch which strengthens ties between local businesses and police and is contributing to more effective crime prevention.

Other examples of Carol's selflessness included a recent trip to Tanzania to help build a school and provide teaching skills; receiving the Riverland Women in Business – Business Managers award in 2005; being an intrepid judge of many and varied events in the Riverland; being at all times responsive to requests for assistance.

President Sheila presented the POOTY citation and shield to Sergeant Bristow, and thanked all those involved in the organisation of the event.

# POOTY Dinner - Glenelg Golf Club

MC Greg McLeod commenced proceedings at 7.30pm - background music was provided by the Police Band duet of the 'Two Dads'.

President Sheila Evans formally opened the meeting and welcomed guests, including David Pisoni MP, Police Commissioner Mal Hyde, DG Bruce Richardson, DGE Roy Armstrong, AG Mark Huddleston, POOTY awardees 2010 and 2011, members and partners of Unley, Hyde Park and Brownhill Creek Clubs.

DG Bruce Richardson reflected that he knew the winner of this year's award well through Rotary and GSE involvement. He provided a background on major international programs. Polio Plus was closing in on its goal of a polio free world. In the mid 1980s polio was newly infecting over a 1000 people per day – for the whole of last year there were only 52 cases reported in 4 countries. Other programs mentioned which reflected the broad range of rotary service were Rotary Volunteers Abroad building infrastructure such as schools and sanitation in developing countries, the youth exchange programs and Shelter Box.

Jerry Casburn conducted a Q&A interrogation of POOTY 2010 awardees Monique Anderson and Ian Skewes.

Chairman Stephen Baker provided a brief background to the award – this is the 175<sup>th</sup> year of policing in South Australia and the 34<sup>th</sup> year of the award. Fortunately policing has improved since the beginnings of the colony when the Royal Marines who arrived on the Buffalo were of quite dubious quality. He announced the South Australia Police Officer of the Year 2011 was, for the reasons expressed in the Mall ceremony (see above), Sergeant Caroline Bristow, the Murray Mallee Crime Prevention Section Supervisor stationed at Berri Police Station. One of the stars on her chart is that she is a Rotary Club Past President. We think this is the first time a Rotarian has won the award

President Sheila presented Carol with the citation, POOTY shield and POOTY badge.

Carol Bristow in her response explained that having graduated from patrol work, to prosecutions and then to crime prevention that she was now involved in areas which provided a great deal of satisfaction and reward. In a recent trip to Vietnam she had noticed the lack of esteem for police because of endemic corruption – this contrasts with the well regarded SA Police. She emphasized the value of teamwork, the positive police culture in SA and the quality of her supervisors. She thanked the Rotary Club of Unley for the award.

Chairman Stephen Baker noted that Commissioner Mal Hyde would be retiring shortly after a distinguished career of 15 years as the head of SA Police.

The Commissioner was presented with the perpetual shield by President Sheila who commented that, according to a survey just released, SA had the most highly regarded police force in Australia. Mal Hyde explained that SA Police had a culture built on the principles of Robert Peel's community policing ideals of the early 19<sup>th</sup> century which recognised the fundamental importance of community involvement. Crime prevention, because of increasing complexity and risk, had become a key element over the past two decades. Unley Rotary was thanked for the conduct of the award.

Both Carol and the Commissioner were given standing ovations.

The chairman thanked everyone for their support and attendance. The meeting closed at 10.10pm.
