MC Jerry Casburn opened proceedings at the Kooyonga Golf Club at 7.30pm and welcomed DG (almost) Roy Armstrong and Marilyn. **President Sheila** welcomed all the guests and returning Rotarian Nathan White.

MC Jerry Casburn gave segments of the club's history throughout the night, beginning with the Charter of 17 April 1935 by Sir Angus Michael. He later related how many important projects had been instigated by RCU including the Rotunda, POOTY, Memorial Gardens improvements, the Thrift Shop, initiation of OSSAA and contributions of over \$120,000 to RI. Unley has been a prolific mother....7 daughters (Prospect, Murray Bridge, Port Pirie, Mitcham, Mt Barker, Glen Osmond and Hyde Park.....which clubs spawned 15 grand-daughters and 5 great grand-daughters. Unley has provided 5 out of 54 District Governors.

Greg McLeod gave the toast to Rotary International.

In his response **DGE Roy Armstrong** informed members of the San Diego training he experienced last year, the ongoing challenge of Polio Plus, and the importance of the Rotary Foundation and GSE. His main goals under the umbrella of RI President Sakuji Tanaka's theme of "Peace through Service" are to *strengthen clubs*, *enhance humanitarian service* and *lift Rotary's public image*. Specific initiatives would include:

Stephen Westgarth thanked DG Roy Armstrong, PP and DGN Jerry Casburn and IPP Sheila Evans. He related that it was but 6 years since his last term in office and then made the following comments:

"DG Roy said at the recent Presidents Elect Training Seminar that peace is better defined not by what it is but rather by what it is not. Peace can mean the absence of hunger and thirst, the absence of debilitating or fatal disease, the absence of fear, the absence of the threat of violence, the absence of exposure to the elements, the absence of ignorance, the absence of isolation and the absence of hopelessness.

Since 1935 Unley Rotary has consistently shown that it can make a difference in alleviating threats to peace by helping to improve agriculture, provide access to clean water, foster education, facilitate access to expert health care, eradicate disease, provide shelter to victims of disasters, and alleviate poverty, not just in countries overseas but also here at home.

I believe that Unley Rotary this year will make a solid and valuable contribution to the realization of peace around the world through the service we deliver. What we can achieve will be limited only by our imagination, our stamina and our resolve, which means together we can achieve a great deal.

Rotary News

Sintra, just one of many attractions awaiting you during the 2013 RI Convention in Lisbon, Portugal By Susie Ma - The Rotarian -- July 2012

Perched in the hills 20 miles from Lisbon, Portugal, is the village of Sintra, a UNESCO World Heritage site that Lord Byron called "a glorious Eden."

Rotarians attending the 2013 RI Convention, 23-26 June, will find enough cultural attractions and stunning scenery to make the 40-minute train ride worth their while.

Pena Palace, a former summer residence of Portuguese royals, offers million-euro views of the coast. Spend an afternoon touring the yellow, purple, and pink castle and wandering the trails through the parklike grounds.

The 9th-century **Moorish Castle** was taken over in the 12th century during the Christian reconquest of Portugal. After a 1755 earthquake caused serious damage, it fell into romantic ruin. The **National Palace** in Sintra's historic center offers a better-preserved example of a Moorish-style castle.

At the turn of the 20th century, a Portuguese millionaire decided to turn his mystical dreams into reality. The result is the **Quinta da Regaleira**, or Regaleira Estate, whose strange and wonderful grounds are full of winding paths leading to delightful hideouts, lush gardens, grottoes, fountains, and towers. The adventurous visitor can traverse the property via a pitch-black tunnel system. (Bring a flashlight.)

The **Sintra Museum of Modern Art**, which offers a respite from climbing castle stairs, houses part of the collection of millionaire Joe Berardo, including works by Picasso, Mondrian, Warhol, de Kooning, Calder, and many Portuguese artists.
