

Vice President Wendy's Announcements

- 1. Emergency Management: The District has a role in assisting the State's Emergency Management when a state emergency is declared. Housing SA has the lead responsibility for establishing emergency relief centres. Rotary has agreed, under a Memorandum of Understanding, to undertake a role within the emergency centres along with Lions, Red Cross and Pastoral Ministry.
- 2. Shelter Boxes A newsletter was received from Mike Greenslade, Communication Officer for Shelter Box Australia. He writes that he is currently deployed in Nigeria. As the media is filled with the tragic consequences of Super Storm Sandy, it's easy to forget that here in Nigeria, over 1m people have been made homeless by the worst floods in 50 years. In Iraq, Syrian refugees fleeing the terrible violence that is tearing their country apart urgently need shelter and warmth as winter approaches.
 - ShelterBox is responding and as boxes go out, we need money to replenish stock, continue training and fund boxes for the next disaster, to provide shelter, warmth and dignity to those who have lost everything.
- 3. District Conference to be held in Tanunda in April next year. Lindsay England was interviewed by VP Wendy the conference in Mildura was the first he had attended. His wife, Linda, was at first reluctant to attend, as she thought she would not have enough to do, but enjoyed joining in the sessions and activities. Lindsay found the speakers inspirational, mixing with other Rotarians enjoyable, as well as attending the social activities and tours. He recommends we all attend and bring our partners.

Guest Speakers-Andy Poad and Leanne Madison from AA

Chairman Jerry Casburn introduced Andy Poad and Leanne Madison, guest speakers for the evening. Both are members of Alcoholics Anonymous (AA), Andy is Treatment and Correction Facilities Officer and Leanne is Public Information Officer for the area. Andy is a builder by trade and is married with two step-children and one son residing in the UK. Leanne is a Senior Constable with SAPOL, has been part of the force for 25 years, and has an 18 year old son.

Andy began the presentation with that familiar expression "I am Andy Poad and I am an alcoholic". He continued by familiarising the club with the book Alcoholics Anonymous, explaining that the first pages contain the means for an alcoholic to survive and become free of the illness of alcohol addiction. In explaining AA and how it functions, he went on to describe the organisation which meets frequently as a fellowship, designed to help people to free themselves from addiction. There are no fees or charges, members give what they can to support costs. The organisation is also non-sectarian and bi-partisan in structure. Its primary purpose is to stay sober and help others to achieve sobriety. Starting in the 1930s it was preceded by an American organisation, the Oxford Group.

Andy described his own life with 20 years of drinking and substance abuse.....his drinking escalated when he joined the merchant marines at 17 and became a 'member of the society of fellow drinkers'. At one point he contemplated suicide; AA helped him survive. He found himself reluctantly at an AA meeting but realised that he had an illness and set about correcting the issue. He gave up drink on August 24th 1999.

Andy explained that alcoholism is an illness of the body and mind. Cravings were generated with no control. It was a constant internal battle to avoid drinking.....alcohol won. The illness cost Andy his marriage, his wife warning him of the suffering caused by his drinking and the danger of continuing. Andy will always be an alcoholic but he will not suffer from alcoholism because he will not take that first drink.

The AA solution embodies 12 steps to recovery which generate permanent change.

Leanne then described her own different situation. She has been sober for six years. In her case she binge drank, remaining drink free for the days she was working and then letting it all go when she was not. Surrounded by a family of heavy drinkers she also had a fiancée who attended rehab. When she attended an AA meeting and found that what members described was her own situation, she sought the cure. She also said that she would be attending AA meetings for the rest of her life.

The club acknowledged the bravery of Leanne and Andy for tackling their illness, also for having the courage to tell others. An illuminating evening and one in which it could be easily believed "there but for the grace of God...""

Rotary News

Interact clubs celebrate the program's golden anniversary

The very first Interact club, formed at Melbourne High School in Melbourne, Florida, USA, is joining Interact clubs and their sponsors around the globe in celebrating the program's 50th anniversary during World Interact Week, 5-11 November.

The Melbourne club received its charter in November 1962, under the guidance and sponsorship of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, Florida, USA. In celebration of the golden anniversary, charter members of the club joined current Interactors and Rotarians from District 6930 for a night of reflection and fellowship.

"What makes Rotary great is what makes Interact great," says Michael Welch, president of the Rotary Club of Melbourne, who helped plan the anniversary event. "For a person -- especially a young person, an Interactor -- to appreciate the concept of Service Above Self, and then put it to work on their own time, it's a special experience that can change a lot of lives."

As part of the celebration, Melbourne Interactors gave a presentation on the history of Interact. District Governor-nominee Juan Ortega explained how his experiences with Interact in Colombia led him to join Rotary.

The Interact Club of Robert E. Lee High School in Baytown, Texas, USA, which was chartered just months after the club in Melbourne, is celebrating the anniversary with various events, including a roundup on 15 September that was attended by more than 320 Interactors from across District 5890.

The Texas Interactors created a video showing photos and projects from the past five decades, in addition to networking with fellow Interactors and Rotarians.

The celebrations continued 27 September as RI President Sakuji Tanaka spoke at an allclub meeting held by the district. Garrett Kneese, a district Interact leader, discussed the importance of Interact and Rotary.

The Interactors are also conducting service projects to mark the anniversary. District Interactors went door-to-door with their Rotary sponsors on 31 October collecting nonperishable food for the district's Interact Hungry Harvest program. The club set a goal of donating 3,000 cans to local food pantries and issued a challenge to other Interact clubs to match their efforts.

As an ongoing service project, the Interactions sort and pack used textbooks for Rotary Books for the World, a literacy project that collects reading and writing materials for schools in the developing world.

Attendance

Tommie Buscemi, a member of the Rotary Club of Kingwood, Texas, USA, and co-chair of

the district's Interact committee, says she's seen how Interact has benefited its members by showing them how valuable they are to their community. "They're the future of our country and the future of Rotary," she says. "The program rewards them for being great leaders. They step up and do what's important."

Buscemi adds that Rotary clubs can also benefit by working with Interactors. "They inspire Rotarians to look at things differently," she says. "They're teaching us, through social media, how we can change the way we're doing things and how we can make a bigger impact."

Other celebrations

In San Antonio, Texas, District 5840 is holding its third annual New Generations Interact Conference at The Winston School San Antonio on 10 November. Tom Thorfinnson, a past RI director and vice president, will be the keynote speaker.

Five Interact clubs are working with Habitat for Humanity on a building project in January, and 12 Interact clubs are raising money for wells in Honduras. Interactors are holding fundraisers, including a golf tournament and a 5K run, in an attempt to raise US\$11,500. The district has also created pins commemorating the 50th anniversary for Interactors.

As a child growing up in Montreal, Ryan Rowe resented his parents' requirement that he learn a second language. "I hated having to learn French," says the 2010-12 Rotary Peace Fellow, who earned a master's degree in public health from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in May, along with a certificate in peace and conflict resolution. "I never expected that I would come to love learning new languages."

Rowe, 34, now speaks Spanish and Portuguese in addition to English and French, and he's recently taken up Mandarin Chinese. Learning new languages is something Rowe does as a hobby. His official line of work – the stuff he's really serious about – is water and sanitation. That was his specialty at UNC, where he studied at the internationally acclaimed Water Institute. Today he is a part-time communications officer at the institute and quenches his thirst for volunteer opportunities on water projects in Africa, with Rotary and other organizations.
