

President Stephen's Announcements

- 1. - 2. RI Peace Forum & Dinner: Rotary Districts 9500 and 9520 will be holding a Peace Forum on Saturday 23 February 2013. As you know, World President Sukuji Tanaka has a theme "Peace through Service." Rotarians throughout the world are being asked to show that Rotary and Rotarians world wide support Peace in all of its forms, nationally, locally and in personal lives. Berlin, Hiroshima, and Pearl Harbor have been chosen as sites for internationally recognised Peace Forums. Our local forum is supported by all Rotary clubs in South Australia as well as selected clubs in Victoria, NSW and Northern Territory.

The Forum program includes a short march to Adelaide Oval after which participants will have the opportunity to hear leading authorities speak about aspects of Peace which have affected their lives.

That evening a Peace Dinner will be held at Adelaide Oval, also in the Members Dining Room, from 6.30 to 10.00pm. The cost is \$55 per head with a cash bar operating.

Induction of Ken Haines

President Stephen inducted former member and now new member Ken Haines into the club.

Guest Speaker - Shane Mitchell:

When you need a plumber in the Antarctic

Stephen Westgarth introduced Shane, who is a close friend of Simon Westgarth, to the club. He was born in Adelaide, educated in Banksia Park, gained his plumbing qualifications (4th generation) and headed off around Australia to various remote localities. He loves the outdoors and rock climbing. In 2010 after a year of assessment he boarded the Australian icebreaker 'Aurora Australia' bound for the Davis Station in the Antarctic. This station was established in 1957 and currently carries out 4 major functions:

- the LIDAR project weather monitoring to assist world forecasting
- · Geotech measurement of ground movement
- · Marine science project monitoring of marine life
- · Tagging and satellite tracking of penguins.

His job as the Mechanical Services Plumber was to keep the station and its mechanical equipment (particularly heating) running smoothly. Other tasks included fire team duties, medical support and survival training. During the more benign months (more precisely 8 weeks when temperatures get over zero), the station has 100 personnel; during the tougher months (temperatures of -30C with strong chill factor the team) is reduced to 24.

Shane provided a marvelous insight into the challenges and highlights of living in this environment including getting badly sunburnt at midnight, playing with the happy penguins, warding off elephant seals which often weigh over a tonne and threaten vital equipment, visiting the meteorological huts,

shooting the magnificent scenery and having fun during the 2 months of 'warmth'. He has been asked to return but would only do so on a short term basis.....too many living opportunities in the world beyond the Antarctic. Shane answered numerous questions and was applauded for his presentation (+ pen rewarded).

Spots

Jerry Casburn advised that:

- a. Volunteers are needed for the Detmold Packaging Christmas BBQ for their Christmas celebrations on Friday December 21st. Lindsay England thanked all those who had assisted, and particularly supervisor Bob Mullins (note the crowbar), in moving the material at the Thrift Shop for the carpet laying. Work is to resume on Wednesday to reopen the shop on Thursday. A short TS Committee meeting will be held.

Briony Casburn advised that:

- a. The club has been successful in getting a District Simplified Grant of \$1,400 to put towards the 2H Program in Cambodia; this has been increased to \$2,000 with the club adding \$600. A cheque will be presented at a future meeting to support projects such as providing sewing machines and looms to develop small businesses among the poorest families.
- b. Members were thanked for their contributions towards the Christmas hamper which looks fantastic, with proceeds going to Operation Cleft. Tickets are 50c. Rotarians are asked to promote the raffle when making sales at the shop.

Spotlight on sanitation for World Toilet Day

Aid agencies and international groups are using this year's World Toilet Day to highlight the risks to women and children from poor sanitation. Since 2001, November 19 has marked World Toilet Day, drawing attention to issues of toileting and sanitation worldwide. The United Nations says more than 2.7 million people die each year due to lack of sanitation, with almost 2,000 children dying each day from unsanitary conditions.

In her latest report to the UN General Assembly, Catarina de Albuquerque, the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the human right to safe drinking water and sanitation, has called for the elimination of inequalities in access to water and sanitation. She's told Radio Australia's Connect Asia program the problem extends beyond the right to sanitation, to other rights including health, education, work and the right to lead a life in dignity.

"It is a crisis that we are facing, and since sanitation is a taboo issue, it's something dirty that we want to hide, we don't want to talk about it."

So if we don't talk about and if we make a taboo around it, obviously it's very difficult for governments to prioritise it in their policy and address this problem." she said.

The United Nations says a lack of access to toilets remains an important source of global inequality, with poor sanitation almost exclusively a burden of the poor. It says lacking sanitation not only made poor people sick; it also shrank their already limited possibilities by forcing them to stay away from school and work.



So many unsanitary toilets

Each year, children miss a total of 272 million school days due to water-borne or sanitation-related diseases. "Each time I go on a mission for the UN, I always visit a school, and I always talk with the girls, and not having sanitation - not having girls' only toilets - means after they reach puberty, they don't go to school - especially if they have their period" she said. "And I met some girls who tell me they miss school for one week a month...so you see the dimensions of the tragedy. "Jane Caro from international NGO WaterAid says, "The aim of World Toilet Day is to bring the issue of sanitation out into the open." Each year, children miss a total of 272 million school days due to water-borne or sanitation-related diseases.

"As long as we keep it hidden - partly because it's such a taboo, shameful kind of subject still, shamefully - there isn't the same kind of pressure to provide this kind of infrastructure as there is perhaps for other things," she said. "...it is that silence that has allowed this to go on, and avoid thinking about it, and avoid...actually raising awareness, increasing pressure...and generally just being more open about the issue, which is I think the first step towards doing something about it."

WaterAid says 1 in 3 women and girls do not have access to toilets, and unsafe or open toilets increase the risks of physical and sexual violence. Ms Caro says they've found World Toilet Day events such as 'Big Squat' flash mobs help to raise awareness of the dangers through humour.

"When I started...to think about what it would be like to be a woman in a village where there was no toilet - or only one - and where it was not only embarrassing to reveal my needs, but possibly dangerous? It made me think."

"There's an obvious way to get people to talk about it, and that is our tendency to have 'toilet humour' as part of the way we joke with one another," she said.

"I actually think using some humour...[makes] people think, because that's what it did for me when I started to know about this, was actually to think about what it would be like to be a woman in a village where there was no toilet - or only one - and where it was not only embarrassing to reveal my needs, but possibly dangerous. "It made me think."

One organisation working on the ground in Papua New Guinea is A-T Projects, which uses local materials to develop toilets for schools and communities in in Goroka Province. Director Miriam Layton says while some foreign aid helps in setting up proper sanitation, more needs to be done by the local and PNG governments to improve facilities.

She says she hopes the new female governor of Eastern Highlands province will help drive the push to improve sanitation needs for women. "In our urban centres, as well as rural centres, there are no proper facilities to cater for women's needs as well," she said.

"So when women come for business in town or for markets as well, they face problems when looking for toilets, and that is when they are arrested and there's violence.

"At the moment we are still getting support from outside, not our own government - so we need to do a lot more work to convince the Papua New Guinea government, as well as the donors, to do more in this area."
