

President Stephen's Announcements

Lunch with RI President Elect Ron D Burton:

Last Thursday three of our members attended a lunch organised by the Rotary Club of Adelaide to hear from Rotary International President Elect Ron D. Burton (2013-14). The lunch was attended by the Governor Rear Admiral Kevin Scarce, Past RI President Bill Boyd and DGs of Districts 9500 and 9520 Marie Dorrington and Roy Armstrong.

PE Ron Burton is a member of the Rotary Club of Norman, Oklahoma. He retired as president of the University of Oklahoma Foundation Inc. in 2007. He is a member of the American Bar Association, as well as the bar associations of Cleveland County and the state of Oklahoma. He is admitted to practice in Oklahoma and before the U.S. Supreme Court.

A Rotarian since 1979, PE Ron is vice chair of the Future Vision Committee and a member of the Polio Eradication Advocacy Task Force for the United States. He has served RI as director; Rotary Foundation trustee and trustee vice chair; International Assembly moderator, assistant moderator, and group discussion leader; and district governor.

His other service to Rotary includes chair of the 2011 New Orleans Convention Committee, vice chair of the Investment Advisory Committee, liaison trustee of the Vocational Service Committee, Permanent Fund national adviser, and regional Rotary Foundation coordinator. He was aide to 2006-07 RI President William B. Boyd.

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PE Ron has received the RI Service Above Self Award and The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service, Distinguished Service Award, and International Service Award for a Polio-Free World.

During his speech, PE Ron referred briefly to the RI Strategic Pan and dwelt on the Future Vision Plan for The Rotary Foundation. He believes that the Future Vision will enable Rotary Clubs like ours achieve far more with Foundation based projects than ever before, with far greater control over the funding of those projects resting with local Rotary Districts. However, two points made by PE Ron resonated with me as they relate to our club in particular.

The Rotary Foundation is Rotary's own charity; it is our own vehicle for funding international projects that span the world of Rotary both geographically and in meeting human needs. But the funding of important projects to further peace and understanding can only grow if contributions to the various TRF funds also grow.

PE Ron has challenged all Rotarians in every club to contribute \$100 per year, every year to TRF funds; 1.2 million Rotarians x \$100 = \$120 million per year, a substantial uplift to Rotary's capability to achieve its strategic plans globally. So I bring this challenge to our club, and that is for each member to make a personal commitment to gather together \$100 for the Foundation each and every year.

Membership retention and growth continue to be challenges for Rotary Clubs everywhere, yet in many countries and clubs membership numbers are managing to creep upwards. The

challenge from PE Ron is for each and every Rotarian to bring in one more new member, which would mean 1.2 million new Rotarians worldwide and a staggering advance in what Rotarians can achieve together.

An Extra Challenge - Make Up: Rotarians around the world are generous people who give their time, resources and talents to furthering the goals of Rotary. But there are many clubs where members lack the resources to make personal contributions of \$100 per year to The Rotary Foundation, or they live in communities too poor to contribute financially beyond meeting local needs. So, to PE Ron's challenges I would like to add one of my own.

I challenge Rotarians with the means and the resources to Make Up for those who can't; let us respond to this challenge by setting a goal and putting in train plans to raise sufficient extra money so that this club contributes, in addition to members' personal contributions, at least \$100 per member per year to the Foundation to make up for those Rotarians who would contribute if they could but through circumstances cannot.

In the area of membership so many Rotarians have introduced new members to their clubs in the past, but many have introduced none. So let us all make up for that; let each one of us aim to bring two new members into Rotary with at least one of them brought into this club. Let us take a can do approach to membership and think in terms of expanding Rotary broadly as well as in our own club.

Let's bring a new meaning to "make up" and help our fellow Rotarians elsewhere to also make a difference.

After no prior nominations had been received for the positions of President Elect and Membership Director, Joan Reed and Stephen Baker accepted nominations to fill those respective positions, which were enthusiastically approved.

Guest Speaker - Dick Wilson on ARHRF

Dr Dick Wilson introduced members of the Australian Rotary Health District Committee (see guest list above). Dick joined RC Strathalbyn in 1974 and later RC Stirling. He has chaired the ARH District Committee for the past 3 years and is a member of the governing Board. He reminded our club that it had been a major contributor to ARHRF since it was established in 1985 but that level of support had declined in recent years. Consideration needs to be given to each member becoming a Friend of the Fund – cost \$100. Over the nearly 30 years since establishment, \$29m had been raised and donated. He extolled the major advances in medicine achieved through research as evidenced by body imaging which had started in 1895 with the discovery of X-Ray, and the number of Nobel physics prize winners associated with its development. There is an outstanding need to develop young researchers.

The Fund has, since year 2000, put a major effort into Mental Health, and particularly enhancing quality of life. A video was played, briefly outlining each of the areas to which the Fund is contributing:

- A. Mental Health 1 in 5 Australians are estimated to suffer from mental issues but only limited research is being undertaken through Federal and State governments. One current research project being assisted by the Fund is a study of anxiety in children and adults. The aim is to improve treatment and management of such cases. A PhD in psychiatry relating to depression, also being funded, found that good diet was a major positive contributor to mental wellbeing......and the results of this research have been published in America.
- B. Other medical research is being pursued including a study into why melanomas recur.
- C. Indigenous Health Scholarships are a significant area of investment on the video, scholarship students explained the importance of this support for them and their aboriginal communities.
- Rural Medical Scholarships are assisting in the recruitment of medical staff into remote areas.

Major fundraisers for ARHRF include The Great Bike Ride (around Australia), Rotary Golf Day and Hat Day.

Dick was thanked for his presentation.

The meeting of 21 members and volunteers last Saturday had been successful in generating good ideas for the Thrift Shop. Rotary News

Rotary news in brief from around the globe

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Australia: More than 50 Interactors from District 9710 gathered at Laurel Hill Forest Lodge in June for a weekend of learning and camaraderie at the district Interact conference.

The Interact Club of Tumbarumba, chartered in 2011, hosted the event. The Interactors, together with exchange students from Belgium, Brazil, and Canada, learned to build an outdoor survival shelter and discussed topics such as bullying. They also found out about local and international Interact club projects and used Skype to talk with exchange students in Sweden and Switzerland.

Canada: The Stampede Roundup is an outdoor music festival in Calgary that features artists from around the world. It's also the Rotary Club of Calgary's largest fundraiser. The 17th annual festival was held on 11 July and attracted a record 17,500 people. The event, which netted more than C\$250,000 this year, benefits terminally ill children at Alberta's first pediatric hospice. Performers at this year's Stampede Roundup included the Tragically Hip, Matthew Good, and 54-40.

England: In the depths of last winter, Terry Williams, of the Rotary Club of Swindon North, decided to pitch a ShelterBox tent in the town square and live in it for a week. Williams endured seven nights of below-freezing temperatures to raise funds for and publicize ShelterBox, a nonprofit started by British Rotarian Tom Henderson. Williams received visitors from local schools and his Rotary club, and nearby businesses provided warm meals. By the end of the week, Williams, who had aimed to raise £3,000 for ShelterBox, had brought in over £8,000. He donated a portion of that amount to the End Polio Now campaign.

Mexico: In Mexico City, home to more than 8.5 million people, municipal water resources are often strained. Heart 2 Heart, a project of District 4170 (Mexico) and seven districts in Illinois, Indiana, Louisiana, and Tennessee, USA, has installed clean water systems in over 50 schools there. Steel tanks holding 2,640 gallons of water are connected to a school's internal plumbing system to provide clean water for drinking and hand washing. Local Rotarians organize the construction and delivery of the water tanks, which cost \$3,500 each and should last up to 40 years. Area club members also assist with installation and plumbing, and train

school officials in maintenance. The government fills the tanks weekly, at no cost to the schools or Rotarians. Heart 2 Heart plans to install tanks at an additional 50 to 60 schools.

Tanzania: People who send or read text messages while driving look away from the road for an average of 4.6 seconds. At 55 miles per hour, that's all the time it takes for a car to travel 100 yards, or the length of a football field. The Rotary Club of Dar-es-Salaam, in association with Tanzanian police and private companies, organized a month-long public service campaign in March to warn motorists about the dangers of using phones while driving. The club printed pamphlets and bumper stickers with the slogan "Driving + Phone = Death" and worked with police and Home Affairs Ministry officials to distribute them. The slogan also appeared on a billboard, and local radio stations broadcast a jingle created for the campaign.

USA: Run-down and plagued by gang violence, Closter Park in Salinas, Calif., will soon get a makeover with the help of local Rotary clubs, as well as clubs in India and Mexico. The Rotary Club of Salinas is leading the project, which aims to make the park a safe haven for families. Rotarians installed benches, picnic areas, and a gazebo and are organizing youth activities and cultural events. The clubs have raised about \$450,000 in cash and in-kind donations.

Venezuela: Rotarians in the city of Barquisimeto, concerned about a growing incidence of HIV/AIDS, worked with local physicians to develop a curriculum for high school students on the risk factors associated with sexually transmitted diseases. Basing their program on one started by the Rotary Club of Cortland, N.Y., USA, to prevent teen pregnancies, members of the Rotary Club of Barquisimeto-Nueva Segovia trained student leaders to teach and mentor their classmates. As part of the effort, all students are urged to be tested for HIV. The program has become a model for Rotary clubs in Colombia, Honduras, Belize, and Mexico, among other countries.
