


President Stephen's Announcements

Sergeant's Session

This week our Sergeant took the morning off and slept in.

Combined Breakfast Meeting

This week's meeting was our annual Combined Christmas Breakfast with the Rotary Clubs of Unley, Hyde Park and Eastwood held at the Public Schools Club. Hyde Park's President Robert Handley opened the meeting and welcomed guests and Rotarians including District Governor Roy and Marilyn Armstrong and Assistant governor Mark and Debra Huddleston. Presidents Ann Davis (Eastwood) and Stephen (Unley) opened their clubs' respective meetings.

Guest Speaker - Reno Elms: "A Long time Ago in Bethlehem"

Pres. Robert introduced guest speaker, Major Reno Elms, pastor of Unley Salvation Army. Reno spoke about his recent visit to the Holy Land including, Israel, Bethlehem in the West Bank and Jordan. He described the sense of awe he felt in being in the very places where Jesus of Nazareth, the Christ, was born and had walked, taught, counseled, died and had risen again.

Showing just a few of the thousands of photos he took on the trip, Reno described how the cities of Jerusalem and Bethlehem had changed dramatically since the time of Jesus. For example, the Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem can still be walked upon, but it is now 10 metres below ground level, and Jerusalem and much of Israel are separated from the West Bank and the Gaza Strip by a 10 metre high concrete wall.

Reno focused on the Church of the Nativity, the oldest basilica in the world, and built over the stable grotto where Christians believe Jesus was born. For many years the early Christians venerated the site and

met there regularly to worship. In 135 AD, Hadrian is said to have had the Christian site above the Grotto converted into a worship place for Adonis, the Greek god of beauty and desire, in an attempt to wipe out the memory of Jesus. He failed as the Christians defiled the temple by using it as a rubbish dump and eventually tore it down. The original church of the Nativity was built 327 AD by St. Helena, the mother of Emperor Constantine, and was subsequently burnt down and destroyed in 529 or 556 AD. The church was rebuilt in its present form in 565 AD by the Emperor Justinian. When the Persians under Chosroes II invaded in 614, they did not destroy the structure. According to legend, their commander Shahrbaraz was moved by the depiction in mosaics inside the church of the Three Magi wearing Persian clothing, and commanded that the building be spared. The Grotto of the Nativity, an underground cave located beneath the basilica, enshrines the site where Jesus is said to have been born. Another altar in the Grotto marks the site where traditionally Mary laid the newborn Baby in the manger.

Reno pointed out that the reason the site of Jesus' birth was known was because the early Christians had kept faith with their beliefs and had continued to worship at the site passing on the knowledge of its location to their descendants and converts. The same thing happened with other Christian sites throughout the original Israel and Judea with the followers of Christ retaining the knowledge of the location of events such as the Sermon on the Mount and the feeding of the multitude.

Reno likened the faith of the early Christians to the faith that Rotarians have in the value of service and the persistence Rotarians demonstrate in continuing to be of service where there is need in our local communities and internationally. He concluded by wishing everyone a Happy Christmas and a Safe New Year.

Fiji and Samoa Disasters

The decision has been made to allocate \$5,000 of the District 9520 Designated fund to District 9920 to help relieve some of the suffering being undergone in this part of the world. The following report was received from our colleagues in New Zealand:

"Cyclone Evan has struck Samoa causing havoc and destruction. Emergency Response Kits (ERKs) prepositioned in Apia are being distributed to those most affected and back up supplies are being shipped from Fiji.

Cyclone Evan will hit Tonga and Fiji in the coming days and reportedly is intensifying.

We have prepositioned ERKs in Fiji and Rotarians and their supporters are on standby. Rotary is working with Disaster Management Agencies in all three countries and we anticipate that as well as ERKs, food, water and clothing will be needed."

District Governor Roy would like all clubs to consider donating funds, via District, to increase support. Contributions may be sent to District Treasurer Darrell Wise at Post office Box 37, Oaklands Park, SA 5046. If each club were to donate \$300 or more, we would be able to send a further \$16,000.

Newtown Connecticut Massacre

Ashlee Leach (supported by the Rotary Club of Campbelltown, and the Rotary Club of Queanbeyan, NSW) is currently collecting letters of compassion and support for the students whom have survived the massacre at Sandy Hook Schools. The letters will be from same aged children.

At this stage, these will be sent to the Rotary Club of Newtown, Connecticut at the end of this year. This would be a good activity for local schools, holiday care, children, grand-children etc.

Rotarian Action Group expands maternal health project in Nigeria

In Nigeria, one out of every 18 women dies as a result of childbirth. The country has the second-highest maternal mortality rate in the world.

That's why the Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth and Sustainable Development targeted the northern Nigerian states of Kaduna and Kano with a pilot program aimed at reducing maternal mortality by preventing and treating obstetric fistula, a serious birth injury. From 2005 until 2010, the project, partly supported by a grant from The Rotary Foundation, reduced maternal death by 60 percent in participating hospitals, reached 1 million women of childbearing age, and repaired obstetric fistulas for 1,500 Nigerian women.

"We have to empower women, and women cannot be empowered if they can't make their own choices in antenatal care and child spacing," says Dr. Robert Zinser, CEO of the Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth and Sustainable Development and member of the Rotary Club of Ludwigshafen-Rheinschanze, Germany.

Zinser has been to Nigeria nearly 20 times to work on maternal and child health projects, including the northern Nigeria pilot focused on the prevention and treatment of fistulas. An obstetric fistula is a birth injury that can cause stillbirth and, in the mother, chronic incontinence, infection, nerve damage, or death. The primary cause is labor that goes on for too long, often for days. Because 70 percent of Nigerian women deliver at home, often without access to proper medical care, long labors that would be prevented in the developed world are more common.

According to the World Health Organization, "prevention is the key," Zinser says, "We insisted on a comprehensive approach of better antenatal care" that includes training, equipment, quality, hygiene, and benchmarking.

The project also included surgery to repair damage from fistula. Many women with the injury don't know it can be repaired, so Rotarians created a series of radio programs that explained the condition, its causes, and the available treatment.

"People listened, and village women found out their fistulas could be repaired at the Rotary center. We repaired 1,500 fistulas, 500 more than our goal," Zinser says.

The action group is now preparing to replicate the project in the states of Abuja and Onoda, with plans to eventually establish the model in other central and southern Nigeria states.

Zinser is adamant that the project can be implemented in other areas with high maternal mortality. "We must save the mothers so that the mothers can save the world," he says.
