
I have also been informed that other Rotary clubs which meet here at the PSC have also expressed interest in participating in our mini-forum.

Guest Speaker

David Bell: "A Photo Journey into Life, Love, Money & Gardens"

After a rather rocky start to his working life, Dave finally graduated from the school of financial hard knocks in 2000, majoring in "the art of working really hard, while going broke slowly."

Dave was eventually able to turn his financial fortunes around and rise above the poverty trap.

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He had been half-heartedly writing a book, when a freak accident changed his life in 2006. Travelling on the Victor Harbor Road a branch fell on the power lines, bringing them down in front of the car. A truck travelling towards them hit the power line and sent one end hurtling back towards them at break neck speed the impact sounding like an exploding bomb.

Badly shaken but very lucky to escape serious injury he sat by the side of the road and pondered his brush with death.

The following day, he made some serious decisions he had been postponing for a while. He gave up his job, as a garden designer, to work full time on the book he had started. Two years later "The Gardener's Guide to Growing Money Trees," with photographer James Morcom, was born.

Dave started his presentation by talking about his freak accident and understood the truth of "don't put off tomorrow what you can do today". He was lucky enough to have a benefactor who started him off as a share trader and for the first time he was out of poverty.

With his good friend and professional photographer James Morcom, Dave launched himself into a career changing project over four years to publish "The Garden's Guide to Growing Money Trees"

Photos from Adelaide and around the world are set to an inspirational message to make us think about our own life style, career and family, and to inspire us to make better and more decisions. It seems at times that the animal or landscape is giving us a message. For example, the beautiful Morten Bay Fig at Botanical Park, Adelaide tells us to "grow strong, deep roots and the inner child will come out to play"

The book makes us think of our life path from a different perspective, through the chapters "The Elusive Money Tree," "Growing Money Trees"

(general principles, through work, in the share market, with property)," Growing the Tree of Love," and growing "Growing the Tree of Life".

It is a book that is sometimes funny, sometimes serious, often about money, always about life –a collection of snapshots that reveal what nature can teach us about the bigger picture.

The War Over Polio

The attached link below is for an article from the current Time Magazine and gives a good account of the work Rotary International has been doing in an effort to eradicate polio. Part of my role as a Rotary volunteer is to work with 12 Rotary Districts of Zone 28 to help inform the public that polio still exists and to help raise funds to be used in the polio eradication effort. My passion resulted from a trip to Nigeria where I was able to place the Sabin vaccine drops on the tongues of children aged five years and younger and then look in the eyes of parents who brought their children to be vaccinated. Words cannot explain the nonverbal appreciation expressed in the faces of those parents.

Creating awareness that the disease still exists and that there is an on-going effort with Rotary, UNICEF, WHO and the Centre for Disease as spear-heading partners to eradicate the disease. The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation joined the effort in 2007 and have been a major player in helping. An end game strategy is being developed and with some luck we will see the end of this devastating disease in the not too distant future.

Part of my role is to create awareness that this disease is an airplane flight away and encourage our citizens to keep their children immunized against polio. My request to you is that you forward the link to this article to everyone on your email list as I am doing. Avid cyclist harvests produce to fight hunger

For 11 days in August, Benjamin Rasmus pedaled around the state of Washington. He biked up grueling mountain passes, battled a headwind for 80 miles, and had to be escorted through a brushfire.

The 850-mile ride started out as a joke, when co-workers playfully suggested that the avid cyclist and program director for Harvest Against Hunger, a project of Rotary First Harvest, make his regular site visits on two wheels.

The 28-year-old, who manages volunteers on produce-recovery and gardening projects, took them up on the challenge. He soon had \$2,500 in donations and the interest of local media as he circled the state visiting growers and helping to harvest produce for donation to food banks. In the past, this food, either because of slight imperfections or a glut in the market, would be thrown away or left to rot in the field.

"In the last five years, there has been a big shift toward fresh, nutritious food in the emergency food system," Rasmus explains. "We connect local growers and farmers with food banks and volunteers to get fresh produce to people in need."

Rasmus is passionate about Rotary First Harvest – a program of Rotary District 5030 – which his fellow club members also support. "It's shocking how much fresh produce goes to waste, and farmers hate to see that. They dedicate their lives to growing it.

"Food bank clients want healthful food," he adds. "So, if a client walks into a local pantry with an amazing selection of fresh produce, it gives them a boost too."

The two shift times are 8am to 12.30pm and 12.30pm to 5pm.




