#### WHY ROTARY CAN HELP BRING PEACE TO THE WORLD

Peace through service is not an idle wish, but something that our organisation really can make happen.

In 1940, the world was at war. Paul Harris wrote in the Rotarian magazine that February: "Must the best genius of men be devoted to the science of war and none to the science of averting it?"


The Second World War began to clarify views within the organisation that we could and should strive to make our world a far more peaceful place. After the war, The United Nations was formed. Around 100 Rotarians were deeply and fundamentally involved in the formation of the most famous of all Organisations for Peace. Many people and even Rotarians don't realise Rotary had such an incredible history of ground breaking work in this field.

The Rotary Foundation is our charity. Its vision is "Enabling Rotarians to advance world understanding, goodwill and peace, by improving health, supporting education and alleviating poverty". In 1996 Rotary began to investigate an educational institution dedicated to Paul Harris – a Rotary University. This dream was found to be unrealistic, but in 1999 an alternative was found and \$5.3 million over a 6 years trial invested in it. This alternative was formation of Rotary Centres in Peace and Conflict Resolution in 7 universities around the world.

These centres are in US, Argentina, Australia, Japan and the U.K (Bradford). Each takes up to 12 Fellows each year. The aim is to train individuals with experience, vision, drive and with values in line with Rotary values. They are selected on a worldwide basis through a rigorous process to attend the 18 month course. Over 400 have graduated. They come from incredibly varied backgrounds – race, creed, country – and are working all over the world, wherever their skills are needed. These are wonderful courageous people - people we are proud to be associate with.

The **guest speaker** will be **D9520 Peace Fellow Sangluaia** from Myanmar, is the D9520 Peace Fellow, one of only 50 selected from throughout the world by the Rotary Foundation.

Last year, because no suitable candidates applied from within the district, we selected and mentored Sangluaia, a potential candidate from a non-Rotary country. He takes up his 18 month Fellowship at the University of Bradford, England, in September.

Sangluaia is currently working for the UN High Commissioner for Refugees on the frontline in Rakhine State where the deadly dispute between the minority Rohinya Muslims and the Rahkine Buddhists is taking place. Thousands of homes have been burnt and hundreds of people killed.

Prior to this, Sangluaia worked with street children and refugees in Mandalay and spent a short time working on a reconciliation project in Northern Ireland.

Sangluaia himself is a member of another minority group in Myanmar and has known discrimination all his life. He has double degrees in Philosophy and Theology, is a Christian and speaks English well.

He will tell a story you will never forget.

## Guest Speaker - Warren Wilson: "How inventors invent"

Chairman Stephen Baker introduced Adelaide born and bred Warren to the meeting. He schooled at Ascot Park Primary and Marion High School. After leaving school he worked in this uncle's engineering business and then went on to specialize in motor bike engineering (particularly superbikes). His first invention was suspension and disc brakes for bikes. He is renowned for his invention of Betta Blocks for kids.

Warren explained that his mother who was a dressmaker and father, a motor racer, were both innovative people.

Having a good idea is simply not sufficient. One of his inventions called superbug was the best of its type anywhere in the world but he failed to interest backers and it was a financial disaster. A break-through came when he attended the Nuremberg Toy Fair and noted the dominance of Lego with its \$2b annual sales. Why not produce a similar toy, but one which moves?

He provided members with pieces of a jigsaw puzzle showing the image and outer area of a globe to make the point that it was just as important to understand the broader market place and the influences which could make or break an invention. He

modestly started with molding 5000 pieces of this blocks which operated like press studs on jeans and were rotatable. There were no local investors interested in financing his blocks so he sold part of his business and headed off to the US where he located an entrepreneur involved in direct selling on TV. \$30,000 was invested and a direct sell advert developed. Over 9 years he sold 2m kits (with 2b blocks) worth \$45m......the advertising component was \$12m. The blocks were manufactured in NZ and kept evolving with changes in color and style. In retrospect he would have liked more of his blocks sold in supermarkets and general stores rather than by direct marketing and perhaps should not have sold his patent to his backer. He was however fortunate that his invention was a success unlike others that could have been. Luck always plays a role.

His latest venture is a program for kids 'to make dreams come true'. He is using high achievers to explain how to succeed. Warren was thanked by acclamation

# Guatemala Rotarians use global grants to help school children receive a better education

At Próximos Pasos School for Girls in Santa María de Jesus, Guatemala, the students look happy, healthy, and energetic.

Unlike their counterparts at some schools in the country, the girls have access to clean water and proper nutrition, and the results are apparent. The girls are able to focus on their studies, and they express an enthusiasm for their education.

"We saw many changes in the kids, in the teachers, and in the community," says Jorge Aufranc, past governor of District 4250 and a member of the Rotary Club of Guatemala Sur. "They appreciate the work that Rotary has done."

A Rotary Foundation global grant implemented by the Guatemala Sur club provided the school with computers and a machine called a mechanical cow, which produces soy milk. The device is made of stainless steel and does not

look much like a cow. Soybeans are put into a funnel at the top, and about 45 minutes later, they have been turned into soy milk and a pulp called okara, which is used in the school's cooking classes. On one recent day, the girls were using the okara to make cookies.

Aufranc's district has used the <u>Rotary Foundation's new grants</u> to help many schools in the area. It took part in the three-year pilot of the new grant system, during which 43 global grants have been undertaken in the district, including five by the Guatemala Sur club. The pilot ends 1 July, and the new grants then become available to all districts.

The Guatemala Sur club began with projects that address needs they deemed critical. For example, one global grant is providing nine rural schools in Sumpango with washing stations, latrines, kitchen equipment, and furniture.

"Everything begins with water," Aufranc says. "If there is no water, we cannot have peace. Where there is a lack of water, there is conflict."

#### Partnerships are essential

For the grant used at Próximos Pasos, the Guatemala Sur club partnered with clubs from districts 6420 and 6440 (Illinois, USA), as well as Mission Impact and the World Soy Foundation. Aufranc says working with these other organizations is part of what made the grant successful.

"You have to involve as many Rotarians as you can, locally and internationally," Aufranc says. "With Future Vision, there has been resistance because people think, 'oh we have to think bigger and bigger.' But that's how you make an impact in a community. You have to think big."

His district's extensive experience with global grants has made Aufranc an advocate of the new grants.

He believes community involvement is essential to any Rotary project. Several of Guatemala Sur's global grants were made possible by the volunteer labor of community members and input from local leaders.

"To have a good project, a sustainable project, you have to involve the community. If the community participates from the beginning, they feel they have ownership of the project, and this helps guarantee sustainability," he explains. "We have to think of it as their project, not ours. It is a project of the community, not a Rotary project."

Mirna Pérez, the principal of Próximos Pasos, also believes involving her community made the project possible. She says keys to success included the sharing of responsibility by Rotarians and community members, good communication, and flexibility.

"We are thankful to Rotary for helping us and bringing change to the lives of our students and the community," Pérez says. "Our communities need more opportunities, and Rotary gives us those opportunities. We utilize everything and we work our hardest to put everything to good use."
